IKARD FORMALLY ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY



District Judge Frank Ikard of Wichita Falls has authorized the Herald to announce his candidacy for U. S. Representative from the 13th Congressional District of Texas subject to the special election Saturday, September 8.

Governor Allan Shivers has called this election for selection of a successor to Rep. Ed Gossett, who has resigned effective July 31.

A native of Clay County, where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Ikard, reside, Judge Ikard is of pioneer stock. His grandfather, the late W. S. Ikard, laid out the city of Henrietta and later introduced Hereford cattle in this North Texas area.

Judge Ikard attended the public schools of Clay County and was graduated from the University of Texas. While attending the university, he served as deputy sergeant at arms for the Texas State Legislature in Austin for three years to help pay his way through the school.

"This was also a labor of love because I enjoyed the parliamentary processes of law making. I resolved then to take part in this work, but realized that a man should have some practical experience with local problems and should know the people he represents," Judge Ikard recalls.

He has been a practicing lawyer in Wichita County since his graduation from law school in 1937, with the exception of his military service.

A combat infantry private with the 28th Division, Ikard was sent overseas to France, Belgium and Germany after 17 weeks of basic training. He won two battle stars before he was captured following a delaying action in the Battle of the Bulge. He was a prisoner of war for seven months, during which time he learned of the horrors of Nazi prison camps. His normal weight of over 200 pounds was down to 150 pounds when he was liberated in central Germany.

"My experience as a combat infantryman has given me a strong desire to keep my country out of war if possible, and my experience as a prisoner of war has given me an everlasting desire to preserve the American way of living," he declares.

"I believe our standard of living must be protected from further inroads of inflation. Measures must be taken to insure a stable economy without undue tax burden," Ikard said, adding, "because people who work for a living cannot continue to meet the ever-increasing cost of living and businessmen see yesterday's profits eaten up by today's costs of operation."

Ikard was named judge of the 30th district court by the late Gov. Beauford Jester. As a district judge he established an outstanding record, disposing of cases before his court at the rate of 750 cases a year. This is approximately three times the rate of the average district judge in the state. He was elected judge of the 30th district in 1951 without opposition.

Knox City Field To Be Served By Pipeline

Service Pipeline Co. of Tulsa has been awarded contracts to lay a 123 mile, 10 inch pipeline that will provide an outlet for the North Knox City Field and other West Central Texas oil production. F. M. Willenburg, division manager, Ft. Worth, has announced.

Smith Contracting Corp., Ft. Worth, will construct that part of the line from Service Pipe Line's Jud station in Haskell County to the west bank of the Salt Fork of the Brazos River west of Knox City, and O. R. Burden Construction Corp., Tulsa and Wichita Falls, will construct the river crossing and the line eastward to Bowie.

J. L. Burke, Tulsa, president of Service Pipe Line, last April announced plans for the Jud-Bowie line. When completed next fall, it will serve new oil development, and will traverse an area where active exploration is underway.

The system will connect production in the Old Glory, Kiowa Peak and North Aspermont Fields in Stonewall County, the South Haskell Field in Haskell County, and the Knox City Field.

Willenburg said the entire Jud-Bowie line will be constructed of reconditioned pipe from other parts of the Service Pipe Line system. Most of the pipe is being taken from the ground in Illinois, Nebraska, Missouri and Texas, and will be cleaned and reconditioned in yards at Haskell and Henrietta.

Former Resident Killed Near Memphis In Plane Crash

Ray Wright, 26, of Plainview, former resident of Knox City, was killed Wednesday, July 4, when his crop dusting plane crashed 19 miles southwest of Memphis, Texas, after hitting a power line.

Wright was making his first flight for the newly-organized Panhandle Spraying Company of Memphis, and was flying a new airplane when the craft hit the REA line, crashed and burned, relatives said.

Wright was a cousin to J. O. Buchanan of Knox City and his mother was a cousin of C. C. Angle. He came to Knox City in 1922 and lived here about three years.

Ambulance attendants, with the assistance of cutting torch equipment, spent two hours in removing the body.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Clint Wright, who live in Plainview. He served in the Air Force seven years and piloted a C-46 in the Pacific during World War II. He had recently been employed by the High Plains Hail Prevention Association of Plainview.

Meeting Called to Organize Band

There will be a meeting at the Knox City Grammar School Building Friday night, July 13, at 7:30 o'clock for all boys and girls interested in joining a Knox City school band. Harold Barnett, new superintendent of the Knox City schools, said Wednesday.

Mr. Barnett was full time music director for 17 years, teaching all branches of instrumental and vocal music.

Sixteen thousand and seventy-nine acres of land have been transferred to the Knox City school district from the Monday school district upon petition by qualified voters in the area involved, the Knox County School Board announced Tuesday.

The land annexed to the local district amounts to approximately 42 per cent of the old Sunset school district, which was consolidated with the Monday district in an election June 16. The division of 42 per cent for Knox City and 58 per cent for Monday was considered fair and equitable by both the County Board and the Knox City school board.

The first petition, which was acted upon by the county board Saturday, called for annexation of 6,600 acres, or about 20 per cent of the Sunset district. At that time two other petitions were presented to the board, and both of these petitions were approved by the board at a meeting Tuesday morning.

The boundary of the annexed land follows a line beginning at the southwest corner of the Burnett Ranch, following the meanders of the Brazos River to the northeast corner of sub-survey 9, thence south to the southeast corner of sub-survey 10, thence east to the east boundary line of sub-survey 10, thence east to the northwest corner of survey 5, sub-survey 11, thence south to the southeast corner of survey 1, sub-survey 11, thence west to the southwest corner of the W. T. Wilcox place, thence north to the southeast corner of the E. C. Clayborn farm, thence west to the southwest corner of the E. C. Clayborn farm, thence south to the southeast corner of the J. W. Howell tract in survey 4, sub-survey 9, thence west to the southwest corner of the Howell land, thence south to the northwest corner of the D. B. Whitford farm, thence east to the northwest corner of the G. A. Branton-Jarvis farm, thence southeast to the northeast corner of the E. F. Branton farm, thence south to the southeast corner of the G. A. Branton farm, thence west to the northeast corner of the Sweatt farm, thence east to the northeast corner of the W. H. Cornett 100 acre tract, thence south to the southeast corner of the Cornett tract, thence west to the southwest corner of the Cornett tract, thence south to the southeast corner of the E. H. To the Citizens of Knox County:
 In 1948 the Citizens of the State of Texas voted in favor of a Constitutional Amendment that would permit the counties after a local election to levy a 30 cent ad valorem tax instead of the state levying this tax.

The Commissioners Court of Knox County has called a special election for Saturday, July 14, for this purpose.

If approved by the voters, the tax will provide a 30 cent levy on each \$100 valuation over \$3,000. Regular homestead exemptions of \$3,000 will continue as it has been under the present state law.

This will NOT increase your taxes. If you vote for this levy it will simply mean you will pay this tax to Knox County instead of the State of Texas, as you have been doing heretofore.

All the money received from this tax will be spent in Knox County for the construction and maintenance of lateral farm roads.

This will help get the farmer out of the mud, provide better roads for the school buses and mail carriers, and improve business generally throughout our entire county.

Below is a list of questions which have been asked most often concerning this election:

Q. Will my present taxes be increased?
 A. NO. The tax will be paid to Knox County instead of the State of Texas.

Q. Will my homestead be

exempt?
 A. YES, up to a value of \$3,000.00.

Q. What amount is exempt for homesteads now?
 A. The State at present allows \$3,000 homestead exemption.

Q. What will the money be used for?
 A. To construct and maintain lateral farm roads.

Q. Will the value of my property be raised?
 A. NO. This election will not change the values.

Q. Who can vote in this election?
 A. Any qualified voter who renders property (real or personal) for taxes.

Q. What is a qualified voter?
 A. A person who paid his or her poll tax in January, 1951, or is entitled to a voting exemption. To vote in this election, the person must also have rendered either personal or real property or both for valuation in 1950.

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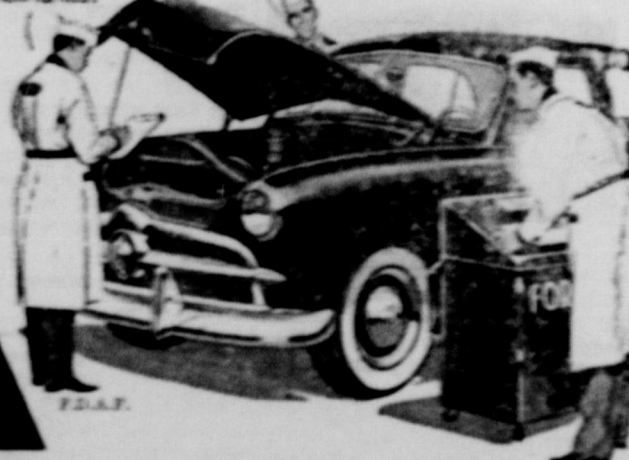
