We don't lament the passing of firecrackers.

We mean the big-uns we call "blockbusters".

Not that we haven't had our period of enjoyment from the use and explosion of firecrackers.

We enjoyed them as a kid, even to the extent of trying to encase them in a can and seeing how high the explosion would send the can into the air.

Our use of fireworks was limited, however, for at least two reasons. Our financial status wouldn't permit the purchase of very many "non-essential" things; and, second, our parents were always concerned about our safety and wouldn't agree to extensive use of the explosives. Consequently, our enjoyment was limited to the little ones that weren't so dangerous or noisy.

Even as a grownup whose thoughts went back to boyhood days at Christmas-time, we enjoyed fireworks, principally because there were still young'uns in the family. Before our annual Christmas trip to Quanah, we usually made contact with a fireworks stand to purchase explosive for the youngsters.

It was fun to watch a little boy open a package wrapped in Christmas colored wrapping, see the face brighten and eyes grow bigger as he neared the end of the unwrapping chore, and then exclaim "Fireworks!"

Our enthusiasm lessened somewhat one fireworks season as a small one was thrown, or dropped, near us and we placed a foot solidly on top of it to lessen the explosion. We learned our lesson, then, and the resulting pain caused us to wonder for a period of time just how serious our act of foolishness would be.

On perusing the news last Sunday in the Wichita paper, we learned that this July 4th would be the last time for extensive use of noisy fireworks on Independence Day, Christmas, or any occasion. After July 4th, we just won't be able to buy them any more.

It's the law in Texas, they say.

Word comes that you'll be able to get the little seven-eighths inch "ladyfingers" next year, but that's the only kind. The "blockbusters" are taboo!

The firecracker business is better in wet years than in dry ones, they say. Of course, there's fire connected with the use of the things—and dry grass burns a lot quicker and faster than wet material.

Texas is one of 11 states where fireworks are sold legally, and limits on them take effect right after the 4th celebration.

At present, it is unlawful to sell fireworks to children under 10 or to intoxicated persons.

There were 4,500 reported fireworks injuries in the 11 states where sale is legal—and that's the reported ones, only. The victims were children under age 15, it was stated, and that's to be understood. They are the ones who enjoy the use of fireworks; and, perhaps, are a little more careless than

### Merchant Rides Set Show Dates

The "Modern Merchant Rides" have set dates of Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 8, 9 and 10, to set up their carnival rides and booths in Munday.

The group, sponsored by the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, will be located on East Main St., just west of the county barn.

A highlight of Saturday's observance of Munday's Bicentennial Celebration was the unveiling of a historical marker on the city hall lawn honoring the late R. P. Munday, first postmaster of our town. The marker is located on the south side of city hall lawn, facing main street.

The day's activities opened with a kiddie parade at 9:30 a. m., led by Munday firemen's emergency vehicle, one of the fire trucks, antique autos, local and county police cars. The kiddies manipulated their "foot powered" vehicles from junior high school, along main street to Highway 277. It was fun for all the youngsters, who had older people keeping them within the parade area and away from traffic.

The unveiling ceremony opened with presentation of colors and pledge of allegiance by Munday Troop 76, Boy Scouts of America, with Randy Waggoner and Omar Choucair as color bearers. Mayor Clint J. Norman served as master of ceremonies and officially welcomed the group of several hundred people to the ceremonies. He read a brief history of R. P. Munday, who was being honored by the unveiling, giving more details of his early life, his appointment as postmaster, his contributions to the town and community in the beginning of Munday.

Mr. Norman introduced Jack D. Watson, U. S. Postmaster and sectional center manager, of Fort Worth, who made the dedicatory address. He also paid tribute to Munday's first postmaster, recognized the present postmaster, H. C. Hughes, who soon will complete 40 years of service with the postal department, and then gave a brief history of the postal service from the "Pony Express" days. He recognized the fact that errors occurred within the service, but these were kept as a minimum.

At the conclusion of Mr. Watson's address, the historical marker was unveiled by John Gray and Ricky Gross, who removed the covering to display the marble marker. The front of the marker bears the nation's bicentennial emblem, while on top is the following wording:

In Memoriam, R. P. Munday, 1841-1922, Civil War veteran for whom the city was named. Moved to Knox County in 1887. Commissioned first Postmaster October 8, 1894. Leader in town's early development.

Acknowledging this memorial to his father was M. L. (Lowry) Munday of Abilene, a retired attorney and one of the three remaining children of R. P. Munday. He paid tribute to his father as a parent, as a citizen, and as one who believed in early-day Munday and who contributed so much toward the town's development.

Following retiring of the colors and sounding of taps by the Boy Scouts, Mayor Norman voiced the benediction.

At one point in the ceremonies, Mr. Norman asked for all children and descendants of Mr. Munday to stand, at which time better than 40 people arose to their feet. Later in the day, these descendants enjoyed a family get-together

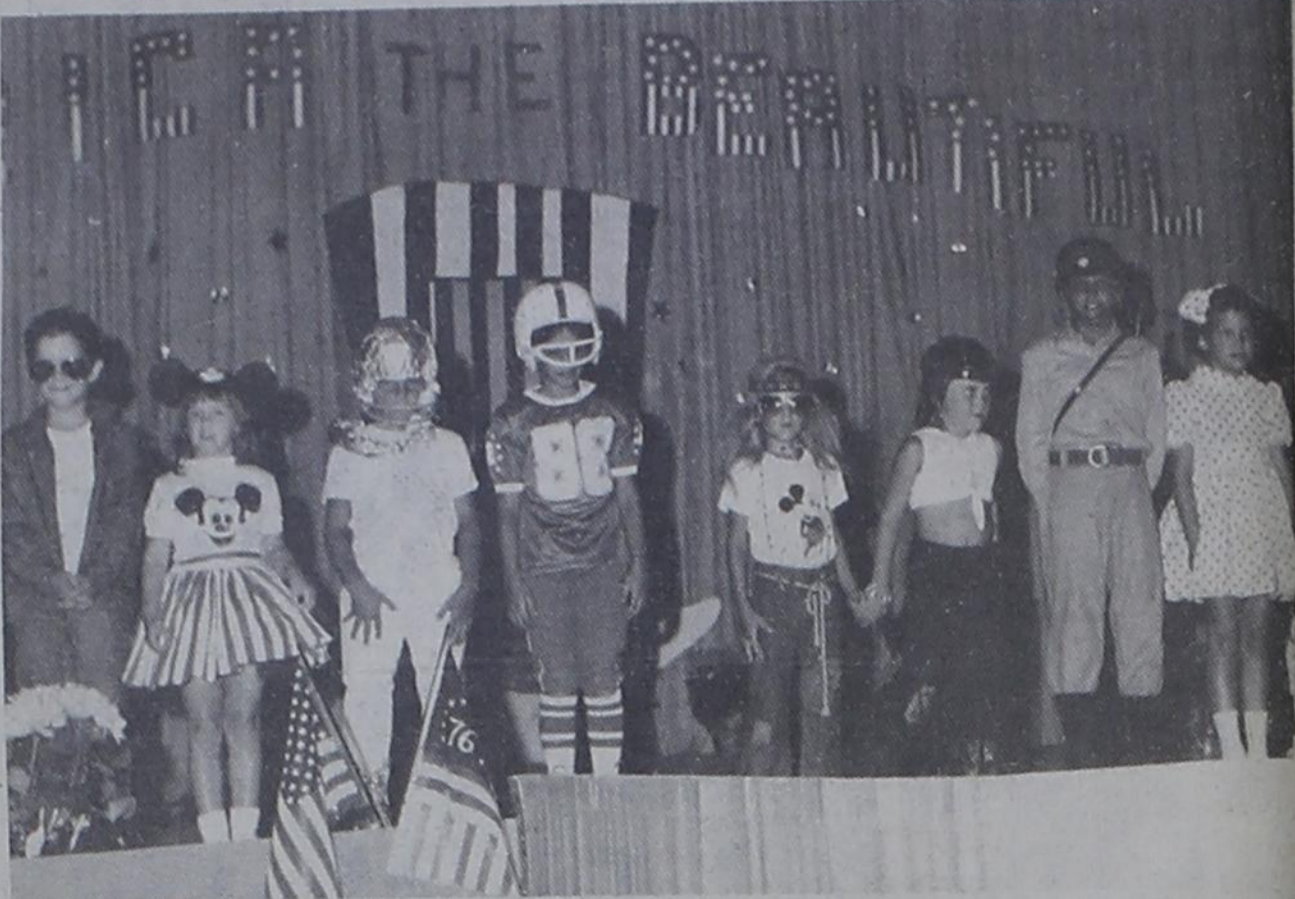

**4-Hers Do Well At District Horse Show**

Eleven Knox County 4-Hers competed in the District 34-H Horse Show at Vernon June 25-26 with Brett Boone qualifying for the State 4-H Horse Show at Amarillo July 21-24, and Joey Swain is the first alternate from the district.

Brett and Joey are Knox City 4-Hers who won 11 points and 7 1/2 points respectively in the very tough twenty-one county show, according to County Extension Agent Herman Collier. Only 20 from the district were allowed to qualify for the state show.

Preliminaries were held in all performance classes with eight Knox County 4-Hers qualifying for the finals in one or more events.

Brett Boone placed 4th in pole bending and 7th in the barrel race. Joey Swain tied

for 3rd and 4th in reining. Brand Cude, Goree 4-H'er, placed 5th in pole bending. Tammy Carver, Benjamin 4-H'er, placed her grade gelding 10th in the halter class. Tammy also made the finals in the western horsemanship class.

Lynda Brooke Hudson of Benjamin, Tamie Grindstaff and Kelley Boone of Knox City each made the finals in showmanship. Joey Swain and Brett Boone were in the reining finals where Joey placed. Tamie Grindstaff, Brett Boone and Brand Cude competed in the pole bending finals with Brett and Brand placing and Tamie having the misfortune of knocking a pole. Brett Boone, Doug Brown, Benjamin 4-H'er, and Tamie Grindstaff were in the barrel race finals with Brett placing, while Doug and Tamie had hard luck.

Stasia Carver, Benjamin 4-H'er, Kristi Boone and Jerry McCown, Knox City 4-Hers, were others from Knox County who competed real well.

This was the greatest number of entries from Knox County to ever compete in the finals, Collier said. One hundred ninety-four 4-Hers and horses were entered in the show.

He was born September 17, 1899, at Dale, and had been a resident of Weinert most of his life. He was a farmer and a member of the Foursquare Church of Weinert.

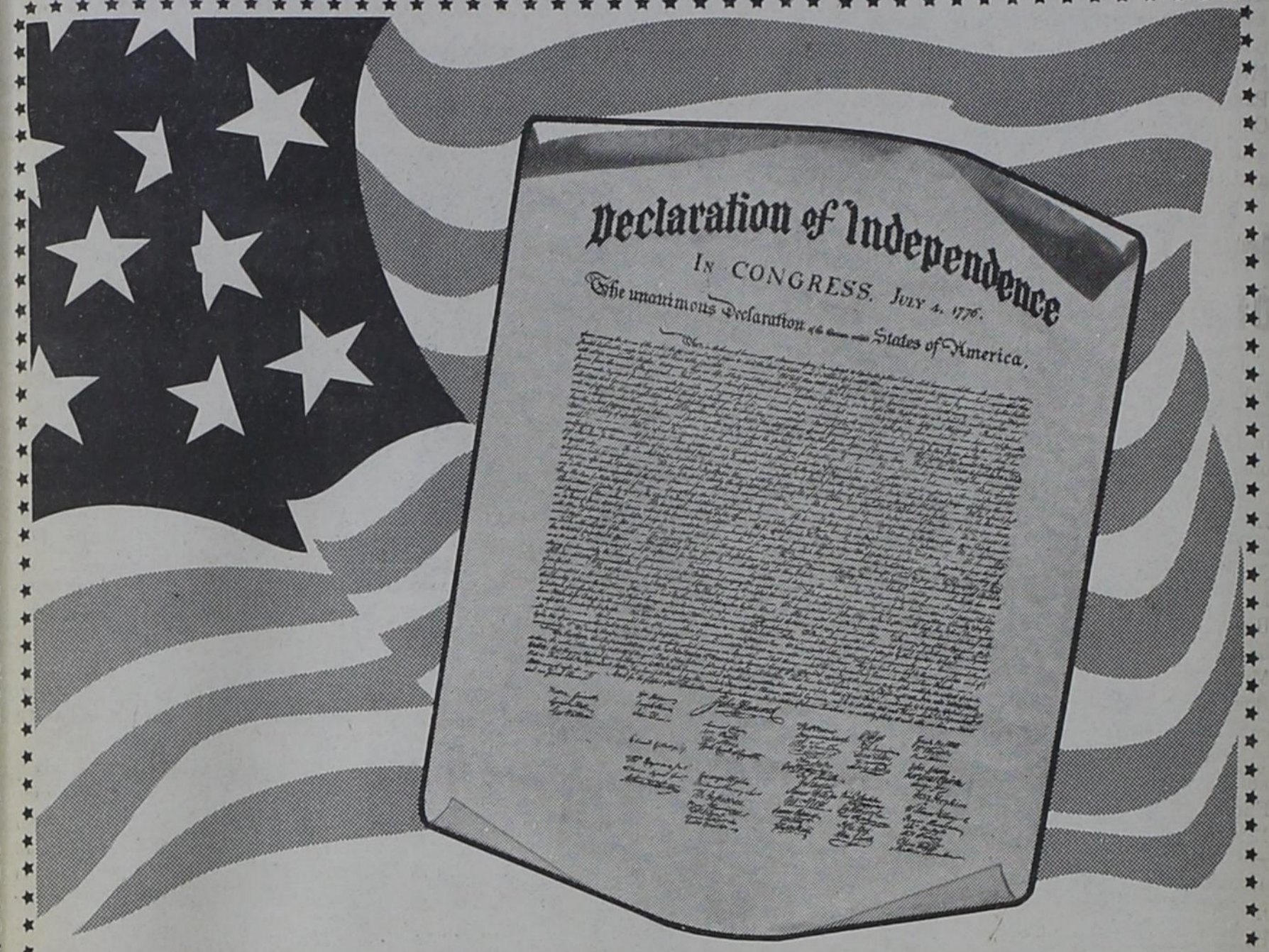
He married Bertie Ann Sanders on October 10, 1920, in the Cottonwood community.

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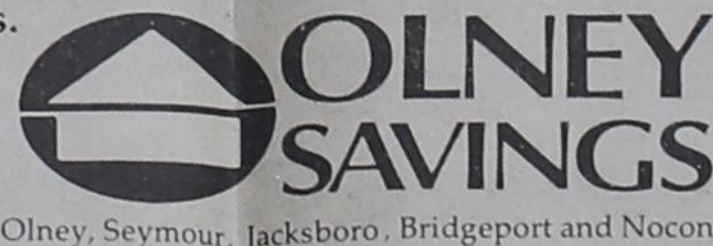

The United States of America:  
A Proclamation

For a Day of National Humiliation  
Fasting and Prayer

Thomas, the Senate of the United States, devoutly recognizing the Supreme Authority and Just Government of Almighty God, in all the affairs of man and of nations, has, by a resolution, requested the President to designate and set apart a day for national prayer and humiliation:

And whereas, it is the duty of nations, as well as of men, to own their dependence upon the overruling power of God, to confess their sins and transgressions, in humble sorrow, yet with assured hope that genuine repentance will lead to mercy and pardon; and to recognize the sublime truth, announced in the Holy Scriptures and proven by all history, that those nations only are blessed whose God is the Lord:

And, inasmuch as we know that, by His divine law, nations, like individuals, are subjected to punishments and chastisements in this world, may we not justly fear that the awful calamity of civil war, which now desolates the land, may be but a punishment inflicted upon us for our presumptuous sins, to the needful end of our national reformation as a whole People? We have been the recipients of the choicest bounties of Heaven. We have been preserved, these many years, in peace and prosperity. We have grown in numbers, wealth, and power as no other nation has ever grown. But we have forgotten God. We have forgotten the gracious hand which preserved us in peace, and multiplied and enriched and strengthened us; and we have vainly imagined, in the deceitfulness of our hearts, that all these blessings were produced by some superior wisdom and virtue of our own. Intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, too proud to pray to the God that made us; too haughty to humble ourselves before the offended Power, to confess our national sins, and to pray for clemency and forgiveness.

Now, therefore, in compliance with the request, and fully concurring in the views of the Senate, I do, by this my proclamation, designate and set apart Thursday, the 30th day of April, 1863, as a day of national humiliation, fasting, and prayer; and I do hereby request all the People to abstain on that day from their ordinary secular pursuits, and to unite, at their several places of public worship and their respective homes, in hoping the day holy to the Lord, and devoted to the humble discharge of the religious duties proper to that solemn occasion.

All this being done, in sincerity and truth, let us then not humbly in the hope authorized by the Divine teachings, that the united cry of the Nation will be heard on high, and answered with blessings, no less than the pardon of our national sins, and restoration of our now divided and suffering country, to its former happy condition of unity and peace.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington this thirtieth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and of the Independence of the United States the eighty-seventh.

The above proclamation is preserved in the Library of Congress as Appendix no. 19 in volume 12 of the United States Statutes at Large. It was initiated by a resolution of the United States Senate, and was made officially by Abraham Lincoln, as president, on March 30, 1863.

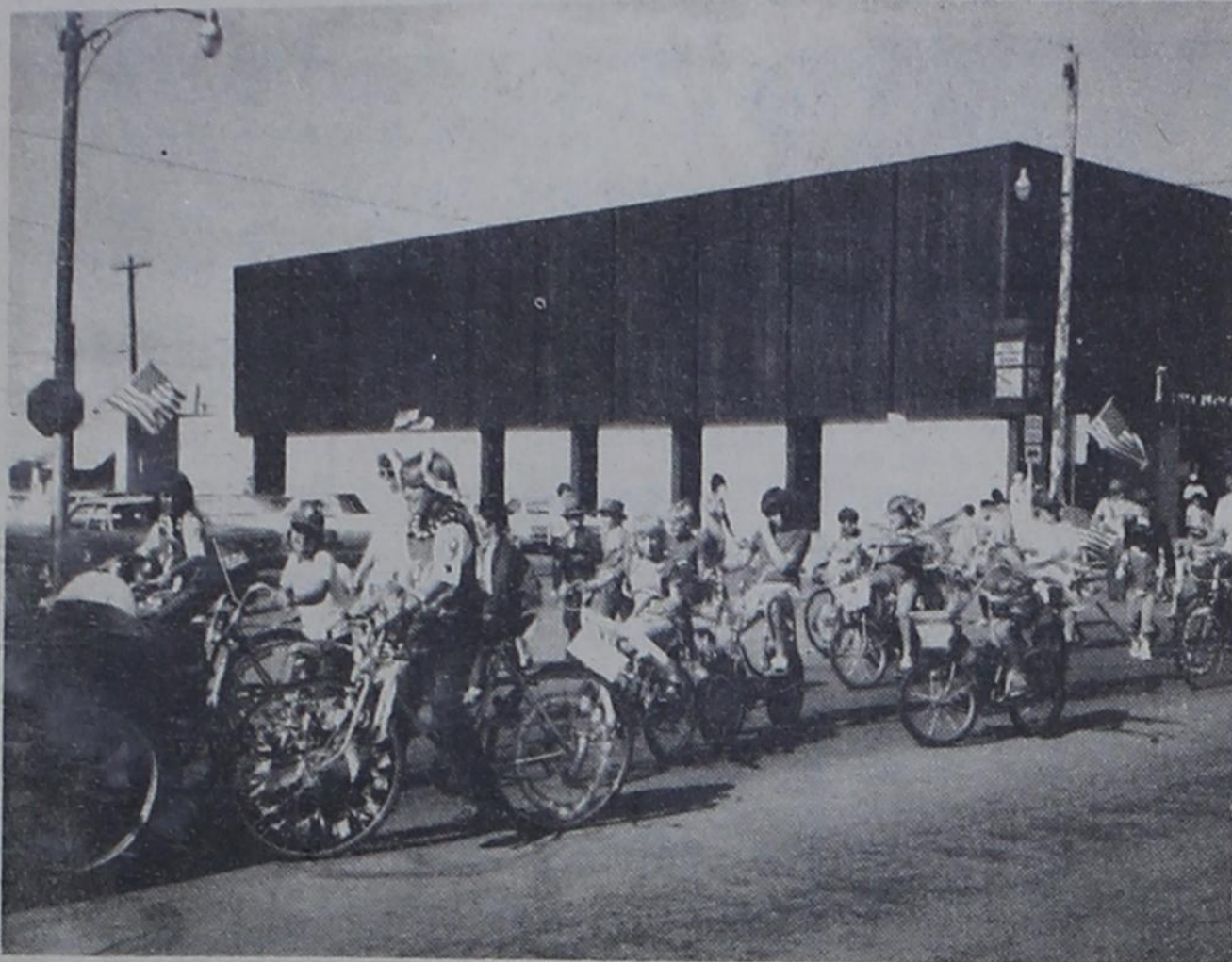
