

Nine Candidates in Race For Five Alderman Jobs

Only 1 Candidate Filed to Date in Trustee Election

With the deadline for filing only 12 days away, only one candidate had filed for a place on the board Wednesday, according to Horace Finley, secretary of the board.

Election will be held Saturday, April 2, and deadline for filing is Tuesday, March 22 at 6 p. m. Candidates must file with Finley, who has the petitions and affidavits on hand.

Guy Robinson, whose term as a member expires, has filed for re-election. Another place to be filled is now held by R. B. Howell, who has not filed for re-election.

Trustee elections will also be held in other school districts in the county April 2, and members of the County School Board will be elected in commissioners' precincts 1 and 3. Incumbents are Ben Farmer in Precinct 1, which includes Knox City, and Hewitt Simmons in Precinct 3, Gilliland and Truscott.

Benjamin Approves \$135,000 Bond Issue For Water Supply

A \$135,000 bond issue was approved by voters Saturday to give Benjamin an additional supply of water.

Ninety-five votes were cast for the issue and three against it. About 50 percent of the voters in Knox County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, which comprises the Benjamin School District, cast ballots in the election.

The bond issue will be used to drill wells eight miles southeast of Benjamin and to construct a pipeline from the wells to Benjamin.

Freese and Nichols, Ft. Worth engineers, are completing plans for the project.

The water district was formed by the city and school district to ease Benjamin's water shortage.

Election of all five aldermen was made necessary by the fact that Knox City changed to the aldermanic form of government in a special election last July. Coats was city commissioner before the change, while Shannon, Green and Graham were elected in July to serve until the regular election.

A six-year-old Oklahoma girl was killed and five other persons injured when a trailer broke loose from an automobile and crashed into another car two miles southeast of Goree on U. S. 277 Sunday afternoon.

Judy Diane Gordon was dead when ambulances arrived on the scene. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Russell Gordon of Loco, Okla., and brothers Larry, 12, Gary, 7, and sister Kay, 10, were hospitalized.

According to reports, a trailer broke loose from a car driven by Mr. and Mrs. Willie A. McCoy and a brother, Wayne McCoy, and crashed head-on into the Gordon car.

Gordon was hospitalized at Seymour with a crushed chest. Mrs. Gordon and the three other children were in the Knox County Hospital, the mother with severe lacerations on her face. Larry received a cut lip, Gary suffered a back injury and Kay suffered facial bruises.

The Gordons were accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Don Griffith, who were not injured.

School Census Shows Slight Increase

The Knox City Independent School District had a slight increase in the 1955 school census over 1954, final tabulation of the 1955 census showed.

Total figure is 555—six more than last year's 549. The number of white children counted remained the same as last year, 506, and the increase was in colored children. Last year 43 colored children were listed, and this year the count was 49.

Words to be used in the contest are from the pamphlet "Words for Champions," furnished by the Times Publishing Co. The contest will be in oral spelling.

Complete rules will be sent to each school, Mr. McGaughy said.

License Examiner Is Guest Speaker At Lions Club

Harold Lanham of Vernon, driver's license examiner for the Department of Public Safety, was principal speaker Wednesday at the weekly meeting of the Knox City Lions Club.

Lanham gave a brief history of the driver's license program, and told of some of the measures being taken to make highway travel safer.

The patrolman said he expects higher charges to be put on licenses in the near future, and the additional revenue will be used to employ more patrolmen.

Also a speaker at the club was Tom Craddock of Seymour, head of the Rural Electrification Association. Mr. Craddock said REA crews are busy installing three-phase power lines in the Knox City area, and the lines will be expanded as rapidly as possible. Two crews are now working and Craddock hopes to get a third one going soon.

The new power lines will be of great benefit to farmers in the area, he said, because REA electricity is the most economical way to pump water for irrigation purposes.

Rev. Floyd Bailey, president of the club, said the Lions Broom Sale will be held Wednesday, April 6. Club members will call at every home in the Knox City, O'Brien and Benjamin area with brooms and other products made by blind workers in Texas. Half of the proceeds will go to the blind workers, while half will remain with the club to be used in civic projects.

Dist. 11-B Volleyball Contests to Be at O'Brien and Vera

The District 11-B High School Boys Volleyball tournament will be held at O'Brien Monday and Tuesday, March 14 and 15, with the first game beginning at 6:45 Monday between Mattson and Weinert. Benjamin and O'Brien boys will meet in the second game and Knox City will play Munday in the third game of the tournament.

Other teams in the district are Goree, Vera and Rhineland.

The Grade School Boys Volleyball tournament will be held at Vera on the same date. Knox City and Paint Creek will play in the first game, beginning at 6:45. The O'Brien boys will play Munday in their first game, and Benjamin will play the winner of the Knox City-Paint Creek game. Other teams are Rule, Vera, Goree and Weinert.

If the Salk Polio Vaccine is licensed by the Federal Government, Knox County doctors and nurses will be ready to vaccinate every school child in the county in the first and second grades. Dr. D. C. Eiland, County Health Officer, said this week.

Use of the Salk vaccine hinges on the results of calculations now under way at the Poliomyelitis Vaccine Evaluation Center, directed by Dr. Thomas Francis, Jr., at the University of Michigan. Carefully checked records of 1,830,000 school children who participated in the nationwide field trial sponsored by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis last year will show if the vaccinated children escaped paralytic polio attack.

If the records show that the vaccine works, and it is licensed by the government, the National Foundation is ready to furnish vaccine for 9,000,000 school children throughout the nation.

"We will be ready to vaccinate Knox County children as soon as we receive the vaccine," Dr. Eiland, who will be in charge of the program in the county, said Wednesday. "Since three shots are required over a five-week period, the time element underscores the need for early planning, as we want to get the vaccinating completed before the polio season begins."

Children in the first and second grades were selected because of the high incidence of polio in their age group, Dr. Eiland pointed out.

Parents will have to sign a request for their children to receive the vaccine, the health officer said. Forms for the requests will be sent to the parents through the schools. There will be no charge for the vaccine, he added, and members of the medical profession, who will give the vaccine, will not charge for their services.

"We are going ahead with plans for the vaccinations before we know if the vaccine will be licensed because if it is approved, we want to protect as many children as possible before the polio season begins," Dr. Eiland said. "If we get the green light, this will not be another test—it will be the first use of a newly established preventive measure."

Night Track Meet Planned at O'Brien

Elvin Mathis, O'Brien athletic coach, announced plans this week for a "Night Track Meet" to be held at O'Brien March 29.

"One reason for scheduling the meet at night is to give many people who hold jobs a chance to see some good running," Mathis said. "Another reason is to take advantage of the weather, which is often better at nightfall; and still another reason is to break the meet into two sessions, neither too lengthy, so that coaches, boys and fans will still be enjoying the races at the end of the meet."

Schools invited to participate are Benjamin, Vera, Goree, Weinert, Mattson, Paint Creek, Munday, Rochester, Rule, Aspermont, Bronte, Lueders, Avoca and Knox City.

A two-hour afternoon session will begin at 3:30. The evening events will begin at 7.

Mr. Satterwhite will be in the ASC office in Knox City on Tuesday of each week and in the Seymour office each Friday.

Herman A. Reeves has recently been employed by the FHA as assistant Emergency Loan Supervisor, with headquarters in Seymour. Along with his other duties, Mr. Reeves will be working on irrigation loans in Baylor, Knox and Haskell counties. He was formerly with the FHA and the Soil Conservation Service, and has had several years experience with irrigation in Texas and Arizona.

Mr. Reeves is a graduate of Texas Tech, Lubbock, where he majored in Agriculture.

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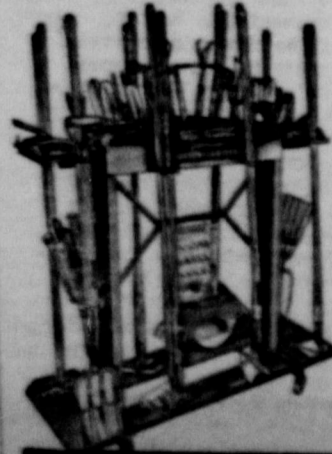

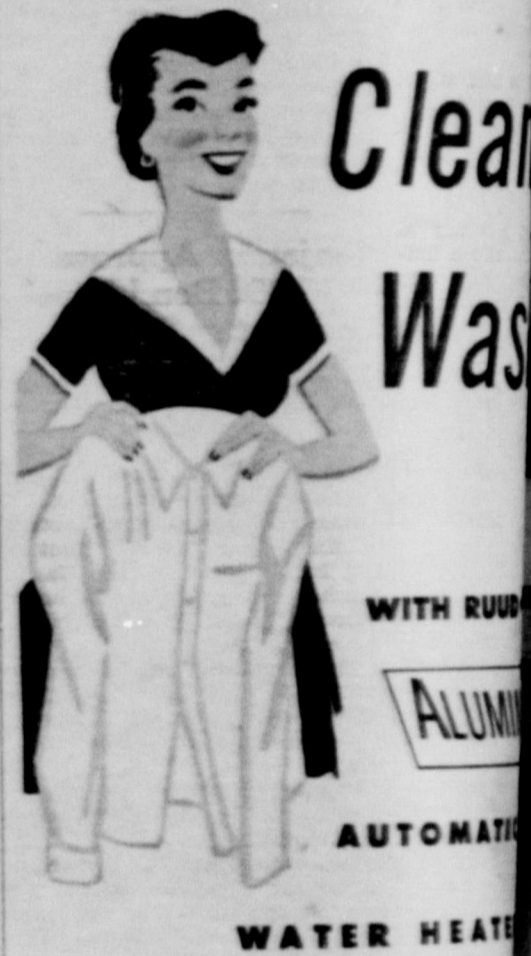

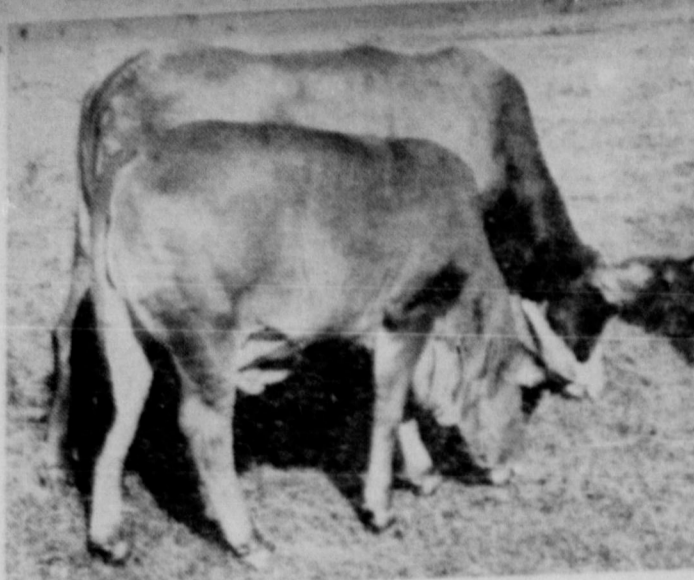

More Beef With Brahman Blood

Earlier, she had produced 16 quarter-Brahman calves by Hereford bulls, averaging 535 pounds. The eleventh calf, shown here, born in February, weighed 550 lb. August 2.

Keith Crouch, superintendent of the station, said the August weighing was 50 pounds per head lighter than the average for the station's 13-year history, due to drouth. The weaning weight of this calf pushed the total calf production to near 6000 pounds.

Said Professor J. K. Riggs of the Texas A & M College department of animal husbandry: "The cow is living evidence that long, productive life, regular calving, heavy weaning weight and environmental adaptability can all be rolled into one with a very good calf thrown in." Time was when there was talk about the "minimum amount of Brahman blood required for adaptability" to Texas conditions. Now ranchers are discovering the more Brahman blood they have in their cattle the more calves they have to sell and the heavier the calves are at weaning.

Haskell Teachers Hear Vernon Man

"The Teaching of Citizenship" was the theme of the recent meeting of the Haskell County Teachers, held in Sagerton.
