NOTICE OF HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT

The Texas Highway Department offered an opportunity for a public hearing to be requested by publication on January 13 and January 20, 1972, of a notice reporting the proposed improvement of State Highway 283, extending from Benjamin North 7.6 miles, in Knox County. The proposed highway project will pass through a portion of the City of Benjamin, beginning at the intersection of U.S. 82 and State Highway 283, and extending to the North City Limit of Benjamin.

No requests for a public hearing were received; therefore, the District Office of the Texas Highway Department at Childress, Texas, has submitted all of the engineering data and information received in connection with the development of this project for approval of the proposed route and design by the Administration of the Texas Highway Department.

The project consists of widening, reconditioning, and resurfacing the existing 22-foot pavement to provide two 13-foot lanes and 9-foot paved shoulders. The existing 24-foot bridge on the South Wichita River is to be widened to 45 feet.

The route of the proposed project is along the present location of State Highway 283 and there will be no displaced persons or businesses on the project. The right of way width will remain at 100 feet in the City Limits of Benjamin. On the rural section, the right of way width on the east side of State Highway 283 will remain at the present minimum width of 70 feet; on the west side, a minimum right of way width of 75 feet will be required.

Maps, drawings showing geometric design, environmental studies, and all other available data concerning the development of this project may be inspected and copied at the office of George R. Wall, Supervising Resident Engineer, Monday, Texas. 4-20 tlc

The Texas Highway Department offered an opportunity for a public hearing to be requested by publication on January 13 and January 20, 1972, of a notice reporting the proposed improvement of State Highway 283, extending from Benjamin North 7.6 miles, in Knox County. The proposed highway project will pass through a portion of the City of Benjamin, beginning at the intersection of U.S. 82 and State Highway 283, and extending to the North City Limit of Benjamin.
No requests for a public hearing were received; therefore, the District Office of the Texas Highway Department at Childress, Texas, has submitted all of the engineering data and information received in connection with the development of this project for approval of the proposed route and design by the Administration of the Texas Highway Department.
The project consists of widening, reconditioning, and resurfacing the existing 22-foot pavement to provide two 13-foot lanes and 9-foot paved shoulders. The existing 24-foot bridge on the South Wichita River is to be widened to 45 feet.
The route of the proposed project is along the present location of State Highway 283 and there will be no displaced persons or businesses on the project. The right of way width will remain at 100 feet in the City Limits of Benjamin. On the rural section, the right of way width on the east side of State Highway 283 will remain at the present minimum width of 70 feet; on the west side, a minimum right of way width of 75 feet will be required.

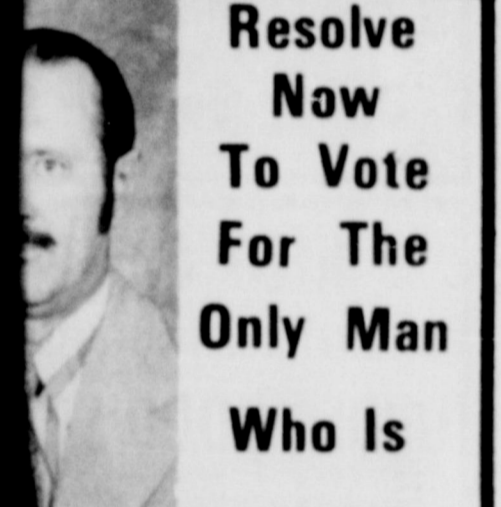

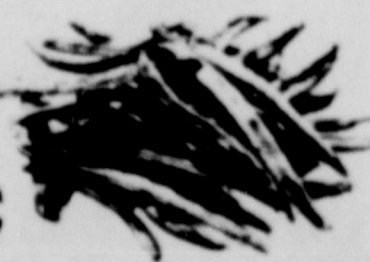
