Alton Fitzgerald New Commander of American Legion

The new commander will appoint a finance officer at the next meeting.

School Board Releases Financial Statement

Supt. Chas. E. Silk reported to the Knox City School Board Tuesday night on closing-of-school business, and on the vacancies that now exist in the teaching personnel.

Teachers needed are an assistant coach, driver training and science teacher, and a high school commercial teacher. Supt. Silk reported that very little progress has been made in filling the vacancies. Advertisements have been placed in professional publications

and several colleges have been contacted, but only two inquiries have been received.

The superintendent also presented the board a financial statement as of June 1. The statement showed a balance in funds or due from the state a total of \$38,011.40. Salaries for teachers and maintenance personnel up to September 1, and outstanding bills for May total \$26,923.20, leaving a balance of \$11,088.20 for expenses to Sept. 1. Part of this balance, Supt. Silk said, will be used for permanent improvements.

The transportation fund showed a balance of \$1,071.09, and the athletic fund a balance of \$154.21. The lunchroom fund showed a balance of \$1,292.68, but the superintendent said a number of outstanding bills are to be paid from this balance.

A balance of \$4,311.16 was shown in six sinking funds. The building fund showed a balance of \$192,465.60, but expenditures totaling \$14,899.00 were approved by the board Tuesday night, leaving a balance of \$177,566.60. The expenditures included \$31.00 for advertising the bond issue, and \$14,868.00 to Baco Industrial Construction Corp. as the first payment on the base contract.

The board considered and approved current bills totaling \$2,979.06. A contract was awarded Joe Simmons for sanding floors in the grammar school building, at a cost of \$177.00. Finish work will be done by the school's maintenance personnel.

The superintendent was authorized to trade seven old Remington typewriters to Blair-Hamilton Office Supply of Vernon for seven new Royals, for a difference of \$85 a machine or a total of \$595. A contract was awarded Pendley Body Co. of Lubbock, on a bid of \$295, for repairing the 1951 International school bus that was wrecked at a train crossing last winter.

The board also authorized construction of uniform book shelves in the elementary wings and grammar school building at an estimated cost of \$275 to \$300. Material from present book cases throughout the 14 rooms will be used in construction of the new shelves. The shelves will be under the windows, and will be of uniform size and design and can be moved from room to room.

Judge Williams Injured Tuesday In Car-Truck Crash

District Judge Lewis Williams is recuperating in the Knox County Hospital from injuries received in an auto-truck accident Tuesday afternoon.

Judge Williams was returning from Benjamin when his Cadillac collided with a loaded grain truck. Phillip Herring, driver of the truck, was not injured.

The judge suffered a severe head cut, lacerations to his hands, and multiple body bruises.

The accident occurred at the intersection of a farm road with the highway, just north of Jami son Roadside Park.

Wichita Falls Man To Seek Election To State Senate

The Herald was authorized this week to announce the candidacy of Jack Banner, Wichita Falls attorney, for the State Senate, 23rd District.

Following is an open letter from Mr. Banner to the people of Knox County:

Dear Friends: I am a candidate for State Senator from the 23rd District covering Archer, Baylor, Cottle, Foard, Haskell, Hardeman, King, Knox, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young Counties. During the next two months I will be campaigning your community and hope to talk with you personally. Until such time I would like for you to read this letter so as to get acquainted and tell you about myself.

I live in Wichita Falls at 4801 Hollandale. My wife, Ruth, and I have two little girls, Vickie, age 5 and Rosama, age 4. I am a lawyer with an active practice in general matters representing individuals. I graduated from the University of Texas in 1949 with a B.A. degree and received a LL.B. in 1951. Next I received an appointment as Attorney to the Supreme Court of Texas, a position which I held for one year before beginning private practice in Wichita Falls. In 1955 I was elected a City Councilman for Wichita Falls.

Economy in Government In the last six years the cost of operating our State Government has increased more than 300%. As taxpayers we are receiving the same services while paying three times as much for these benefits. It is my hope that by thoughtful

No. 1 Tankersley Has Good Oil Show

Highlighting oil activity in the area this week was the W.W.F. Oil Corp., Lafayette, La., No. 1 Roy Tankersley, an extender to the O'Brien East Strawn pool.

The hole was bottomed at 4,905 feet for completion from the Strawn sand. A three-hour drill-stem test at 4,805 to 4,835 feet had gas at the surface in seven minutes and oil in two hours and 20 minutes. Recovery was 4,200 feet of oil and 630 feet of heavily oil and gas cut mud. Flowing pressure was 200 to 900 pounds, and shut-in pressure in 40 minutes was 1,895 pounds.

Located 3,500 feet north of the O'Brien pool, the project is in Section 195, Block 45, H&TC Survey.

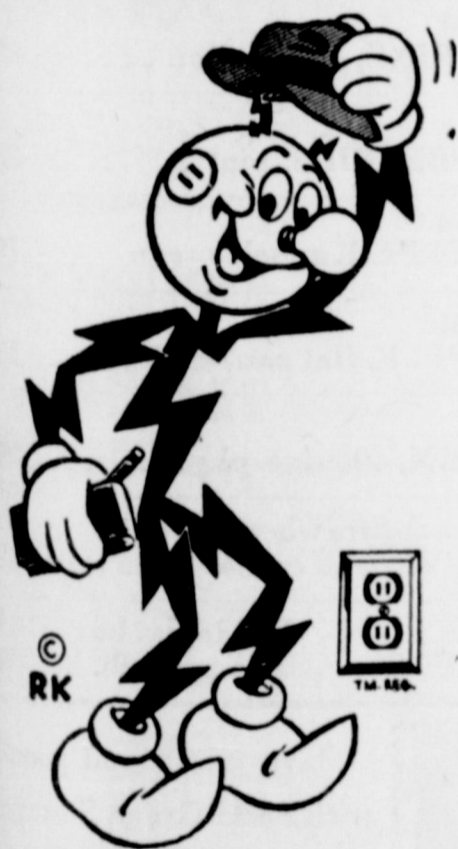

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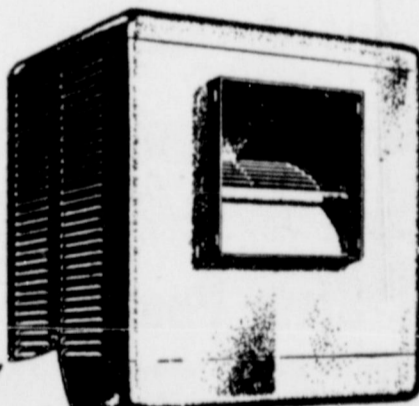

Farm and Ranch Notes

By W. J. BRYAN

Farmers are hearing a lot about hybrid grain sorghums this year, and are wondering what they can expect from them. In order to see what hybrid will do in Knox County, I secured enough seed to plant sixteen one-acre plots over the county, and everyone will have a chance to see them grow this summer.

Africa is believed to be the native home of sorghum, but it has been cultivated since ancient times in the Middle East, India, China and Manchuria. Sorghum was first introduced into the Americas with the slave trade when grain was brought along as food. The first sweet sorghum introduced came from China in 1851, and was called Chinese Amber. Many other present day forage varieties came from Natal, South Africa. White and red Kafir also came from Natal. Several other varieties were introduced from Egypt.

Sorghum, as introduced to this country, was a long season, high temperature crop. Subsequent work by experiment station personnel shortened the growing time requirement, so that now sorghum is grown widely in South Dakota and the higher altitudes of Colorado where early frost is always a hazard.

The last big step in sorghum improvement is that of producing hybrids. Until male sterility in sorghums were discovered, hybrids were not practical. A hybrid is produced by crossing a male sterile female of one strain with a pollen producing male of another. The result is a hybrid, the seed that the farmer plants.

Experiment station tests have shown that hybrids will out-yield common sorghums as much as 30 percent or more. Hybrid seed should be available for all farmers next year.

We have six different varieties

growing in the county this year, with each of the sixteen farmers having one or more varieties.

The hybrids can be observed at the farms of Herbert Partridge, Sunset; Ted Russell, Vera; George Nix, Goree; B. B. Bowden, Munday; Arnold Navraiti, Gilliland; Shorty Kuebler, Rhineland; J. B. Reneau, Munday; League Ranch, Benjamin; Gaylon Scott, Vera; J. C. McGee, Knox City; B. M. Farmer, Knox City; Joe Butler, Hefner; Clyde Hackney, Munday; Chester Bowden, Munday; Doris Dickerson, Munday; and Howard Barnett, Benjamin.

legislation the high cost may be reduced and the money so saved applied to establish a State Farm Program and conserve our Water Resources.

We are all familiar with the shocking Veterans Land Scandals which have cost us as taxpayers more than 1 million dollars. You as a citizen deserve more vigilant representation to prevent this and other similar frauds.

State Farm Aid
At this time the State has no comprehensive farm program. There is no actual program for giving aid or loans to farmers who are in desperate need of help.
