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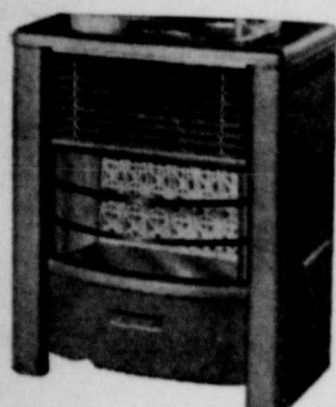

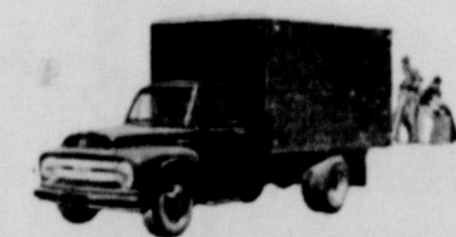

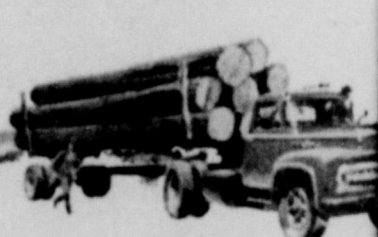

POSTMASTER RETURNS FROM NATIONAL CONVENTION

Jeff Graham, local postmaster and vice president of the Texas Chapter, National Association of Postmasters, returned Sunday from San Francisco, Calif., where he attended a convention of the national organization, October 25-29.

Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield and other officials of the Postal Dept. were present for the five-day convention, as well as several congressmen and senators.
During the convention, Graham said, department officials explained plans for the reorganization of the postal service. These plans, which were scheduled to go into effect Nov. 2, included the setting up of 11 or more regional offices over the nation. These offices are expected to facilitate operation of the service by eliminating correspondence to and from Washington. They will also "bring the postal department closer to the people" and will be an incentive to postmasters, since vacancies in the regional offices will be filled from the ranks of postmasters through the Merit System Council.

Postmaster General Summerfield reported that the postal department deficit had been cut \$1 million per working day. Steps to reduce the deficit included shifting airmail subsidies to the Civil Aeronautics Board and charging all government mail, including franked mail, to the various government departments. In the past, this mail has been carried free and added to the postoffice deficit. The deficit was reduced a further \$182 million by an increase in rates on parcel post and international mail.

Graham said he also learned at the convention that no routes will be consolidated until the communities affected have been notified and all objections have been heard and considered.

In the third period Murl Feemster scored from 20 yards out and Coffman passed to Hardin to boost the margin for Vera to 22-12.
Johnston scored the final tally for O'Brien in the last seconds of the game with Raymond Lancaster kicking the extra point.
