

We have some sympathy and a whole lot of admiration for a person who will go to jall rather than betray a trust.

That happens to dedicated newsmen periodically.

The demands of a court that newspeople reveal sources of their information is "way off to the left" in our opinion. A refusal to meet those demands places a person "in contempt of court," which is the basis for their being incarcerated. This, to us, seems a shame and disgrace on the part of those presiding in the COUPLS.

Just recently, four newsmen of the Freano Bee in Frenno, Calif., went to jail for refusing to reveal a confidential source. A spokesman for the group said:

"It is apparent the courts intend to punish us for our dedication to the public's right to know and for protecting our confidential sources. We are firmly proud rather than dismayed, for we are defending one of our basic freedoms."

John J. Flynt Jr., a Democrat from Georgia, said after a hearing that he did not know if the committee would cite Schorr for contempt of Congress. Six of the 12-member committee indicated they would vote against any move to cite Schorr, Seven votes would be necessary to initiate any contempt action.

Flynt warned the newsman nine times that he could be imprisoned and fined for contempt of congress for refusing to answer questions. Nine times, Schorr refused to answer the questions.

Schorr said: "My rights to withhold my sources are protected by the First Amendment which is absolutely essential to the free press of this country. In some 40 years of practicing journalism, I have never yielded to a demand for the disclosing of a source that I had promised to protect. I cannot do so now.

"To betray a confidential source would mean to dry up many future sources for many future reporters. The reporters and the news organization would be the immediate losers. The ultimate losers would be the American people and their free institutions."

While we laud the "big time" boys in journalism for their bold stand to protect the freedom of the press, we sometimes wonder if we're not kinda lax in this respect.

Frequently, when an item appears in the small weekly papers, perhaps containing an error, we get telephone calls protesting such occurrence. We find people a lot more diligent in registering their protests than in giving commendation for a job well done.

Quite often when the telephone rings we receive

Five Accidents Reported For Knox County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of August, 1976 according to Sergeant Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1976 shows a total of 35 accidents resulting in one person killed and 22 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbork Department of Public Safety Region for August 1976, shows a total of 566 arcidents resulting in 16 persons killed and 319 injured, as compared to 1975, with 596 accidents resulting in 16 persons killed and 292 persons injured. This was 30 less accidents, the same number killed, and 27 more injured in 1976 at the same period of time.

The 16 traffic deaths for the month August, 1976, occurred in the following counties: three each in Parker, Hansford; two each in Donley, Motley; one each in Deaf Smith, Foard, Lubbock, Lynn, Montague, Palo Pinto.







Terraces Control Erosion

Although we have had a few drops of rain over the past few weeks, this area of Texas is very dry. During this time of the year we give little thought to water erosion, terrace construction or terrace maintenance. All we want is that good rain. What should happen to your land right now if we got that big rain?

Building terraces can help control erosion, at least for a while. But how terraces do their job depends on how they are farmed.

Unfortunately, too many farmers plow across their terraces or fail to maintain them properly. Gradually, the terraces lose their capacity to intercept runoff water. Then when heavy rain strikes, many terraces are broken.

The Soil Conservation Service, has published a booklet entitled, "Farming Terraced Land," which describes ways to farm such land. The booklet covers needing their services.

Emergency Livestock Loans Available Until Dec. 31st

The last chance is approaching for livestock producers facing financial problems to take advantage of the Emergency Livestock Credit Act of 1974, a temporary Farmers Home Administration program.

Now two years old, the Act provides for emergency financial help to the producer whose business has a good chance of success if it can survive the current liquidity crisis.

"The revised Act now in effect has changes to make it more palatable to both the borrower and lender," points out Dr. Wayne Hayenga, project leader in farm management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Some of the conditions are as follows:

1. A "line of credit" is permitted, whereas the original Act permitted only a single loan.

2. Anyone with a "substantial operation" in breeding, raising, fattening or marketing is eligible. (This includes one who devotes at least 25 per cent of his time to, derives at least 25 per cent of his income from, or has at least 25 per cent of his capital invested in livestock operations).

3. The Act terminates on Dec. 31, 1976.

4. The loan period can be up to seven years, with possible renewal for three years.

5. The guarantee by the Farmers Home Administration is increased from 80 per cent of the loss to 90 per cent of the loan principal and interest.

previous \$250,000 to \$350, 000 per loan.

7. Secondary financing of the guaranteed portion of loans may now be made by the Federal Financing Bank, thus increasing the marketability of the securities to the lender.


8. The total authorization under the Act was reduced from \$2 billion to \$1.5 billion.

Many cattlemen can use this type of financing due to present economic conditions, contends the economist. Therefore, the Emergency Livestock Credit Act should help them protect their operations from financial disaster in the coming months.

Hayenga advises stockmen to contact their local Farmers Home Administration office or their lender for particular details. This must be done before the Act expires on Dec. 31.

September **Exemption May Lower Christmas** Taxes On Farmland Is Enjoyed

Court decision could save ranchers many tax dollars, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The court held that qualify for agricultural tax exemptions on farm real estate even though they earn more than half their income from other sources, notes Dr. Wayne Hayenga. "Thus, the court relaxed eligibility requirements imposed in an earlier ruling." The big impact will be in counties that have many part-time or low income farmers who could not previously qualify for the exemption.

The Texas Constitution provides that the owner of a farm or ranch may request an "agricultural use" valua tion for the property if it is his "primary occupation and source of income," points out Havenga.

This valuation is based on the productive value of the land, which is often less than the market value generally used for computing tax payments.

"The state Supreme Court ruled earlier that a property owner must show that his farm or ranch income was greater than his combined income from all other sources. But, based on opinion by Associate Justice Price Daniel, the court changed the requirement to make it easier for owners to

This ruling will help farm part-time farmers and and ranch owners who get incomes from a variety of sources, such as business investments, royalty payments and other jobs, but who spend a majority of farmers and ranchers may their time on the farm, points out Hayenga.

The Uniform Vehicle Code in Texas states that the or overtaking from either direction a school bus displaying red flashing Community Center. warning lights that is in the process of loading or unloading passengers, shall stop until the school bus starts moving, the red lights are no longer flashing, or the bus driver directs motorists to proceed.

"Freeways and divided highways add to the drivers' confusion," Major Bell added. "If a bus is on an access road, only the traffic on the access road must stop. However, if the bus is on a divided highway and pedestrian traffic does not normally cross the median or Mrs. J. H. Cumley. barrier then only the traffic on the portion of the roadway occupied by the bus must stop.


