## Mayor, Other City Officials To Be Elected Tuesday

### J. B. Eubank, 66, Dies at Truscott

Funeral services for J. B. Eubank, Sr., 66, were held at the First Christian Church in Truscott Wednesday afternoon at 2:30, with Howard Marshall, pastor of the Knox City First Christian Church, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. Hulse, pastor of the Truscott Baptist Church, and Rev. Carl Hudson, pastor of the Truscott Methodist Church.

Mr. Eubank, father of former Knox County Judge J. B. Eubank, Jr., died unexpectedly at his home Tuesday morning about 7:30, a few minutes after eating breakfast and complaining of feeling ill.

Interment was in the Truscott cemetery with Masonic graveside rites. Survivors are the wife, three sons and two brothers.

### Couples Exchange Wedding Vows in Double Services

In a double ceremony at the First Christian Church this morning, Miss Frankie Jo Tanner became the bride of William Roy Baker and Miss Mary Von Cobb became the bride of Henry L. White. Howard Marshall, pastor of the church, officiated.

Vows were exchanged at sunrise as the couples stood before the altar which was decorated with floor baskets of pink gladioli. Lighted white tapers in seven-branch candelabra flanked the setting and provided illumination.

Musical selections were rendered by Mrs. A. B. Michael of Rochester, pianist, and Mrs. Joe Ed Parsons of Rochester, vocalist, who sang "Because" and "The Lord's Prayer."

For her wedding, Miss Tanner wore a white street-length strapless dress under a white ruffled gown which featured a close-fitting lace bodice, with tiny lace buttons to the waist, and a full gathered nylon net skirt. The long sleeves extended to points over the hands and fastened with lace buttons. Her off-the-face hat was of matching white lace and nylon net, and she wore an orchid corsage.

Miss Cobb chose a white lace duster fashioned with a flaring skirt and rhinestone trim, worn over a white linen sheath dress. She carried white accessories and wore an orchid corsage.

Immediately following the ceremony the couples left for a wedding trip to San Antonio and Old Mexico. They will make their homes in Knox City.

Her husband, Douglas L. Benham, was seriously injured and is hospitalized at Albuquerque, N. M. His condition is not now considered critical, but friends in Benjamin reported Wednesday that he had not yet regained consciousness.

Mr. and Mrs. Benham were enroute to Albuquerque to pick up their son, Leo, 14. The boy had left home a few days previously and was located in Albuquerque.

Mrs. Benham is survived by her husband and three children, Leo, a daughter, Marthella, 8, and another son, Vaughan, 6.

## Disaster Fund Now \$28,800

C. E. Williams, chairman of the Disaster Fund committee, reported this morning that contributions now in the hands of the committee total \$28,800.

A few donations are still coming in, Williams said, but the bulk of individual contributions is in. The total does not include approximately \$5,000 that has been collected in Fort Worth and Abilene, because those funds have not yet been turned over to the committee.

"We want to again thank all those who have given so generously to the fund," Williams said. "The money will be used to supplement rehabilitation work done by the Red Cross, and even with the funds now on hand, we can do a lot toward helping storm victims replace their belongings."

### MRS. HOUSTON BEING TREATED FOR BROKEN HIP

The Red Cross reported this morning that all those injured in the tornado Friday 13 are doing well except Mrs. L. L. Houston.

It was discovered that Mrs. Houston had a fractured left hip, and she was in surgery this morning. Her other injuries included a fractured arm and fractured leg.

### LOCAL MEN CHARGED WITH RESISTING ARREST

What started out as a family row Monday night ended in a battle royal when three local men resisted officers' attempts to arrest them.

Jailed—after a struggle with local officers and members of the sheriff's department—was a man and his son, and a son-in-law.

Tuesday the father and son-in-law were charged with disturbing the peace and fined \$100 each and costs, and the son was fined \$25 and costs. They were then transferred to the county jail at Benjamin, and charged with resisting arrest. Trial is scheduled for Thursday, April 9.

### L. A. PARKER TO HEAD CANCER FUNDS DRIVE

L. A. Parker of Benjamin will head the American Cancer Society's annual campaign for funds in Knox County. Mrs. L. W. Graham, chairman of Cancer Education, announced this week.

The society is seeking \$18,000,000 in the 1953 drive, which began Wednesday, April 1. No quota has been set for Knox County.

The money will be spent for treatment and research, and to educate the public about early symptoms of cancer and urge frequent medical examinations.

More than \$4,100,000 was allocated to research by the society in 1952, and the ACS expects to increase that figure this year.

"When you are asked to give, do it with great expectations—with the knowledge that cancer can be conquered and the everlasting hope that it will be soon," Mrs. Graham said.

The election will be held at Egenbacher Implements instead of the American Legion Hall, as previously announced.

Candidates for the School Board posts, in the order of their appearance on the ballot, are Lloyd Waldrip, Neil Perdue, Jack Fisher, L. V. Dodd, E. B. Shaver, Jr., and Horace W. Finley.

Both Waldrip and Shaver are candidates for re-election, President of the Board Barney Arnold, whose term is also expiring, did not file for re-election.

Hold-over members are J. O. Warren, John Smith, Guy Robinson and R. B. Howell.

A separate ballot will be used for the County Trustee election, in which Ben Farmer is unopposed for re-election as trustee from Commissioners Precinct 1.

Election officials will be C. C. Hoge, judge, and E. R. Carpenter and J. C. McGee, clerks.

All qualified voters were urged to show their interest in the school by voting Saturday for the candidates of their choice.

## Applications for RFC Disaster Loans Available at Bank

J. C. Smith, representative of the Dallas Loan Agency of the Reconstruction Finance Corp., said this week that he will probably be leaving Knox City, where he has an office in the same building with the Red Cross, within a few days unless other families apply for RFC Disaster Loans.

RFC loans bearing interest at the rate of 3 percent were made available to Knox Citizens who suffered damage from the recent tornado.

Mr. Smith added that he had made arrangements to leave disaster loan application forms at the Citizens State Bank, and anyone who fails to see him before he leaves may make application at the bank.

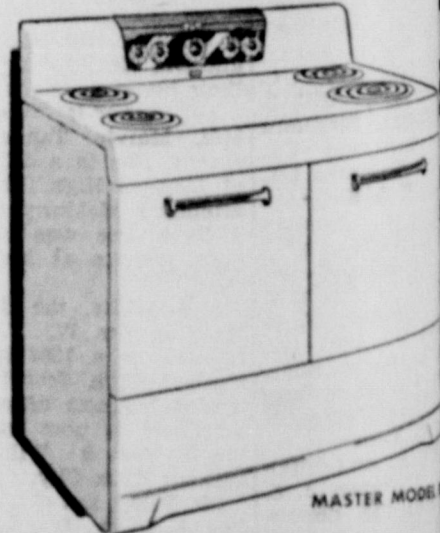

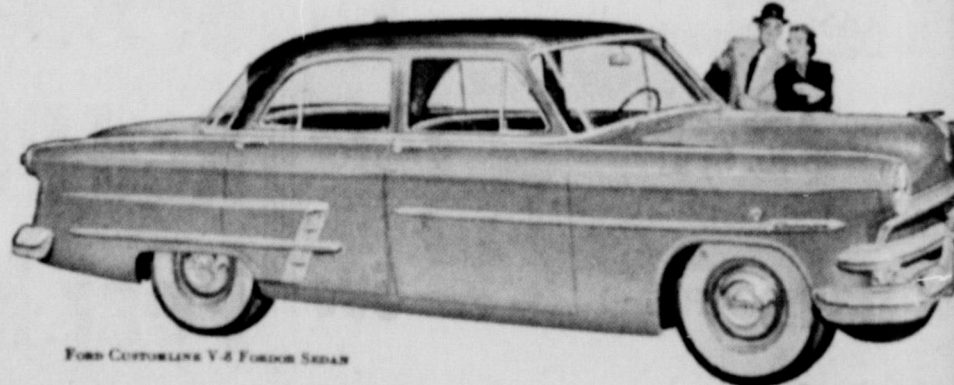

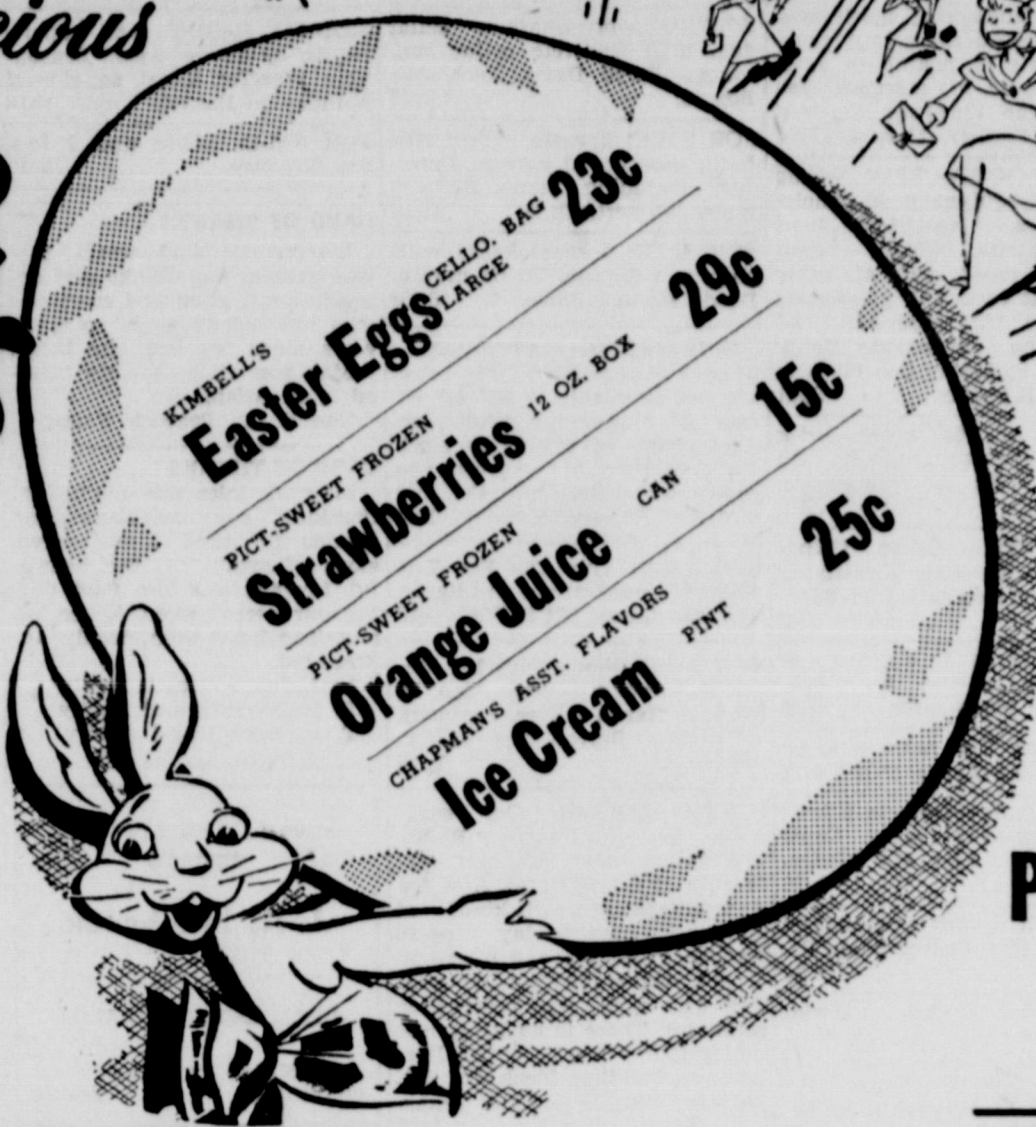
