Mrs. Warren Dies Tuesday

Funeral services for Mrs. Evelyn Warren, 90, who died Tuesday at 5:50 a.m. in the Knox County Hospital following a brief illness, were held Wednesday morning at 10:00 o'clock in the First Unit Methodist Church.

Officiating was the Rev. James Patterson, pastor. Burial followed in the Merkel Cemetery under the direction of Smith Funeral Home.

Mrs. Warren was born July 6, 1886, in Waker, Missouri. She married E. Q. Warren March 21, 1921, in Marshall, Missouri, and they moved to Knox City that year. Mr. Warren died here March 8, 1969.

Mrs. Warren, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Williams, began her education at the age of four. Her father was a teacher and postmaster at Merkel. After she graduated at the age of 14, she began her formal education in Missouri.

Her first teaching job was in Merkel before she moved to Knox City. She taught music for many years, retiring only a couple of years ago.

Mrs. Warren was the church organist for a number of years and taught the Adult Sunday School class until a few months ago.

Mrs. Warren was active in church, community, and civic affairs. She held honorary membership in the Music Teachers Association of Abilene for work she had done in supporting the organization. She also was chosen to appear in this year's Who's Who in the Women of America.

She was a member of the First United Methodist Church.

Survivors include three nephews, Fred Warren of Knox City, Richard T. Pence of Charlotte Harbor, Florida, and William H. Pence of Merced, California; and two nieces, Mrs. Robert H. Thompson of Sand Lake, Michigan, and Mrs. Odell Carver of Knox City.

Family members requested that memorials be made to the First United Methodist Church Building Fund.

Pallbearers were Joe M. Clonts, Howard Hendrix, Jeff Graham, J. E. Touchstone, Fred Warren and Odell Carver.

City Races Close In Saturday's Election

Elected to the two seats on the City Council were incumbent Vernon Bridges with 182 votes and Mrs. Cornie Covey with 167. Incumbent A.P. Denton was defeated by 10 votes, with 157.

Carolyn's Chatter

LEARNING TO COOK WITH MICROWAVE

Now that you and eight million other people in the world are the proud owners of a microwave oven, maybe you're wondering how to use a conventional cookbook for this new, fast "miracle" cooker.

Microwave ovens are more popular due to changing lifestyles, the energy crisis, public education and awareness.

Manufacturers continually are improving the microwave oven so it will perform a greater variety of jobs.

"Time" is the major factor in adjusting to microwave cooking, but there are several other techniques that will make the change easier. Microwaves are produced in the magnetron of the oven. They are directed into the oven cavity by a stirrer, rotating blade or fan.

It's difficult to distribute the microwave evenly into all parts of the oven, so the cook must do one of two things: place food in a round container rather than a square one, because the food cooks from the outside toward the center and foods cooked in square dishes tend to become overdone at the corners. Or, the cook can use the "rotation technique" in which the dishes are rotated one-fourth turn about halfway through the cooking time.

Another adaptation is necessary because microwave causes carry over cooking to occur. That means after the food is cooked in the oven, and removed from it, it continues to cook.

To allow for this, closely follow recommended cooking time, and remember it may be necessary to stop the oven a few minutes before the food looks done. After the food has rested for several minutes, and it still doesn't look done, then extra cooking time can be done as needed.

Still one other adaptation is reduction of conventional recipe liquids by at least one-fourth to keep the food from being too soupy.

Browning or "crisping" breads or crusts require another special, but easy step.

Microwave ovens normally don't brown food, nor does moisture evaporate. So microwave cooking alone will not make a pie crust or loaf of bread crisp. However, good results are possible with a combination of microwave and conventional methods. For instance, when baking bread, you could cook it for eight minutes in the microwave and then 10-12 minutes in a conventional oven. This same loaf of bread would take about an hour to bake in a conventional oven, compared to 18 minutes with a combination of methods. Pie crusts baked by a combination of methods would take half as much time as one baked in the conventional oven alone.

It only takes a little practice for most homemakers to adapt the family's favorite recipes to microwave cooking. But first, it's easier to use the manufacturer's cookbook provided with the new oven.

Vegetables cooked by microwave are a real success. Use just a minimum of water and maximum speed so that the vegetables stay bright in

color, ripe and crisp.

Here are some recipes for use in a microwave oven.

STUFFED WINTER SQUASH

Squash: 1 winter squash (1 lb.)
Cook 8 minutes per pound. Remove from oven, wrap in foil, let stand 7 to 10 minutes.

Filling:
1 1/2 C basic rice pilaf
1/2 C cottage cheese of Ricotta Cheese

1 egg

4 cheddar cheese strips

Cut squash in half lengthwise, remove seeds. Fill each half with rice, cottage cheese strips on each half; return to oven 1 minute.

Basic Rice Pilaf:

1 C water

1 T butter

2 tsp chicken bouillon

1 tsp minced onions

1 C minute rice

1 tsp sweet basil

Combine water, butter, bouillon, parsley, and onion in casserole. Cover. Cook 3 minutes (or until boil). Remove from oven. Add rice. Stir together. Cover 7-10 minutes. Serves 2.

CHILLI CON CARNE

1 lb ground beef

1/2 C chopped onion

1/2 C chopped green peppers

1 (16 oz) can tomatoes, cut up

2 (16 oz) cans dark red kidney beans, drained (optional)

1 (8 oz) can tomato sauce

1 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

1-2 teaspoons chili powder

In a 3-quart casserole, cook meat, onion, and green pepper by microwave for 5 minutes until vegetables are tender, stirring once. Stir in remaining ingredients. Cover; cook by microwave for 15 minutes, stirring once. Serves 6.

SERVE CREPES FOR EASY-BUT ELEGANT DINING

Delicate crepes are "in style" for easy-to-make, fun-to-serve meals.

These tender, thin pancakes with delicious filling or savory sauces add a fancy -- but easy -- touch to any meal.

Crepe batter is a smooth mixture of flour, eggs, milk, salt and melted fat or cooking oil -- and the dessert variety also contains a minute amount of sugar. Crepe variations using either cornmeal, whole wheat or cocoa can complement special fillings.

For cooking, electric crepe pans or griddles are available, but any six-inch pan will work as well.

To make these thin pancakes in a skillet, hold the heated skillet with one hand and pour about two tablespoons of crepe batter into the pan. Rotate the pan quickly so batter covers the bottom of the pan in a thin, even layer. Return skillet to heat and cook 45-60 seconds.

Crepes can be folded many different ways -- most cookbooks show directions for this step.

A bonus to the ease of

fixing crepes is that they do not have to be made the day they are to be served. Make them a day, week or months in advance. Separate each crepe with waxed paper, wrap in freezer, vapor-moisture proof paper and freeze.

Try this basic crepe recipe that features a creamy filling and fresh raspberry accent.

Basic Dessert Crepes

1 C all-purpose flour

1 1/2 C milk

2 eggs

1 Tbs. sugar

1 Tbs. cooking oil

1/8 teaspoon salt

In a jar combine flour, milk, eggs, sugar, oil and salt; put lid on jar and shake until blended. Let the mixture remain at room temperature for 1 hour. Cook crepes in greased skillet. Invert pan on paper towel; remove crepe. Makes 16 to 18 crepes.

Creamy Fillings

1 C sour cream

3 oz. cream cheese

2 Tbs. powdered sugar

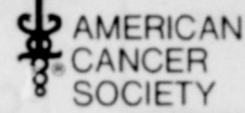
2-3 drops Kirsch (optional)

Roll crepes by rolling back side up like an enchilada. Top with frozen or fresh raspberries.
