## 'Hounds In Good Shape For Friday Scrimmage At 7:30

According to Coach Charles Hibbitts, 43 Knox City Greyhounds completed their first week of workouts last weekend and are in good shape for the first of the season's scrimmages scheduled for this Friday night, August 28, at Greyhound Stadium.

## Dove Season Opens Tues.

Dove season in this area opens at 12 noon Tuesday, September 1 and lasts through sunset on Friday, October 30.

The daily bag limit this year is 10 and possession limit is 20 with shooting hours being 12 noon to sunset each day.

No hunting will be permitted in game refuges, state and federal parks, game reserves, or within corporate city limits.

Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity and may not be larger than ten gauge. Hunting doves with rifles is also prohibited.

Be sure to secure permission before hunting on private property and remember that shooting on highways and from cars is prohibited.

Favored hunting time is late afternoon and the best hunting spots seem to be grain fields, wild seed areas, and around stock tanks.

## Rain Scattered Here Last Week

Area residents enjoyed a welcome and refreshing rain last Wednesday evening, Thursday morning and Thursday evening. The scattered showers broke the heat wave as well as the long dry spell dumping an accumulation of from .6 on an inch up to three inches.

Mrs. Howard Hurd told this reporter that a total of only .6 moisture was recorded on their farm 6 miles north of town while the Lee Smith place had 2.7 all together. The Plant Center recorded .85 and the greatest amount fell south-east of town where farmers read three inches on their gauges.

Since the showers were so scattered, reports indicate that the grain harvest was slowed very little.

## ASC Election Ballots To Be Mailed Soon

On September 1, ASC community committee election ballots will be mailed to all known eligible farm voters, according to A. J. Navratil, chairman of the Knox County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Farm voters may vote for up to five of the candidates listed, or they may write in their choices on lines provided at the bottom of the ballot. To be counted, all ballots must be properly signed and mailed or returned to the County ASCS Office by September 11. Votes will be tabulated September 15, in the ASCS Office.

In each of the 3 ASC communities in this county, three community committeemen and two alternates will be elected. The candidate receiving the largest number of votes becomes chairman; the second largest vote-getter, vice-chairman; third-high, regular member; fourth and fifth highest become first and second alternates who may serve on the committee if regular members are temporarily absent or if a permanent vacancy occurs.

ficers. They also assist the County ASC Committee in local administration of Government farm programs and help keep farmers informed on how the programs affect individual farm operations."

Any farm owner, tenant, or sharecropper who is of legal voting age may vote if he has an interest in a farm and is eligible to participate in any ASCS program administered in his community. Others who may vote are: spouses of eligible voters; a minor who supervises and conducts the farming operation of an entire farm; a legal guardian who manages a farm for a child; and a person representing a legal entity such as a partnership or corporation.

The ASC committee chairman pointed out that producers who have farm interests in more than one community may select the community in which to vote, but may vote in only one community in the county. Voting by proxy is not allowed. Voters who certify their ballots with an "X" for a signature must do so before a witness and obtain the signature of the witness in order for the ballot to be counted.

A list of known eligible voters is open for inspection at the County ASCS Office. Any person who believes he is an eligible voter but who is not listed should get in touch with the County ASCS Office as soon as possible, Navratil said.

He concluded that any voter who has not received a ballot in the mail within a few days after September 1 should call the County ASCS Office to arrange to receive a duplicate ballot if necessary.

### Aug. 20 Paper Has All 7 Amendments

The seven amendments to be voted on in the General Election November 3, 1970 were printed in last week's paper for the reader's convenience.

With all the amendments appearing in one paper, the voter has a chance to study them and decide how he should vote.

A brief analysis of the proposed constitutional amendments is listed below:

- 1. Censure and removal of judges, justices, and justices of the peace under prescribed conditions.
- 2. Authority for the legislature to enact a mixed beverage law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option basis.
- 3. Establishing a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands based upon the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock or to produce farm and forest crops.
- 4. Reconstitute the State Building Commission in a three-member appointed commission.
- 5. Authorizing any county to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county under certain conditions.
- 6. Increase the value of the homestead exempt from forced sale from \$5,000 to \$10,000.
- 7. Authority to provide for consolidating offices and functions of government and for performance of governmental functions by contract between political subdivisions in any county.

### July Bond Sales Reach 26% Quota

Mr. M. L. Wiggins, chairman of the Knox County Savings Bonds Committee, reported today that sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Knox county totaled \$4,985 during July. Sales for the first seven months were \$41,683 for 26 percent of the 1970 goal of \$160,000.

July sales in Texas amounted to \$15,434,922 compared to \$15,058,788 during the same period of 1969 - an increase of 2.4 percent. Year-to-date sales were \$106,206,174, while the 1969 sales totaled \$104,261,845 - a 1.8 percent increase.

National sales during the month were \$402 million - 1.2 percent above 1969 July sales. During the first seven months sales were \$2.9 billion for 62 percent of the national goal of \$4.7 billion. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Savings Bonds amounting to \$23 million were reported for July, compared to last July's \$19 million.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of July, according to Sergeant J. W. Garner, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in five persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$6,400.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first seven months of 1970 show a total of 42 accidents resulting in no persons killed, 13 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$31,830.00.

**NOTE:** Bag limits of both white-winged and mourning doves may be taken on these dates.

**SHOOTING HOURS:**  
Mourning and White-winged Doves: 12 noon to sunset.

**SPECIAL NOTES:**

- No hunting permit is in game refuges, state and federal parks, game reserves, wildlife corporate city limits or from public roads or road rights of way.
- The intention of one fully feathered wing on dressed doves is required in those counties having a white-winged dove season when both mourning and white-winged doves may be taken. This requirement also applies when doves are imported from Mexico or any foreign country.
- Shoppers must be plugged permanently to three-ball capacity and may not be larger than ten gauge. Hunting doves with rifle prohibited.
- Area closed south and west of a line extending along U.S. Highway 82 from the Green Zapata County line to Mission, and from Mission to the north city limits of Hidalgo via FM 1018 and FM 1926 during the concurrent white-winged and mourning dove season.
