CALLAHAN CITIZENS TO ASK FOR HIGHWAY BOND ELECTION

At a meeting called for the purpose of discussing a proposed Million Dollar County Wide Bond Election held yesterday at the Chamber of Commerce Building, it was voted to petition the Commissiones's Court to order the election at the earliest date possible. About fifty represenatatives from several parts of the county were present at this meeting.

Under the proposed plan approximately \$357,000.00 would be avavailable for the construction of Lateral Roads; \$292,000.00 for the Retiring of Outstanding Bonds in Road Districts One and Four; \$350,000.00 for the purpose of construction of a hard surface highway from Cross Plains to Baird. If the Bond Issue carries, the \$357,000.00 for Lateral Roads should be available by February and would take care of the present Unemployment Situation in the county. Only Citizens of Callahan County would be used on these roads, and the Highway Commission will be asked to insist that unskilled labor on the designated highway be Callahan County Citizens where practical. It was also planned that the Lateral Road Money will be Deposited in the different Banks Throughout the County and the division of the money for the building of the lateral roads will be divided equally with the Four Commissioner's Precincts.

Many who have heretofore been against a bond election of this kind. are favoring this proposition, due to the fact, It Will Give Employment To Those of the County who have failed to make crops on account of the usual drouth and are unable to obtain financial assistant, or work. Also due to the fact that the money will be deposited throughout the county and dividing equally, the money in the Four Commissioner's Precincts. making it strictly a county wide affair.


