# Hounds Beat Haskell In District Opener

The Knox City Greyhounds opened District 7-A play with a 20-14 win over the Haskell Indians Friday night in Greyhound Stadium.

The Hounds are now 5-1 for the season and 1-0 in district play. Haskell carries an 0-6 record for the year and 0-1 in district.

The Indians received the kickoff in the first half, but Mark Howell ended their drive when he intercepted an Indian pass on their ninth play from scrimmage.

The Hounds drove from their own 35, and with 1:35 remaining in the first quarter, quarterback Jimmy Don Moore hit Ricky Bishop with a pass in the endzone for the first score of the night.

Haskell fumbled on their third down play and Greyhound Tim Whitten covered, but after failing to make a first on four downs, the Hounds turned the ball back to the Indians.

Haskell again fumbled on their next possession and another Greyhound, Jerry Eaton, covered at the 34. After several plays a halfback pass from Charlie Flye to Howell gave the Hounds six more points.

## Things Getting 'Sticky' In O'Brien

The News office was notified last week of a rather unusual happening in the community of O'Brien.

Behind Lucian Covey's house in our neighboring town to the south, students from the Haskell-Knox County Co-op's vocational education program were busy handling a syrup-making operation.

The syrup-making was labeled as a Bicentennial project and busloads of hundreds of school students from O'Brien and neighboring schools including Knox City went to O'Brien and stretched their necks to see the operation of how the syrup was made.

Covey said he and his brother remembered that

their parents had made syrup when they were young so they decided to try their luck at it.

"I was nearly grown when they quit making it," Covey said, so the whole procedure was fairly fresh in his mind.

Covey bought a press from a man in Arkansas and had an Abilene welder build a stainless steel vat. Covey built the brick cooking pit himself and planted his own sorghum from which to make the syrup.

The three acres of sorghum will yield between 100 and 150 gallons of syrup per acre, Covey said.

According to a spokesman, after the cane is cut, it is run through a press which squeezes the juice into a cloth-covered barrel. The strained juice runs through a hose to the cooking vat.

It passes through another filtering cloth before the cooking begins. The vat resembles a maze so that the juice can be kept moving back and forth during its two and one-half

hour cooking. While the juice is cooking, someone skims the top of it to remove any impurities.

When the juice finally turns to syrup a plug is pulled at the end of the vat and the syrup is funneled into jugs.

Covey allows neighbors to come cut the amount of cane they want and then cook their own syrup. At first it seemed that three acres of sorghum would make more syrup than a lumberjack could eat in a year, but so many persons have shown an interest that Covey says, "If we keep going we're going to use it all up."

Mr. Stanfield was a retired farmer and a member of the O'Brien Baptist Church.

Survivors include two sons, Buck of Texhoma and Ted of Baton Rouge, Louisiana; two daughters, Mrs. O.P. Wyatt of Fort Worth and Mrs. D.M. Wreyford of Houston; one brother, J.H. Stanfield of Keene; one sister, Mrs. Edith DuBose of Atlanta, Georgia; ten grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.
