TIRE THIEVES CAUGHT; RING BELIEVED BROKEN

February 11, marked the end of one of the most intensive man-hunts devised in Knox County. For the past several months an unknown gang has been robbing service stations all over this part of the state. Knox City and Munday were not in the area towns who lost a large number of tires to the robbers.

For the past two months area and state law enforcement agencies have had men staked out in various businesses which had a large number of tires, in order to try and catch the robbers red-handed.

As Knox City and Munday were the only towns left in the area which had been left unmolested, officers concentrated most of their efforts on these two places.

Haskell Deputy Sheriff Buddy Lefever, stationed at Rochester, is credited with the apprehension of the two suspects in Rochester. The two men in question were Samuel Stephen and Daniel Drew, both colored. Stephen was taken to Benjamin and Drew was taken to Haskell for interrogation. Lefever stopped the pair at 3:40 a.m. Saturday for routine checking and the two men had a number of burglary tools in their possession. Stephens had been convicted

before on same charges as now. He was employed by J. B. Early Jr., in a service station and tire store in Snyder. Several officers went to Snyder to question Early who admitted buying tires from Stephens.

Those under arrest are J. B. Early Jr., charged with receiving and concealing stolen goods; Daniel Drew, Samuel Stephen, and Bobby Garcia, burglary charges. Several others are involved Knox County Sheriff H. T. Melton told a Herald reporter.

Law enforcement officers and agencies involved in the case were and are:

Officers from Haskell, Aspermont, constable at Rule, deputy sheriff at Rochester, Sheriff H. T. Melton and Deputy Sheriff H. C. Stone, of Benjamin; and sheriffs of Kent, Fisher, King, and Baylor counties, including two Texas Rangers from Mineral Wells and Wichita Falls and three Liquor Control Board Agents from Wichita Falls, Vernon and Childress, Chief of Po-

lice Eddie Carr of Knox City, and Chief of Police Joe Massey of Munday.

Towns robbed and the number of tires stolen are as follows:

Benjamin 8, Aspermont 14, Seymour 16, Guthrie 5, Weinert 18, Rule 10 and 12 in two separate robberies, Rochester 10, Benjamin 14, in another robbery, O'Brien 6, Clairemont 10, Stamford 14, McCaulley 4, Peacock 15, Girard, batteries and oil filters, and Roby, several tires.

Sheriff Melton said there may be more people involved—and that the officers were still working on the case.

"It seems to be a larger ring than we thought at first," Melton said.

Other items stolen have been batteries, adding machines, a vacuum cleaner, as well as tires. Approximately 175 tires have been stolen in this area.

One of the men told Deputy Sheriff Lefever that they were on their way to Knox City when he apprehended them Saturday morning.

In the Feb. 13 District Court, Samuel Miller of Waxahachie and Houston was tried and convicted for forgery. He received two years in the state pen.

J. C. Perkins of Hallettsville, Tex., was tried and convicted of automobile theft and received two years in pen. Another man was tried and convicted for theft and received a three year probated sentence, in District Court Feb. 20.

DR. SAMUEL B. THOMPSON SPEAKER AT LIONS CLUB

Dr. Samuel B. Thompson, professor of history and government at McMurry College, Abilene, was principal speaker at the Lions Club Wednesday. Dr. Thompson was introduced to the club by Rev. Jarrell Sharp. Dr. Thompson's topic of conversation was "Cuban Relations"—and began his speech by saying Cuba was an interesting topic for two reasons. First it is the most susceptible of Communist infiltration of any country close to us and second, what is more important, is the fact that what has happened in Cuba is symbolic of what could happen in other states.

Dr. Thompson said it was important that we understand the Cubans and what has happened to them. "We must help them," he said.

Dr. Thompson then gave a short run down on the history and population of the country.

Six and one-half million people live in Cuba. 73 per cent of the population are white (Spanish), 12 per cent Negro, and the balance mixed nationalities.

Oriental population is small, he said and Spanish is the chief language with English running second. Most of them are Roman Catholic. There are 160 radio stations and 11 TV stations, plus 50 or 60 daily newspapers, he said.

Most of the population is engaged in agriculture, with raw sugar being the main crop.

The per capita income is 400 pesos, not dollars, a year, the Doctor related.

In 1952 Batista became dictator and sometime later Castro organized a small force to run him out, but was wiped out, Dr. Thompson said. He later came back and got control of the government. At the time, neither man was pro-Communist, but there was a small organized and well trained group in Cuba who were Communists. They had to join forces with one of them, so they chose Castro, the doctor said.

In describing Castro, Dr. Thompson said he attired himself in the uniform and boots he wore to glorify himself. Actually, he has some strong points, the doctor said, similar to Hitler's. He is also a very good orator, and can keep an audience spellbound for hours.

Dr. Thompson said some scholars believed Castro a Communist to begin with, but he said facts do not rule this to be so. He believes he became a Communist about three months after he won the battle with Batista.

It was a year later—March of 1960 that the Communist came in to Cuba. Castro's brother, Raul,

bought arms and visited in Russia, he said.

Dr. Thompson said this was not a criticism of the American government but of the American people to let Communism get the foothold it had with our neighbors. He said he had been too slow to realize the importance of the cold war. The Communists have fought it with vigor and planning, and that we had thought only of a hot war.

He said we had made three distinct mistakes in our dealings with South America.

First, the State Department dealt with the government and not the people.

Second, that dictators were unable to convince the State Department that they weren't Communists in disguise.

And third, that there was an absence of over all planning, that we have used a hit-and-miss action for the situation they faced in Cuba.

The big question, Dr. Thompson said will we and can we help promote democracy in South America? "This is our own backyard with 180 million people, and we cannot help but support these people," he concluded.

A representative of the Social Security Administration will be in Knox City at the city hall on Wednesday, March 1, from 10 a.m. until 12 Noon. Anyone desiring to file a claim or obtain information concerning Social Security, is invited to meet with him at this time.

"Are you planning to apply for your social security retirement benefits soon?" the representative asked. It will speed up your claim if you will bring proof of your age; and a copy of your W-2 Form. If you are self-employed, bring a copy of your 1960 Federal income tax return and evidence, such as a cancelled check, showing you paid the social security tax, he explained.

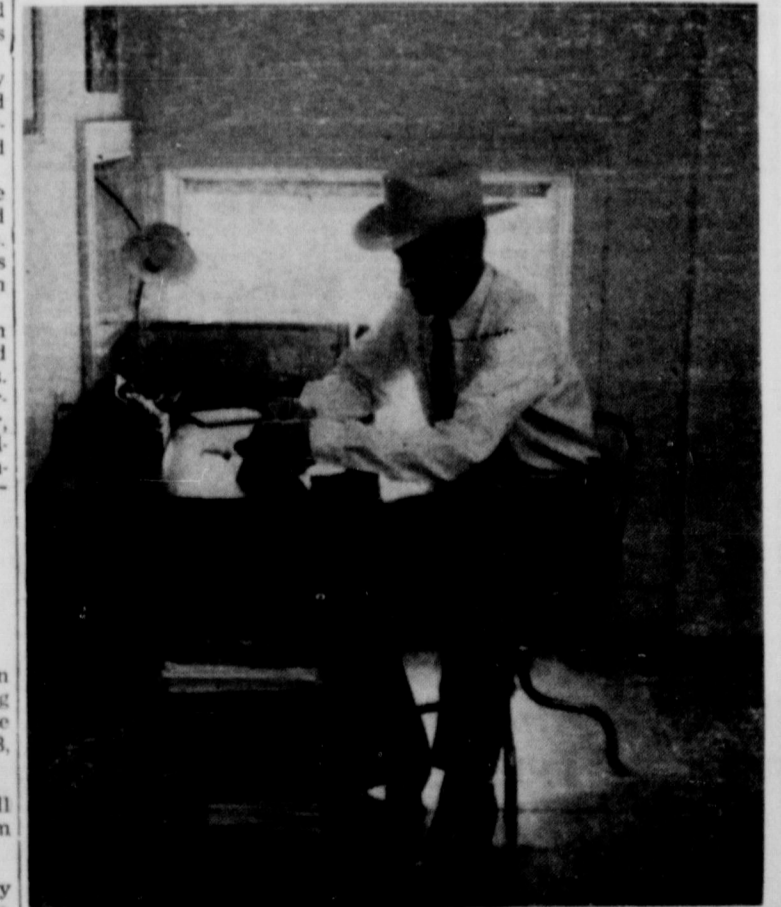

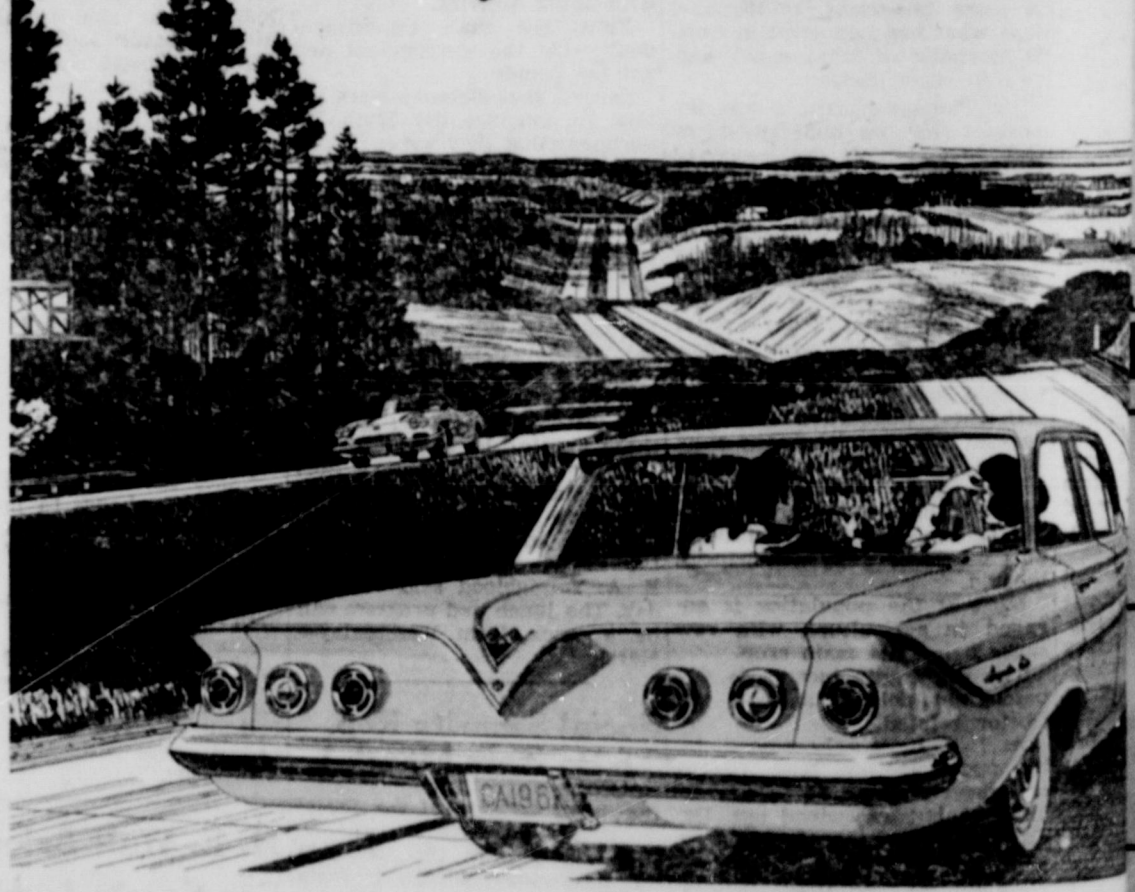
