When the flood of 1913 had laid low all standing crops and much of the wealth in this vicinity, it was apparent that something must be done. Otherwise, this fertile valley might have to be abandoned to the time the Federal government was not interested in flood con-The Constitution of Texas contained such restrictive provisions that local taxing agencies were powerless to cope with the burden. Spurred by necessity the Brazos Valley people, with the cooperation of those in other watersheds, inaugurated a movement which resulted in the adoption in 1917 of the Conservation Amendment to the Constitution. For the first time the control, preservation and distribution of storm and flood waters became a duty of the State and limitations were removed to permit

to keep the flood waters off the lands in cultivation. The construction of levees with local money was found to be an expensive luxury. Frequently nan-made levees were inade quate to hold back the flood orrents of the Brazos River. Everyone realized that the most adequate method of flood control was in the construction of storage reservoirs, but these could not be financed at the

expense of local communities.

Again at the behest of Brazos flood-sufferers, a few years after the adoption of the conservation amendment the Legislature of Texas appropriated for a complete survey of the Brazos River and its trib Insofar as the Brazon River was concerned the survey designed to determine methods to prevent or to alleviate the damage from recurring floods in the lower reaches and the most economical uses to be made of stored flood and storm waters. Based on information obtained in the comprehensive survey, the Brazos District was created by the Legislature in 1929. This was the first time a soveriegn state entrusted to a district the administration of and private rights to stored flood and storm waters throughout the watershed of a mighty river. The law creating the Brazos District has been the model for so-called authority legislation enacted later by Congress and other states.

The district contains approx imately 45,000 sq. miles, substantially all of the area in the watershed and its tributaries, The river has its source about 40 miles northwest of Clovis in New Mexico and extends in a southeasterly direction approxmately 1300 river miles Freeport. Within the boundaries of the District are all or parts of 65 counties. This means about one-sixth of the State of Texas is comprehended within ts boundaries; approximately one-fourth of the people of the State of Texas reside in the district. It is governed by 21 diectors appointed by the State Board of Water Engineers with approval of the Governor of the State. The term of a director is six years. Several of our directors have served since the district was created in 1929.

When the 1929 Act had been passed, the district had plenty of authority to construct flood control and conservation dams and to make the stored water useful to municipalities, irrigaion districts, manufacturing enterprises and to develop hydroelectric power from the falling water. But it had no mone with which to build or to oper

Down in this section the planters wanted to keep the water off their lands, to save the lives of their tenants, and prevent damage to their crops and livestock. In the upper reaches of the Brazos water shed, there was a distinct short age of water. Thus the people in the upper reaches and the people in the lower reaches had mmon interest in evolving a lan which would store the waer for uses where it might be rgently, needed, at the same ne mitigating the severity of he intermittent floods. Due to he configuration of land in he district, all of the dam sites on the main stem of the river are found in the country north of Waco. That also is the sec tion in which the water shortage is emphasized. The problem would be greatly simplified if by constructing dams in North Texas only we could store all of the waters which cause the floods in the lower reaches. Obviously, the problem is not that simple, but through the construction of such dams we can prevent floods caused by waters falling below Waco by virtue of the fact that the upper dams will be so operated as to hold back waters falling n the upper watershed until the flood waters originating be ow Waco shall have had as opportunity to reach the Gulf. The ideal method of conserv-

ing the storm waters which fall the semi-arid or upper part of the district would be to trap each drop of water on the land where it falls. Those are the lands which need the water. To the extent possible, we are trying to do that very thing. We are encouraging terracing, the construction of small tanks and are co-operating with local communities in the actual construction of small municipal resorvoirs. The district is cooperating fully with the Soil Conservation Service of the Department of Agriculture and with the Bureau of Reclama-

#### Health Officer Lists Precautions In New Epidemic

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued the follow ing statements and suggestion concerning the control and pre vention of poliomyelitis which will be given persons holding is now occurring in certain sec

Until recently it was general ly believed that this infection is transmitted by means of dis These photographs are 22 x 16 charges from the respiratory inches in size, and will serve tract. It is now believed that as a valuable souvenir of the poliomyelitis may be another of the several gastrointestinal It is stressed that there is no infections. Therefore, control measures must include cleanup campaigns and improve ments in sanitation.

Strict sanitary measures must be observed in all communities should be Stringent efforts made to eliminate the house fly and to destroy its breeding All mosquitoes and places. mosquito breeding places must eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems immediately. Safe water supplies must be assured. adequate municipal sewage disposal systems are not in operation, it is vitally important to promote and maintain sanitary septic tanks and outdoor privies.

All swimming pools should under rigid supervision, maintain those standards approved by the Texas State Department of Health. This necessarily includes maintenance of proper chlorine level. Where standards are not maintained those pools should be closed immediately.

All raw foods and should be washed thoroughly before use and protected from flies, filth and insects. and food handling establishments' should adhere strictly to the State Law concerning the sterilization and utensils. Those restaurants with insufficient personnel to maintain approved sanitation should close two hours a day so that employees can assist in maintaining cleanliness and high sanitary standards.

Every effort should be made secure approved milk. Rats nd mice should be eliminated. Maintain in the home the same nitary s'andards that are nessary in community Particular attention should be paid to personal hygiene. Exreta from cases and contacts hould be handled and disinected with the same scrupulcare as in typhoid fever or bacillary dysentary.

Over-exertion should be avoided. Children should not visit homes where there is illness. Polio cases should be quarantined for 14 days and adults who work in food establishments should be particularly instructed in personal hygiene. It is advisable to reduce to a minimum human contacts, especially in children during an outbreak of this disease. It is not advocated that schools, churches, and theaters be closed.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. When suspicious symp toms appear, a doctor should be called immediately.
