Greyhounds Show Improvement; To Play Rule Here Friday Night

Benjamin Loses to O'Brien Bulldogs

The O'Brien Bulldogs defeated the Benjamin Mustangs, 25 to 18, last Thursday night, in a hard-fought contest between the two evenly matched teams.

In the first quarter of play the Bulldogs kicked off to the Mustangs and Johnston intercepted a pass on the second play of the game. Samples then carried the ball to the 2-yard line, and Johnston went over for the first touchdown. A pass from Samples to Johnston accounted for the extra point.

Benjamin scored with Hale running the ball over from the five yard line. O'Brien scored again when Samples picked up an incomplete pass behind the line of scrimmage and ran 25 yards, and the half ended with O'Brien 13, Benjamin 6.

In the last half, O'Brien scored when Johnston tossed a 29 yard pass to Oliver, who ran 25 yards for another TD. Then the Bulldogs worked their way down to Benjamin territory and scored on a 30 yard pass from Johnston to Grindstaff in the end zone.

The last score of the game came when Ward broke loose and galloped 30 yards for a Mustang TD.

Fans are invited out tonight (Thursday) when the Bulldogs meet the Mattson Mustangs on the O'Brien field.

After the final gun had sounded, ending what proved to be one of the hardest fought, most spectacular high school football games in this area in many a moon, the score stood: Munday 18 - Knox City 0. To accept this score at face value would be to run the risk of badly underrating the Greyhounds' show last Friday night when they journeyed to neighboring Munday.

It was evident from the start that Knox City was not to be taken lightly by any means. Entering the game a 48-point underdog according to an Abilene sports writer, the locals were determined to give the lie back to their antagonist. This they did time and again. The half-time score of 6-0 was proof at that point that Knox City was not to be considered beaten until the game was over.

It would be a difficult task to tell just where the sudden blossoming of strength came from. For one thing, the team was keyed to a high pitch; they were ready. Perhaps this is the important thing.

As to individual honors among the 'Hounds, again it would be impossible to say. The line was good. It held time and again when only precious yards separated Munday from pay dirt. Trying to go through the center of the line composed of Abe Watson, Dickie Cross, Monroe Thomas and James Jackson was something like butting one's head against a brick wall.

Special notice should be given the game played by the ends, Mark Davidson and Jerry Don Houston. They were in on tackle after tackle and went a long way in keeping the passing attack of the Moguls down to a bare minimum. Notice should be given L. C. Teague, also, for his pass-catching exploits. In the backfield, mentioning only a few, Abe Watson was once again a standout. He plunged through the middle time and time again for five and six yard pickups. Gary White, playing nearly the whole game on both defense and offense, was a standout in his punt returns. He seems the "most likely to get ahead" when given a chance at open field running. And then there was "Killer" Lewis, Ernie Wilson, Jimmy Leach and others who need a pat on the back for their fine display of ability and downright doggedness.

Tomorrow the 'Hounds will play host to the Rule Bobcats who will enter the contest with a fine average of four wins against one loss. Their single defeat was to Munday, 12-0. This would make Knox City, on paper at least, a six-point underdog in the contest, which will be played on the local field beginning at 8 o'clock. This type of comparison is quite prone to misfire, however.

Oil Notes—

Two recent failures in the area were the Frank Wood Associates No. 1 D. H. Henry, conglomerate try about 4 1/2 miles east of town, which was abandoned at 5,847 feet, and Stanolind's No. 1 J. A. Dunnam, in the North Knox City Palo Pinto reef field about 1 1/4 miles north of town, which was abandoned at 5,125.

Only drilling under way in the North Knox City field at the present time is on Stanolind's No. 3 Verhalen. New location staked by the company is the No. 3 Mrs. S. M. Clonts.

West of town, in King county, potential of the Continental Oil Co. No. 6 Alma Orsborn has been announced as 67 barrels of oil and 36 barrels of water pumped in 24 hours.

Potential for the Carey & Christopher No. 2 Mrs. Alma Orsborn has been filed as 124 barrels of oil per day, flowing through 21-64 choke.

In the same area, American Liberty Oil Co. has spotted the No. 7 Hardwick.

Production tests are still under way on the Southwest Natural Production Co. No. 1 Kempner Estate, in the northwest corner of Knox County. On one test, the well flowed and swabbed 70 barrels of oil in seven hours, from the Strawn. Pump has been installed, and tanks set up. This well is 7 1/2 miles north of the Katz pool.

The Sid Katz No. 8 Ed Lewis, in the Katz Strawn Field west of town, is drilling below 4,700 feet.

In the same field, operators are moving rig on location for the No. 13 Lorentzen.

Operators are drilling below 4,300 feet on the T. P. Coal & Oil Co. No. 3 B. B. Campbell, on the Poe - Farmer tract west of O'Brien. Pipe collapsed in this well, and the hole had to be re-entered with a whipstock.

T. P. has staked location for the No. 5 Campbell, on the same 505.84 acre tract.

In Jones county, a wildcat is being drilled on a tract owned by W. E. Clonts of Knox City. At last report the test, the Jones & Stasney No. 1 W. E. Clonts, was drilling below surface.

Extent of the damages caused by the "explosion" of Hoge's Pharmacy during the fire last week appears now to be greater than it was estimated shortly after the fire.

The drug store building itself was almost completely demolished by the blast, which was caused by the intense heat on the south firewall. Paul Hoge, owner, has moved the drug store temporarily to the building next door to McCarty Jewelry, formerly occupied by Model Tailors, and is now open for business in the new location except for his prescription department, which he expects to have in operation by Saturday.

The south wall of City Hardware, adjoining the pharmacy, was badly damaged by the explosion, and owner Otto Lawson says the wall will have to be completely rebuilt and the roof replaced. A temporary, rain-proof wall will be built inside the damaged wall so the store may remain open for business while repairs are under way.

Eddie Bateman, owner of the food lockers where the fire originated, has inventoried the contents of every food locker, and locker customers will recover their losses from insurance companies. A. S. J. Cartwright, Ft. Worth attorney, is here to assist the locker customers in filing their claims of loss. Everyone who suffered a loss was asked to call at Mr. Bateman's temporary office at Egenbacher Implements.

C. A. Reed, owner of City Grocery & Market and the buildings housing the grocery, the food lockers, and the upstairs apartments where he made his home, has an office set up in the building formerly occupied by Biffle Grocery. Mr. Reed has announced no plans for the future, pending settlement of his accounts. His customers were asked to call at his office as soon as possible.

Dan Steakley, local automobile dealer who received two broken legs in the drug store blast, is still in an Abilene hospital. Members of the family say he has been in much pain, but is improving. Steakley will remain in the Abilene hospital at least another week, when new casts will be put on and he will be transferred to the local hospital. He will have to wear casts about four months, it was said.

Theodore Ressel of Benjamin, who was also atop the drug store when the blast occurred, received treatment in an Abilene hospital for a broken hip, and was transferred this week to the Knox County Hospital. Mr. Ressel, an employe of the State Highway Dept. and a member of the Benjamin Volunteer Fire Dept., was manning a hose when he was injured.
