

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"AMONG OTHER THINGS ... "

On Thursday, November 16, at 6:40 a.m., in Bonham, Texas, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, Sam Rayburn, died of cancer at the age of 79. Mr. Sam had been ill for several weeks, and his death had come as no great surprise. But people all over the nation and the world, from President Kennedy on down, were greatly saddened.

His funeral, which was as he, simple but dignified, was attended by the President, the Vice-President, two former Presidents, 100 members of the House and 22 senators, to name only a few. But also, besides famous dignitaries, the common folk, the people whom he had known and respected for 49 years were also there.

It was said that when congress adjourned, Mr. Sam went imme diately back to Bonham to be with his friends and neighbors. It was also said that it is easier to find someone in Bonham who hates God and motherhood than to find someone who hated Mr

Rayburn was a Democrat, as he put it, "without any prefix or suffix." But even as he was, he was respected and loved by the Republicans in Washington as much as the Democrats. He always gave everyone their say, and he was always fair minded in his decisions. The record shows that many of his decisions were very non-partisan. Rayburn was mentioned for

the presidency and the vice presidency several times, but as he said, "I was born in the wrong section of the country, and at the wrong time.

Later he jokingly said, "I might have been president if Franklin Roosevelt had not wanted to stay in office forever.'

Of course, no one can be in politics for fifty years without making enemies. Mr. Sam made enemies, but they were few and far between

When Mr. Rayburn died, men who are greatly respected and who hold the highest office in

They said that he had been the greatest living American. They also said that never in all his political career had a dishonest dollar reached his pock ets. As one man put it, "Rayburn was one of the few men in history who combined the character traits of courage, honor, honesty, and integrity with political genius.'

Mr. Sam never lost his sense of dignity. Even in the face of attack, he was one of the most dignified men on Capitol Hill.

He never lost a political race. During the many years he campaigned he never stooped to mud-slinging in his speeches. He was not a dynamic orator, but when he spoke, men listened.

And so he is gone, but he shall not soon be forgotten. His place in history is secure. He



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
