Western Texas College is in its fourth year of operation and its first year in women's basketball. The men's team won the National Junior College Basketball Championship this past weekend. The women's team posted a 16-5 record and according to Dr. Simpson missed going to the national playoffs by 12 seconds and three points.

KC To Keep Old Highway Open

A group of interested officials met Tuesday at 1:00 p.m. to discuss keeping the railroad crossing on the former highway west of town near the Santa Fe Depot, thus allowing the road to remain open.

On hand for the discussion were L. J. Kirscht, assistant engineer for Santa Fe in Amarillo, Lewis H. White, Texas Highway Department district engineer of Childress, Alvin Alexander, resident engineer for the Highway Department, Knox County Judge Sam E. Clonts, Mayor Buddy Angle, Eddie Shaver, local manager of the Brazos Valley Gin, and Charlie Groves, Farmers Grain Company manager.

With the opening of the new State Highway 222 scheduled Wednesday of this week, a plea to keep the signals and the old crossing was made for one important reason among others, the accessibility to the gin and the grain elevators without having to use the state highway altogether.

Kirscht explained that work was scheduled to begin to install the railroad crossing signals on the new highway, and therefore, the old crossing would have to be barricaded for the time being until signals could be put back into operation there.

Work on the new state highway began last year and the contract was set last April

to Cooper and Woodruff, Inc. of Amarillo. The new highway will offer a much safer route through town without having to make the sharp turn on North Second as it had been necessary to do on the Farm to Market road.

Drive Progresses

The Salvation Army Fund Drive is progressing nicely and should be finished by the end of this week, according to Jeff Graham, chairman of the Local Service Unit.

The drive was kicked off with a breakfast Wednesday morning of last week for all captains and their workers.

Captains this year include Mmes. Mary Margaret Campbell, Patsy Anderson, Imma Jeanne Alexander, Sue Clayton, Ruby Wilson and Judy Anderson.

The money raised during this drive will be used locally to help the less fortunate to help themselves. This aid will be given in the form of groceries, clothes, shoes, utilities, rent, medical aid, or any other aid deemed necessary by the local committee.

In addition to local aid, part of the money will be used to support the following State Agencies; Home and Hospital for Unwed Mothers, Home for Neglected Girls, Home for the Elderly, Rehabilitation Centers for Alcoholics and Drug Addicts, Summer Camp for Boys, and disaster services.

Utilities Office for \$1.75 for adults and \$1.25 for children under 14 years of age. Tickets purchased at the door will be \$2.25 for adults and \$1.75 for children under 14.

Everyone is encouraged to buy tickets early and take advantage of the reduced prices, stated a spokesman for the Lions Club.

KC Invited To Make Application For Funds

Mayor Buddy Angle has been advised that Knox City is one of seven towns invited to file a full application for discretionary Community Development funds.

Other area towns receiving the invitation from the Department of Housing and Urban Development include Cisco, Santa Ana, Sweetwater, Coleman, Brownwood, and DeLeon.

Final date to make formal application is May 15, and the pre-application was submitted to the West Central Texas Council of Governments in Abilene.

The federal money is part of a housing and community development project designed to eliminate urban blight.

Mayor Angle said that Knox City's application for the full discretionary grant in the amount of \$100,000.00 was requested for improvements including water main replacements and extensions, installation of fire hydrants, and demolition equipment.

According to a checklist received, Knox City's pre-application ranked low (1) in competition with other applicant submissions on the substandard housing criterion, but ranked high in competition with other applicant submissions on the (2) poverty criterion; (3) high in competition with other applicant submissions on the rapid population change criterion; and (4) high in competition with other applicant submissions on the imminent threat to health and safety criterion.

Mayor Angle was also recently advised by The Texas Aeronautics Commission in Austin that Knox City's appli-

cation for a \$9,000 grant for the purpose of improving the Municipal Airport had been approved and work has already begun. The matching funds may be in-kind services, and J. V. Carver is

doing the dirt work for the turn arounds. The improvements, in addition to the turn arounds will be sealcote for the runway and the purchase and installation of a new beacon.

Hounds Win First In Albany Relays

The Knox City Greyhound track team won its first meet of the season by taking the Albany Relays last Saturday.

The Hounds scored 104 points to runner-up Aspermont's 73 points in the 16-team field of Class A schools and won six firsts in the 14-event meet.

The Hounds won the 440 relay and placed second in the

mile relay. Al Bateman won the long jump and 100 yard dash and Robert Taylor won the shot and discus. These were our only two double winners. Coach Rogers said.

Eddie (Bo) Johnson won the 440 and set a new meet record with 51.1. Charlie Flye won second in the 100 and fourth in 220, Jerry Stamps sixth in the pole vault, Jimmy Lynn fifth in the 330, and Eddie Martinez won fourth in the mile.

Saturday, the Hounds will be in the Olney relays, and the Knox City Invitational Relays are scheduled April 5.

QUALITY SEED IMPORTANT FOR CROP
The first step to a good cotton crop in planting quality seed, emphasizes a cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. But good seed may be in short supply this year due to unfavorable harvesting weather in many parts of the state last fall. Cotton exposed to weather damage or stored in trailers, racks, or modules when it exceeds 12 percent moisture will suffer a reduction in seed quality. High quality planting seed tolerates cold, wet soil conditions that cause seedling disease. Good seed also means more rapid seedling emergence and growth. If lower quality seed must be used, delay planting until the soil has warmed, avoid planting too deep, and increase seeding rate.

ANTIQUING OR FROSTING FURNITURE

by Nancy Fuhrken

Used and unfinished furniture often looks better antiqued or frosted, rather than just stained. Both techniques are easy enough to apply.

The antiquing or frosting processes both begin with a completely dry enameled piece of furniture.

The prepare a mixture of three tablespoons turpentine, one tablespoon varnish and one teaspoon of oil color. Choose dark oil colors such as raw umber or black if the furniture is to be antiqued. White oil or any colored primer or enamel will give a frosted look.

Apply the turpentine-varnish-oil color mixture with a paint brush, an old hose, cheese cloth, or crumpled paper. Work from the center of a surface to the edges, finishing small sections at a time.

If the furniture has carved surfaces, remove excess glaze from the depressions with a dry brush. When the whole piece has been glazed and has thoroughly dried, apply a water clear varnish to protect it. Avoid ordinary varnish or shellac, for they will show yellow and water respectively.

After the varnish dries, rub the antiqued or frosted furniture with 0000 rated steel wool to produce a stain appearance.

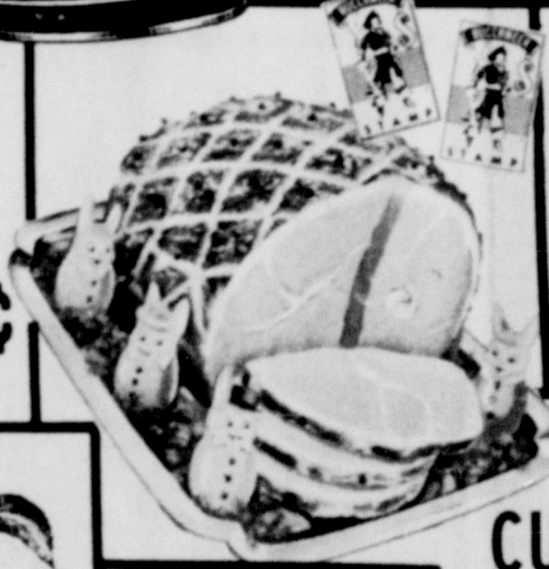

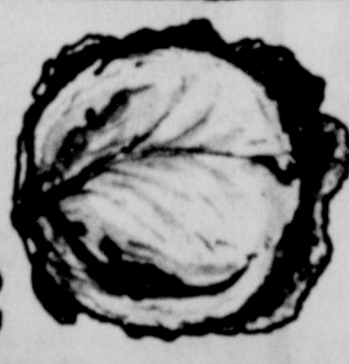

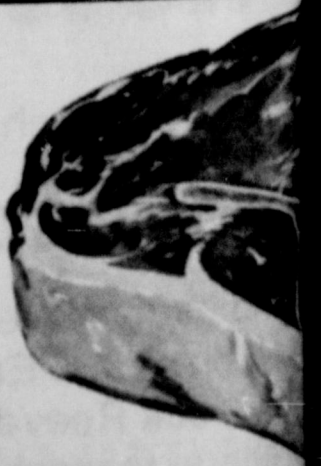
