COUNTY SUPT. GIVES REPORT OF 7TH GRADES EXAMS

During the past school year I gave to the 7th grades of the county under or partly under my supervision a National Public School test. The first test was given in December and the follow up test was given just before the close of each school.

These tests covered grammar, History and geography. Any grade from the third to the ninth could be given this test, the number of points made on the test deciding the grade the pupil might be classed in. A 7th grade pupil ready for promotion should answer correctly 27 out of the 63 questions in Grammar; 31 out of the 68 History questions; and 39 out of the 63 Geography questions. The number of points for a seventh grade average is 86.

While the Knox City school did not win first or second place with a class of thirty three (the largest taking the examination) it made a little above the class average which was 87. Logan Fleming made the highest number of points which was 130.

The Union Grove school made the highest average among the eight month group. 7 in class and a class average of 86 points. Louise Hendon scored a total of 138 points. The Brock school had only one pupil in the seventh grade, Dell Large and he made a total of score of 129 points.

The Vera school won second place in the eight month group 14 in class, average 90 (Mrs. E. F. Branton is principal of the Union Grove school and Miss Winnie Ferguson of the Brock school. These schools are both in the Knox City neighborhood and the principals citizens of Knox City.)

In the group with less than eight months, only one school had a strong seventh grade. Hefner was the outstanding that as compared with any school in the county, it won third place.

Hefner had a class of nine, average class 97 4-9 points; highest number of points 134, Katherine Jones.

In the county Goree won first place with a class average of 116 13-24; Benjamin second with 98 6-7 and Hefner with 97 4-0 average.

While the Hefner school was the only school with less than 8 months that made a class average sufficient for a strong seventh grade there were pupils in each school who made creditable grades. But on account these schools not making the desired average, it is a strong argument to my mind for the longer term. Seven months is too short for a school year and 14 months is too long.

I gave these tests and graded them myself for several reasons. I wished to check the rural schools against the independent schools; the schools of short terms against the schools of longer terms; and to learn the type of work being done in various schools.

ORDINANCE NO. 52

The State of Texas County of Knox City of Knox City, Texas

An ordinance providing for the working of streets in Knox City, Texas

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Knox City, Texas that all male persons between the ages of twenty one and forty five years old shall be liable to work on repair and clean out the streets under the provision of this title subject to the following conditions.

Section 1) All male persons between the ages of twenty-one and forty-five years be liable to work on, repair clean out the

public streets under the provisions of this title, subject to the following conditions:

1. Ministers in active discharge of their duties, invalids, members of the volunteer fire department in the active discharge of their duties, and persons who have not been residing in the county in which they are summoned to work for fifteen days immediately preceding such summons, shall be exempt.

2. Any persons so liable who has been summoned to do such duty may furnish an able bodied substitute to work in his place.

The City Marshall shall not accept such substitute if he is incapable of performing a reasonable amount of work.

3. Any person so liable, by paying his City Marshall before the day appointed to work, one dollar for each day he is summoned to work, shall be exempt for each day paid for.

4. Each person summoned to work on a street shall take with him an axe, hoe, spade or such tool as the City Marshall directs, or if he has no such suitable tool then such other suitable tool as he may have.

5. Each street hand shall perform his duties as such in accordance with the directions of the City Marshall. No person shall be compelled to do such work more than five days of eight hours efficient service in each year.

If any person liable to work upon the streets after being legally summoned shall fail or refuse to furnish his team or tools at the time and place designated by the person summoning him, or having attended shall fail or refuse to perform good service or any other duty required of him by law or the person under whom he may work, or if any one fails to comply with any duty requested of him as provided by the statutes providing for a systematic method of street maintenance, he shall be fined not exceeding twenty-five dollars.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed. Done and passed this 7th day of June a. d. 1929.
