## Information Is Released On Notary Public

Secretary of State Zollie Steakley has announced that he will reappoint persons now holding notary public commissions but that such persons must re-qualify by the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1959 and June 10, 1959.

Steakley emphasized that notaries public should not send requests for reappointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires the County Clerks to approve notary bonds. Any person not now a notary public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between April 1, 1959 and May 20, 1959. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of reappointing present notaries.

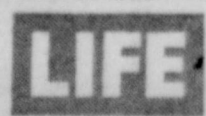

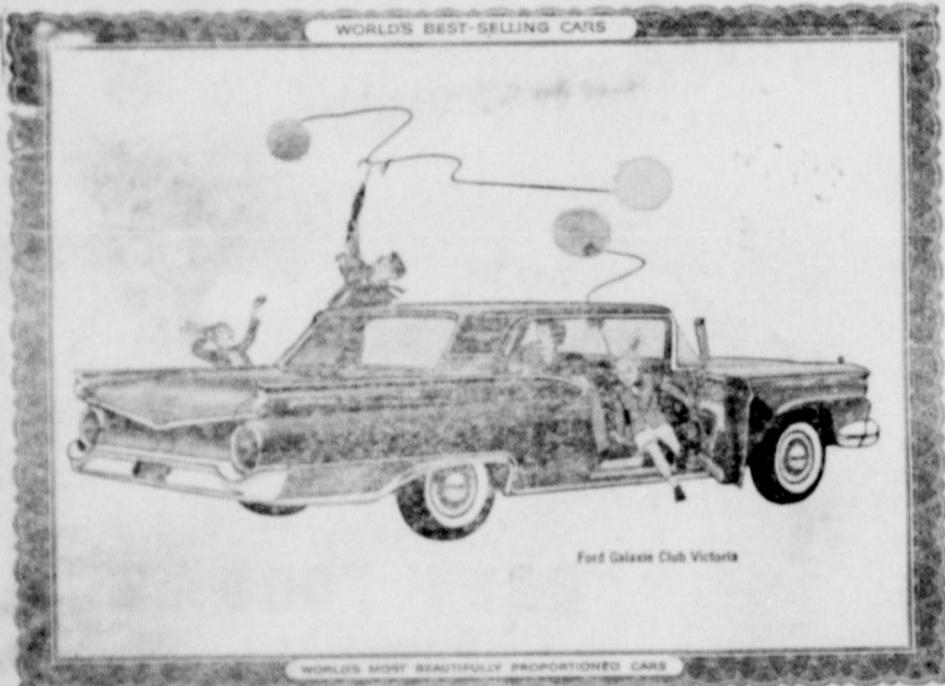
