He said that the U.S.D.A. is authorized under current law to provide local groups technical and financial help in conserving and developing natural resources. Groups sponsoring RC&D projects can receive assistance in seeking funds and services from other federal, state, and local sources, Mr. Lieb said.


Farmers Union Men At Austin Meeting

Meeting To Explain Wheat Referendum

A meeting will be held at Seymour on February 24 to explain a wheat referendum for producers in Baylor, Childress, Foard, Hardeman, Haskell, Knox, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young counties. The meeting is slated to begin at 2 p.m. in the Community Room of the Farmers National Bank.

Purpose of the referendum is to raise funds with which to conduct programs of education, research, disease and insect control and marketing relating to wheat, according to County Agricultural Agent Herman H. Collier. Meetings concerning the referendum are required prior to a certification by the state commissioner of agriculture for the Texas Wheat Producers Association to conduct such a referendum.

The program for the upcoming meeting is designed to explain the provisions of the referendum and to give a brief report on the overall wheat industry.

Norman Brants of Vernon, area farm management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be the principal speaker. Representatives of the Texas Wheat Producers Association will also be on hand to answer questions concerning the referendum.

Collier urges all wheat producers in Knox County to attend the meeting so that they will be able to make a knowledgeable choice when election time for the referendum rolls around. A two-thirds majority vote will be required.


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
