Price Protection For Peanut Growers

Peanut growers were urged to find out about the income protection the Government price support program can offer before they sell their crop.

According to Tommie Harris, chairman, Callahan Co. Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, the average support price for 1959 crop Spanish peanuts has been announced at not less than \$189.83 per ton. The support is available to eligible growers through three methods - farm storage loans, purchase agreements and loans through grower association. Eligible growers are those whose farm acreage of peanuts harvested for nuts does not exceed the farm allotment.

Eligible growers who wish to store the peanuts on their farms may obtain a farm storage loan or enter into a purchase agreement at the County ASC office. Under a farm storage loan, the grower receives the support price (less a service charge) for his crop, which is stored in approved facilities and he may either repay the loan before maturity date and then sell the crop himself, or he may deliver the crop to Commodity Credit Corporation in payment of the loan. Under a purchase agreement, the grower receives no immediate income, but CCC agrees to purchase a stated amount of eligible peanuts at the support price toward the end of the season.

A loan through a grower association may be obtained by an eligible grower by delivering his peanuts to an Approved warehouse. There the peanuts will be weighed and graded, and the loan value determined. The grower should compare the loan value with the amount offered by the buyer and then decide whether to use the loan or sell his crop. The association may later redeem and sell the peanuts, and any profits above cost will be divided among the growers of the peanuts.

Mr. Harris points out that letters are being sent to all peanut growers whose names appear on ASC office mailing list, informing them of the price support protection available on their crop. If a buyer or warehouseman does not furnish loan information and assistance as requested, growers are asked to bring the matter to the ASC office.

"Shower of Stars" shows will be presented Oct. 12, 13, 15, 16, 19, 20 and 21.

Perez Prado, "king of the mambo," and his orchestra will headline the show on Mexico Day, Oct. 12.

Mitch Miller, famous for his recording "The Yellow Rose of Texas" and more recently for his "Sing Along With Mitch" series, will receive the second annual Texas Music Festival Award Oct. 13. He also will conduct a massed band of 4,000 high school musicians who will be on hand for the Fair's Music Festival.

Highway Patrol Reports Accidents

Sergeant R. W. Sosebee of the Abilene District Office of the Texas Highway Patrol, released Taylor, Jones and Callahan Counties Rural Traffic Accident Summary for July 1959. The Highway Patrol in this

area investigated a total of 26 accidents with the following breakdown: Property damage 18, personal injury 7, and fatal accidents 1. Sergeant Sosebee reported a total property damage of \$11,890.00 with 20 persons injured and 2 killed. This is an increase of 6 accidents and the same number of deaths for the same period of July 1958.

Callahan County had the following breakdown: property damage 9, personal injury 2 and fatal accidents none. Property damage amounted to \$5070.00 with 5 injured and none killed. This is a decrease of 3 accidents for the same period in 1958.

During July 1959, the Highway Patrol in the above counties made 591 arrests for the following violations: D.W.I. 5, speeding 370, improper passing 11, wrong side of road 9, defective equipment 20, all other violations 176. 1132 were warned for traffic violations.

Suppose you have applied for a permit to build a house under a city building code. You submit your plans which meet all the requirements of the code but the proper official won't give you the permit and you can't get one elsewhere. You can then ask the court for a writ of mandamus and if you were right and the building official had no grounds for refusal, the court will order him to issue the permit.

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Before the court will issue such a strong command as this, the officer must have refused to do his clear cut legal duty -- not something that he may or may not have to do as part of his job.

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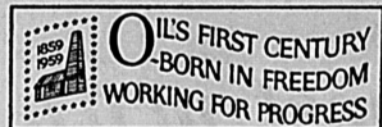

Lost, Stolen or Destroyed

Each of us has either lost a prized possession or wondered what we would do if we did suffer such a loss.

Workers who are 65 years of age or over (women age 62 or over) may be suffering a loss of benefits if they do not know the meaning of retirement as it pertains to the social security law.

Retirement, as defined in the social security law, does not mean that you must be completely inactive, but rather that you are:

1. Working for wages or self-employment income of not over \$2080.00 OR

2. You are age 72 or over (in which case amount of earnings has no effect regardless of how much you earn).

Individuals who earn over \$2080.00 in a year may still draw their social security benefits for any month in which they neither earn over \$100 nor render substantial services in self-employment, regardless of their total earnings during the year.

If you have reached retirement age and have not as yet checked with the Abilene social security district office, you should contact them for an explanation of your individual case. You will be advised as to which income is included in your earnings and whether or not you will lose monthly payments by not making application for your benefits at that time.

Personnel of the Social Security Administration would like to know that everyone in their district is receiving all of the benefits to which they are entitled; however, this cannot be accomplished if you do not contact them for advice on your own account. It is up to you to see that you are not the loser.

County Agent's News

The 1959 hunting season is just around the corner and so are a lot of hunting accidents. There is not a deer, turkey, duck, dove or quail in Texas worth the price of a permanent injury or death to a hunter. As we enter the new hunting season, it is wise to consider these points:

1. Keep weapon unloaded until actually hunting in the field.
2. Know the capabilities and proper operating procedure of your weapon.
3. Never cross a fence or climb a tree with a loaded weapon.
4. Alcohol and gun powder do not mix.
5. Keep weapons away from children.
6. Be positive of your target before you shoot. Livestock and fellow hunters are always out of season.
7. Be familiar with hunting regulations and obey them.
8. Respect the rights and properties of the landowner on whose land you hunt. You may want to hunt there next year.
9. Above all, see that fellow hunters respect and obey the same rules that you observe; you will have a better chance for survival if they do.

Along the same line of safety we might consider swimming and boating safety. Each year over 1100 rural residents are drowned, and a large majority of these drownings could be prevented by observing a few simple safety rules. Edwin Cooper, Extension Wildlife Specialist, lists these ten rules for water safety:

1. Always find out how many passengers a boat can safely carry, and never exceed this number.
2. Always carry an extra paddle in the boat, in case one is broken or lost.
3. Before leaving shore, be certain you ask an informed person about hazards in the lake or stream, such as location of swift water, whirlpools or hidden obstructions.
4. Always wear shoes and clothing that can be removed easily in case the boat sinks or capsizes.
5. Have a life preserver for each person in the boat, particularly non-swimmers.
6. When using a motor, make sure it is the proper size and horsepower for your particular boat.
7. Be as cautious when steering a boat as you would when steering a car, and learn and observe the rules of water such as speed limits, yielding right of way, and forbidden zones.
8. Don't stand in a boat unless necessary and then be careful of your balance.
9. Always wear clothing that will protect you from sunburn, since sunlight is intensified by reflection off the water.

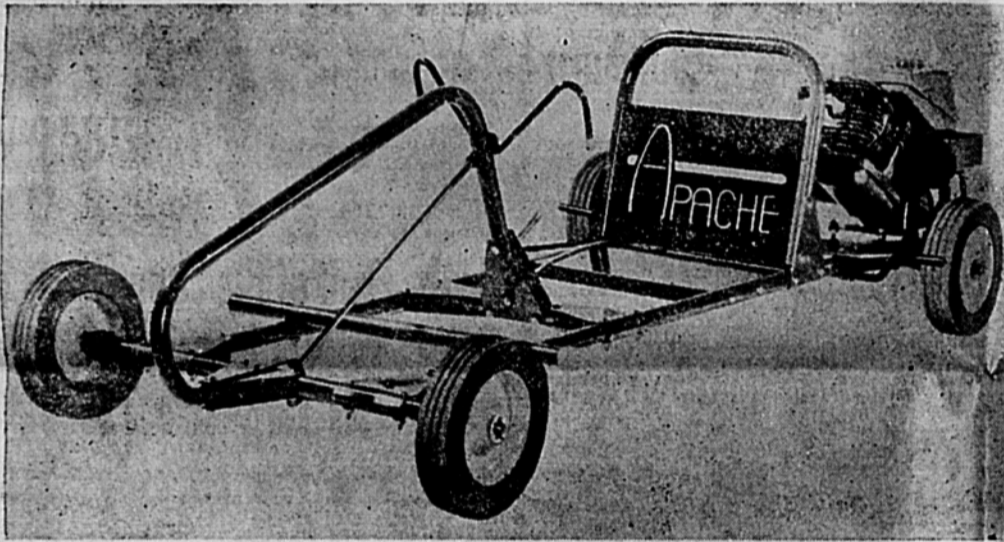
