A basement full of heating oil

'Satanic' T-shirt case drags out

Robert Parker was a sophomore when school officials in Westerly, R.I., said his "White Zombie" rock band T-shirt with the number 666 on the back was disruptive and violated the dress code.

Two years and \$60,000 in legal fees later, the case drags on, and Parker, now 18, is weeks away from graduating.

"It's just a \$5 T-shirt. They've spent thousands of dollars fighting it," said Parker's mother, Marianne Almeida.

A state hearing has pitted the School Committee against the American Civil Liberties Union of Rhode Island and has raised freedom of speech, religious and occult issues.

On this date in history

April 15 - In 1836, Mexican troops burn the Texas town of Harrisburg, now known as Houston. Also, in 1947, the most devastating fire in Texas history erupted at Texas City when the French freighter Grandcamp exploded in the Houston Ship Channel and caused another freighter, the High Flyer, also to explode. There were 576 deaths and 4,000 injuries.

Various spokeswomen for Clovis High School said Kilmer was not available for comment last week.


4-H begins new urban collaboration

Runoffs turn out to be snoozefest

"What if they held an election and nobody came?" almost happened in Bailey County with Tuesday's Democratic and Republican runoffs.

With no local races to draw attention, unofficial results indicate that only 16 people voted in the Democratic runoff and six in the Republican.

While local Democrats backed consultant Charles Gandy 12-4 over retired Air Force lawyer Gene Kelley to oppose Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, Kelley won the race statewide.

Local Republicans followed the state trend in unanimously voting for Sharon Keller over Tom Price as presiding judge of the state Court of Criminal Appeals.

Charles Holcomb was nominated for the court's Position 1 and Barbara Parker Hervey for No. 2.

Baby-death trial tentatively slated later this month

The murder trial of Leticia Marisela Hernández, accused in the fatal scalding of a 3year-old boy last May, is tentatively scheduled for the week of April 24 in 287th District Court in Muleshoe.

Hernández, who was 19 at the time, allegedly dipped Jesús Angel Haro into boiling water, then panicked and drove him to a hospital in Mexico for treatment. Doctors in Ciudad Juárez notified authorities there, who contacted U.S. officials.

Hernández's boyfriend, Roberto Contreras, faces lesser charges in the case.



Renting a basement apartment or spare room appears to be a simple way to earn a little extra cash. Download a standard lease from the Internet, put a rental ad in the paper, and start in business, right?

"There's more to being a landlord than simply collecting the monthly rent check," said Richard Roll, president of the American Homeowners Association. "Before you rent your home, be sure to understand your responsibilities and minimize your financial risks."

First, check with your local zoning office to make sure your property can be rented. Some localities prohibit subletting by homeowners.

Be sure to thoroughly inspect the property prior to the tenant's arrival. Of course, the owner is responsible for making sure the faucet doesn't leak, the refrigerator is running, and that the air conditioning or heating is work-

But the potential landlord also needs to document the condition of the apartment and furnishings, in case of any damage by a tenant. Take photographs or a video of the apartment and all property covered by the rental agreement. Then do a walkthrough with the tenant and inspect the property together.

Make sure the lease contains a damage provision, for other than ordinary wear and tear, and a damage deposit.

Well ahead of entering into a lease, review your homeowners' insurance. Some things to consider adding to your coverage:

• If the rental property is furnished and still contains some personal stuff, add personal property coverage;

· Liability coverage will insure against claims for loss or injury by the tenant;

• A loss-of-income provision will cover lost rent, in case the property has to stand vacant.

Heighten safety awareness and follow precautions. Check the smoke detectors every six months and maintain a record of each time batteries are replaced.

Tuberculosis, major problem in Texas

AUSTIN - More than 1 million people in Texas are infected with tuberculosis, according to the Texas Department of Health.

Highest risk groups include people born in a foreign country, substance abusers, those with HIV infection, inmates in correctional facilities, people with diabetes and the home-

Stopping or slowing tuberculosis in Texas acts as a firewall for 18 other states, especially among migrant workers, said Charles Wallace of the Health Department's tuberculosis elimination division.

Texas supports a tracking and TB treatment completion project called TB-Net that follows migrant workers from clinic to clinic.

Tuberculosis usually can be cured with a multi-month regimen of anti-

Anti-abuse effort begins

Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services last week launched a statewide media campaign to prevent child abuse and neglect.

New television advertisements point parent to an Internet site, itusptoyou.org, which includes parenting tips, local resources, activities for children and parents and volunteering opportunities.

"We need parents to know 'it's up to you' to make a difference in your child's life," said Marla Sheely, public information officer for the agency. "Looking at he research, it's obvious what areas this campaign must tar-

In 1998, the most frequently confirmed form of abuse or neglect was neglectful supervision with 18,817 cases. The second highest category was physical abuse with 13,460 confirmed cases.

The number of Texas children dying from abuse and neglect declined 21 percent form 1998 to 1999, the agency reported.

Specifically, 171 Texas children died of abuse and neglect during fiscal 1998 and 135 in fiscal 1999. The



state's fiscal year ends Aug. 31.

Court hears prayer case

Texas Attorney General John Cornyn on March 29 presented oral arguments before the U.S. Supreme Court in Doev. Santa Fe Independent School District.

Cornyn asked the court to uphold the school district's policy of allowing a voluntary student message during pre-game ceremonies of home varsity football games in which the student can choose whether or not to include a prayer.

"We have over 1,000 school districts in Texas who want legal guidance on this issue. The Santa Fe policy should be our model. It neither endorses nor inhibits religion. It strikes a careful balance between the freespeech rights of the students and maintains the separation of church and state," Cornyn said.

The court's opinion is expected by the end of its term in June.



It's possible to work and to excel with that same attitude today, no matter what your task. A proud graduate of Amarillo's

Tascosa High School, I found myself yesterday morning sitting in the auditorium at Amarillo High School among a large group of students, teachers, and well-wishers honoring two men being inducted into the Amarillo High School "Sandie" Hall of Fame

My nephew, Major Jon Shelburne (USMC) was one of them. Jon, just six years younger than me but obviously greatly influenced by his uncle, graduated from AHS in 1981, later graduated from the University of Dallas, taught school and coached for a few years, went to Law School at Texas Tech, joined the Marines, was commissioned as an officer, and served as a Marine attorney attached to the JAG corps in Okinawa and Italy (and

now teaches at the Marines' Law School in Rhode Island). While in Italy, he served successfully as the lead military attorney for Capt. Richard Ashby, the Marine pilot who accidentally flew through the ski gondola cable in Italy awhile back. Both Jon and Ashby are convinced that prayer played a huge role in keeping Ashby from being completely crucified by politicians (American & Italian), high-ranking military "brass," etc.

The other Sandie Hall of Fame honoree was Lt. Col. Rick Husband (USAF). Rick started to high school at Tascosa the year I did. (And, to mention some other Mule-shoe ties, the same year Joe Gear did. Rick, Cindy [McGuire] Barrett, & I sang in the choir together.) But the Tascosa Rebel became an Amarillo High Sandie when the old AHS burned and school lines were redrawn. He graduated from AHS in 1975. Rick went on to earn engineering degrees at Texas Tech and Cal State. He became an accomplished Air Force pilot, and, on May 27, 1999, Rick was launched into space as the pilot of the space shuttle Discovery. At the Hall of Fame induction yes-

terday, both men took little credit and focused instead on those whose love and support made their success possible. Jon thanked his parents and teachers, read part of a column I'd written, and gave glory to God. Rick thanked God and "my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ." Both men exemplified J. S. Bach's prayer, "To God Alone Be the Glory.

It was a good day. And this Tascosa boy only became mildly nauseated as the crowd stood at the end of the ceremony and sang the Amarillo High School song.


