AT MILLERS CREEK Contract For Construction **Is Approved**

In an open hearing of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department on Thursday, October 11, commissioners of the department approved a total contract of \$46,000 for the construction of a two-lane boat ramp and parking lot at Millers Creek Reservoir near Munday.

Under the department's funding policy, the State of Texas will reimburse 70 percent of the total expenses for this project, providing the expenses do not exceed \$46,000. According to the department's boat ramp construction chief, Earl Craig, the North Central Texas Municipal Water District, which owns and operates the reservoir, can cut its share of the cost through in-kind forces such as donated labor, material or machinery.

The water district is required to lease the proposed boat ramp and parking lot site to the state for a 25year period. During this time the state is responsible for maintenance of the boat ramp and parking lot, and the water district will take care of basic "housekeeping" as deemed necessary. Before this funding is secured, the water district must provide a lease to the state and agree to all funding requirements as set forth in the construction agreement. Bidding for this project will probably begin shortly thereafter. The construction agreement is normally for one year. ****



PAUL RICHWINE **Research Station Has New Employee**

Texas A&M Research Station's newest employee is Paul Richwine of Fort Collins, Colorado.

Richwine, a native of Pennsylvania, did his undergraduate work at Penn State and completed his master of science degree in vegetable crops at Colorado State University in Fort Collins.

His work at the research station will be to experiment with new and different vegetable crops as well as finding adapted varieties of vegetables.

Richwine has been in Munday since October 1, and says our city streaked 55 yards around right end on the Moguls' first play of the game, giving his team a 6-0 lead and setting the stage for a 41-0 rout of the winless Windthorst Trojans. Again the Trojans had to punt after a penalty set them back ten yards, and Munday traveled 63 yards in two plays for another score. Todd Thompson carried the ball for 37 yards, then Collier took it for 26 more and the TD. Greg Urbanczyk's kick made it 21-0, Munday, before the first quarter ended.

Windthorst drove from their own 30-yard line down to the Mogul 18 at the beginning of the second period, but finally bogged down

Jackson scored the final touchdown on a four-yard keeper with 7:35 left in the game.



Next business was discussion of moving the three vehicle carport from City Hall to city lot on 12th Avenue. Two oral bids were received: Greg Kuehler, Knox City, \$1,950; Andrade and Caram, \$1,500. Decker moved Andrade and Caram be awarded the bid to move the building and to install three walls in building, turn-key complete as agreed, on city lot on 12th Avenue.

Tidwell seconded with all in favor. Tucker moved to adjourn, Albus seconded; motion passed.

The Council also met Monday, October 8, in special session.

Members present: Mayor Doris Dickerson and Aldermen Von Marr, Gary Decker, Garon Tidwell and Richard Albus.

John Lee Wilde, apparent low bidder on the new city hall and fire station, met with the Council to clarify several questions in regard to the proposed building. Roof pitch was discussed and the possibility of changing it to 1 on 12 was discussed. This will be reconsidered at the October 9 meeting. Timing of building to be ordered, alternates that are optional, facade, etc., also the bid itself, were discussed.

Wilde stated he is ready to commence upon bid award, as bid, and any requirements in plans and specs as to building requirements as to live load, wind load, etc., have been certified to by Mid-West American. General clarification was completed

ing to order. Minutes of the September 17, September 20 and October 8, 1984 special meetings were read. Tidwell moved the minutes read be approved as written. Marr seconded, all in favor.

The Council re-examined bids on the new city hall and fire station building. After completing reexamination of specifications, factory building warranty, bid bond. etc., Albus moved that base bid of John Lee Wilde Building be accepted at a total price of \$143,800. Marr seconded the motion. Voting for were Albus, Marr, Tucker and Tidwell. Noes, none. Carried. Tidwell moved that alternate #1 be accepted on Wilde bid at \$1,120 (additional wall and insulation in fire station). Albus seconded, all for. Albus next moved alternate #2 be accepted at \$2,700 (cedar shake on facade option). Tucker seconded, all in favor. After discussion Tidwell moved that Council action on alternate #3 be delayed until more information on doors to be furnished is available from Wilde. Albus seconded, all in favor.

Next business was consideration of a rate change ordinance of West Texas Utilities Co. After reading and discussion of the ordinance, Tidwell moved the ordinance be passed on its first reading as an emergency ordinance decreasing the West Texas Utilities Co. rates, systemwide, as agreed to and set by P.U.C. by \$838,882. Full text is to be filed in West Texas Utilities Co. ordinance files. Albus seconded. Voting for rate decrease ordinance were Tidwell, Albus, Tucker and Marr. Noes, none; motion carried.


A letter request by Bobby Tuggle was tabled for further consideration.


Weinert Homecoming Enjoyed

FARM AND RANCH REPORT Stocker Feeder Program **Offered For 4-H And FFA**

4-H and FFA members will have the opportunity this year to get first hand experience on raising stockers through the Knox County 4-H and FFA stocker feeder program. Rules on purchasing cattle and deadlines are available at the Knox County Extension office or from any of the vocational agriculture teachers in the county.

All cattle must be purchased at public auction sales after October 1 and before December 15. Weight slips will be checked by the stocker feeder committee at weigh-in day on December 15. Entry applications and a settlement sheet will be examined at this time.

Two age divisions will be formed, with the senior division including ninth through twelfth grade students and the junior division consisting of third through eighth graders.

John Reneau, this year's chairman, pointed out that 4-H and FFA members will learn about stockers from their purchase to their final sale. Reneau noted that youths in the program will be required to keep a record book and give a short speech on their project at the final weigh-in on May 25.

The Brazos Valley Young Farmers are sponsoring the awards and prize money this year. Trophies will be awarded to the top two feeders and the top junior and senior record book and speech winners.

All 4-H and FFA members who enter will be subject to the rules of the Knox County 4-H and FFA stocker feeder program, and the stocker feeder committee's decisions will be final.

These are signs of the twig girdler. The twig girdler deposits eggs in the portion of the branch that dropped to the ground.




