## KC Chief Home From Fire School

Knox City Fire Chief A.T. Drew Holcomb was among approximately 1400 men from Texas and several other states who attended the 43rd annual Texas Firemen's Training School July 16-21 at Texas A&M University.

The school is conducted by the Engineering Extension Service cooperating with Texas Education Agency and sponsored by the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association.

Over 500 highly qualified and experienced instructors and speakers are made available by municipalities, industries, manufacturers, state and federal agencies, and the armed services for the annual school. Equipment and supplies are loaned or donated for this intensive and practical training program.

Mr. Holcomb, owner and operator of Holcomb's Garage takes time away from his business each year to attend the training program as credit is allowed in the city key rate based upon the successful completion of the necessary Fireman (not fire marshal) completes the work, a three percent credit is allowed.

A greater savings to the community than the key rate credit is in the reduction of local fire losses which should be brought about by the use of efficient firefighting methods and fire prevention measures that are emphasized and taught during the school each year.

## New Vocational Program Added To KC Curriculum

Classes in Home Economics Cooperative Education are the most current addition to Knox City High School curriculum, according to a recent announcement by Superintendent W.J. Baker.

These classes afford students of Junior and Senior standing both on-the-job and classroom education in a variety of occupations. Practical work experience is provided the student through part-time employment at some cooperating business within the city.

The course is set up for one or two years and carries two credits each year. Students receive pay comparable to that paid beginning workers in the same occupation.

Typical occupations in the program are art and craft aide, child care aide, companion to elderly, clothing assistant, consumer aide, dietitian aide, fabric coordinator, floral designer, food service employee, home furnishing aide, house-keeping-management assistant,

physical fitness assistant, and tester of foods, equipment or textiles.

The program will operate under the direction of Mrs. Vera Newton, teacher coordinator. Mrs. Newton will be responsible for selection and placement of students and will correlate their classroom and practical education. An advisory committee of local business people will be set up by the school to assist Mrs. Newton in organizing and operating the new program.

The addition of this type of program will do much to provide the youth of Knox City with a well-rounded educational program that will fulfill the need for practical and useful training. It is hoped it will enable a large portion of our students who desire to become occupationally competent to enter full-time employment upon graduating from high school.

Mrs. Newton was in Austin last week attending a related workshop in preparation for the new course.



## People Attends Kentucky Rally

An all but incredible 3,662 Airstream travel trailers showed up at the 15th International Rally, making it the largest such event ever held on the North American continent. The prior attendance record, 3,402 Airstreams, also posted by the Wally Byam Caravan Club, was set in 1970 at Hershey, Pa.

The local trailerists were joined at the rally by enthusiasts from every state in the union, including Alaska and Hawaii, every province in Canada, parts of Mexico and several other countries. They were led by William Schilbneck of Hastings, Mich., 1971-72 International president of the Caravan Club. The trailerists were welcomed to Kentucky at a special luncheon ceremony June 29 by Lieutenant Governor Julian M. Carroll. They then settled down to seven full days and nights of fun through fellowship.

The trailerists quickly formed an "instant city" of neat, carefully laid-out rows, interspersed by "streets" and "avenues". A large central open area was provided where most of the outdoor activities took place.

Except for length, the travel trailer "homes" in Louisville were nearly identical aluminum vehicles, all manufactured by Airstream, the company which sponsors the member-governed Wally Byam Caravan Club. Most of the towing vehicles were passenger cars.

Primarily a get-together and involved, the rally schedule included scores of group events, elaborate and colorful contests, tournaments and displays of handicraft. There were evenings of amateur and professional entertainment and Sunday church services at the site, and a truly huge Independence Day celebration on July 4.

The trailerists, many of them in middle age and retired, were renewing friendships made at other rallies held throughout the continent.

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
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
