### Planting Dates Show Advantage For Grain

Some interesting figures relative to planting dates of 13 different varieties of grain sorghums have been released by t h e Chillicothe Experiment Station, according to R. O. Dunkle. County Agent.

The two planting dates used as a comparison in yields are April 15 and 3-D-William E. Sorrells, L. C. May 15. In this eight year test period it was found that May 15 planting produced an average of all varieties

> It was also found that the date of planting to maturity was 121 days for the April 15 planting a n d only 101 days for the May 15 planting. Even though the planting date was 30 days difference the maturing date was only a 10 days difference.




