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October Checks Reflect Social Security Increase

Tuesday, October 3, was a red letter day for some 1,500 beneficiaries in the Knox County area. That was the postal delivery date of the first social security checks with the 10 percent increase which Congress recently voted, according to Henry Chantz, manager of the Vernon social security office.

The higher amounts go to those persons who have previously applied for and established their eligibility for retirement, disability, and family insurance," he says. "They are insured workers who have retired or who are disabled for work, and the wives, widows, children, and dependent persons of retired, disabled, or deceased workers."

"The new higher benefits go to those persons who become entitled to social security payments in the future as well as present beneficiaries," Chantz stated. "All workers are now earning substantial financial protection for their families against the time when their earned income is reduced or cut off in older years or death or if accident or disease reverts one from working for a year or more."

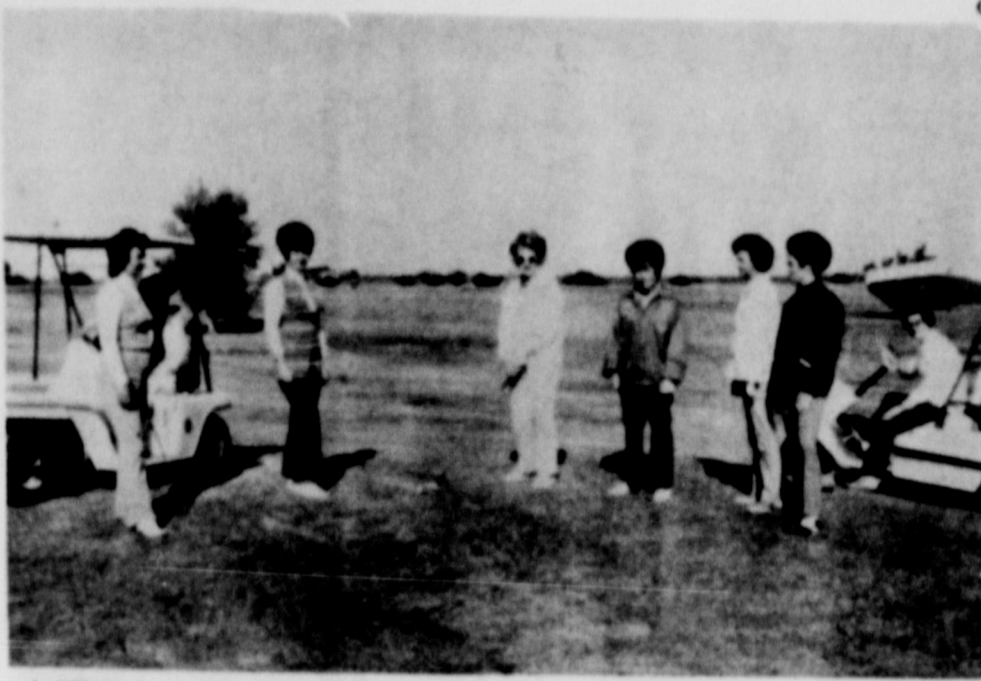

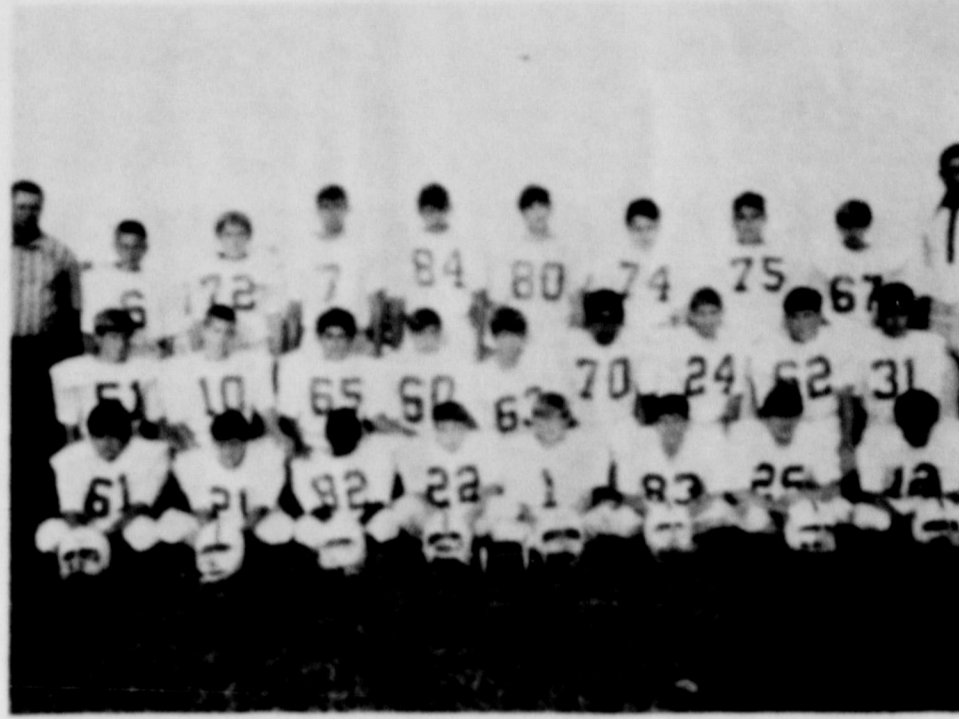
