

Knox County Sheriff H. C. Stone Breaks Up Shoplifting Ring With Arrest Of Three Women, One Man

Knox County Sheriff H. C. Stone recently arrested three negro women and one negro man, all of Lubbock, to break up an alleged shoplifting ring.

Baylor County Sheriff Wesley Styles of Seymour said that Naomi Wright Maden, 33, Diane Thomas, 32, Ethel Jean Wilson, 31, and Zack Johnson Jr., 20, have been charged with theft over \$50. in both Baylor and Young Counties.

Sheriff Styles said the suspects were charged with the theft of two men's suits, valued at \$50 each; two men's suits valued at \$40 each, and a pair of ladies' shoes valued at \$10.95 from Bickly's Department Store in Seymour. The alleged theft took place between 5 and 5:30 p.m. on Thursday, May 25.

Prior to the alleged theft in Seymour, Sheriff Styles said the four hit the Man Store in Graham where 23 men's suits were taken, each valued at \$125. In each instance the merchandise was recovered before the respective store owners knew it was missing. Each was notified and identified his merchandise.

Sheriff Stone apprehended the suspects at Benjamin about 6:30 p.m. Thursday, May 25, the same day of the thefts.

Suspects were returned to Baylor County and were arraigned before Justice of the Peace, Pct. 1, Thos. F. Glover, and bond was set on each suspect at \$5,000. Also, bond of \$5,000 was set on each suspect in Young County. The suspects are free on bond awaiting action of the grand jury in each county.

Investigating officers were Knox County Sheriff, H. C. Stone, Sheriff Styles and Baylor Deputy Sheriff James Bright.

Approved Development For 4.5 Miles of Highway Construction For Knox Co.

The Texas Highway Commission, on June 2, 1967, approved development of 4.5 miles of Farm to Market Roads in Knox County as part of the 1967 Texas Farm to Market Program.

District Engineer V. J. McGee of the Texas Highway Department said estimated cost of the work is \$90,000.

The work will be under the supervision of George R. Waik, Resident Engineer.

The work authorized for this county is part of 949.3 miles of Texas Farm and Ranch to Market Roads earmarked for development in the new program.

The project authorized for Knox County extended from end of F. M. Road 2570, 6.1 miles East of State 283, North and East of F. M. Road 267 at Rhineland.

The program lists 228 projects in 166 counties. Estimated cost is \$24.6 million.

New mileage included in the program totals 623 miles. Other mileage was previously designated or is being constructed in stages.

SOCIAL SECURITY PROVIDES DISABILITY PROTECTION

"Some people still have the idea that social security offers protection only for the 'old folks' says Edwin Draughon, manager of the Vernon Social Security office. Actually, insurance for the young working man and his family has been a very important part of the social security program for many years.

One type of protection under social security, according to Mr. Draughon, is in the form of monthly benefits for a person who becomes unable to work because of a physical or mental impairment. The disability does not have to be permanent. If the condition has lasted or is expected to last for 12 months or longer, the worker may qualify for payments. Benefits may be paid each month not only to the disabled person, but also to other members of his family, such as his wife and children.

In addition to meeting the disability requirement, Mr. Draughon said, the disabled person must have worked under social security not less than five years out of the ten year period ending with the date he became disabled.

For old folks only? Not all, emphasized Mr. Draughon, if the two requirements are met, benefits can be paid regardless of age. Any person interested in further information about disability benefits, may call or write the social security office located at 172 Fannin Street, Vernon, Texas, for the booklet "If You Become Disabled."

Nine out of ten families in Knox County have social security survivor protection which can amount to over \$75,000 in benefits if the breadwinner in the family should die, he pointed out.

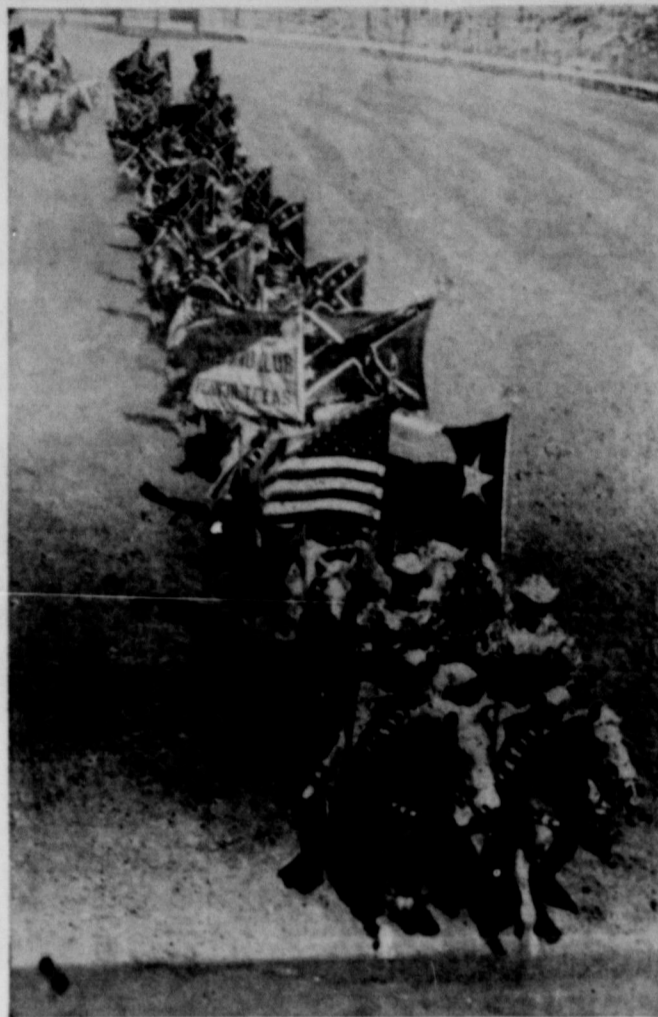
Disability insurance is the other social security program of particular importance to the young worker. After just five years of work under social security, the worker and his family are eligible to receive monthly benefit payments if he should become everly disabled and the condition is expected to last a year or longer.

Mr. Draughon said that "Social Security Information for Young Families" explains in detail survivors and disability protection, what it can mean to a family, and how to make an application should it become necessary. Also included is information on how to check your social security account and the financing of social security.

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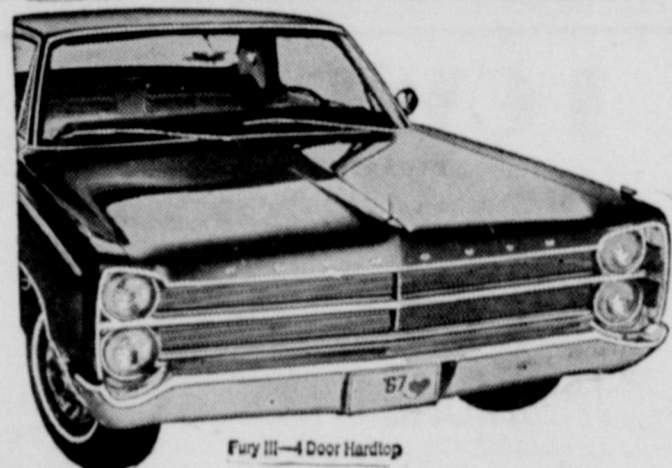

Questions And Answers On IRS Tax Matters

This Column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—I filed for my refund a month ago. Isn't it about time I received it?

A—No, it is still too soon. Look for the refund to arrive anytime after the first of June. Some returns filed at the deadline may not be processed completely till the end of June. If your return is incomplete or contains an error, processing will take longer. There will also be a delay if the return is selected for audit before the refund is issued.

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
