REDISTRICTING FAILS AGAIN

The redistricting bill has again fallen by the wayside and it now looks as if the three additional members of Congress to which Texas is entitled will be elected from the state at large.

Ferguson will almost certainly get one of the places, and it has even been rumored that the politicians opposed to Ferguson have looked with favor upon him going to Washington, for that would remove him from the political horizon in Texas, which after all, might be worth while.

Life Span Is Not Longer

Many readers of The Times are under the impression that the life span of man has increased within the recent century. The fact is, however, that this is not true and the capacity of man to live a longer life is no better than that of his ancestors.

AN ORDINANCE

An Ordinance to provide for the construction, regulation, maintenance, inspection, and operation of privies in the City of Munday, Texas, and area of police jurisdiction thereof; and to provide a penalty for the violation of said ordinance, or any section thereof.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Munday, Texas, that on or after September 22, 1931, it shall be unlawful to dispose of any human excreta within the corporate limits of the city of Munday, except in a sanitary water flush closet or a chemical toilet or concrete vault toilet or an approved sanitary pit privy built according to the specifications of the State Department of Health, as set forth in Section 3 below.

2. Every building intended for human habitation or occupancy abutting on a street or alley in which there is a public sewer, or within 200 feet of a public sewer, shall be connected with the sewer by the owner or agent of the premises in the most direct manner possible and with a separate connection for each house or building.

3. The minimum requirements of a privy are that it shall be so constructed, built, or rebuilt that:

(a) The excreta deposited therein shall not fall upon the surface of the ground but enter into a pit or vault in the ground, or a compartment built for the purpose.

(b) The contents of said compartment, vault, or pit shall be inaccessible to flies, fowls, or small animals at all times.

(c) Self-closing lids shall be provided for each unit.

(d) For a pit toilet the pit shall consist of an excavated chamber conforming to the following dimensions:

Minimum width inside curbing 3 feet.
Minimum length inside curbing 4 feet.
Minimum depth from ground surface 4 feet.

The pit shall be provided with a box curbing, fitted closely to the sides of the pit.

(e) Over the pit shall be placed a fly-tight seat which shall be ventilated by a flue extending from the pit to 8 inches above the roof of the building and screened at the top and bottom with 16-mesh wire.

4. All sanitary pit privies in the corporate limits of Munday Texas shall be kept in a clean condition at all times. Self-closing lids shall be kept closed when not only for the disposal of human excreta and no wash water or garbage shall be deposited therein.

5. If any defect occur in the pit

6. All privies existing or maintained within the corporate limits of the City of Munday, Texas, after this ordinance becomes effective which do not conform to the requirements of this ordinance shall be, and are hereby declared a nuisance, dangerous, and a menace to public health, and the City of Munday shall have the power and authority to abate such nuisance in accordance with the law, or in accordance with the ordinance of said City of Munday, Texas.

7. It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police having jurisdiction, or his duly authorized assistant to enter all premises as may be necessary in the enforcement of this ordinance and he is hereby so empowered.

8. Any person, firm, or corporation who violates, refuses or fails to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance in the corporate limits of the City of Munday, Texas, shall be punished by fine not exceeding \$100.

9. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

WHEREAS, the maintenance of surface toilets is a menace to the health of the citizenship of the City of Munday and is calculated to cause epidemics of disease in the City creates an emergency and demands that this ordinance take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication and it is so ordained.

Done and passed this 22nd day of September, A. D. 1931.

Empress Eugenie

Who She Was
When She Lived
Her Chief Characteristic
Her Influence on Fashion

In the belief that the influence of Empress Eugenie will dominate the styles for women during the fall of 1931, this short sketch of her life, and the influence that she exerted upon the styles of her period, is presented so that all may refresh their memory of her place in the history of France.

The present Eugenie trend, already definitely established in millinery, will be evident in modified versions in women's ready-to-wear for the fall of 1931—and, for that reason, these facts are given so that all can become familiar with them.—Eugenie is pronounced Er-zhen-ee.

Her History

Marie Eugenie Ignac Agastine de Montijo was born during a terrific earthquake at Grenada on the 5th of May, 1826. She was the daughter of Cipriano Guzman Porto Carrero, Count of Teba, subsequently Count of Montijo and Grandee of Spain. Her mother was a daughter of William Kirpatrick, United States Consul at Malaga, a Scotsman by birth and an American by nationality.

Her childhood was spent in Madrid, but after 1834 she lived with her mother and sister, chiefly in Paris, where she was educated, like so many French girls of good family, in the convent of the Sacre Coeur.

On leaving the convent, she traveled continually. She became practical, well-informed, worldly-wise and proud and wilful. After being disappointed in love by the Duke of Alba she often galloped through the streets of Madrid smoking a cigarette or even a cigar. She frequented the theatres and bull-fights, flirted with the tondors and presented them with red caps embroidered in gold. Queen Isabella of Spain dismissed Eugenie and her mother from the Spanish court for their unconventional conduct and Eugenie entered a convent. But a priest dissuaded her from this course and a gypsy told her that she would soon grace a throne.

At a review of the French troops at the camp of Satory she met Napoleon III. She attended the review on horseback and the Prince President at once noticed this beautiful "Amazon" who was so full of proud grace. From that day, having learned about her family, he tried hard to meet her. Eventually, he did so through Princess Mathilde, who speaking of her, said: "She is a newcomer—an Andalusian woman."

The Countess de Montijo and her daughter were invited to a ball at the Elysee. Napoleon entertained Eugenie a long time. She was amiable and coquettish and he was captivated by her beauty. She had a charming profile, fair hair with a reddish tinge, blue eyes, and shoulders that were wide and wondrously white. She rode daintily and gracefully astride, scorned the conventional side saddle. Like all creoles she possessed charm and spontaneity.

On December 2nd, the empire was proclaimed and during a series of fetes at Compiègne, which lasted eleven days the Emperor became more and more fascinated with Eugenie.

At a ball given in the Tuilleries on New Years Eve, Mlle. de Montijo, who had necessarily excited much jealousy and hostility in the female world, had reason to complain that she had been insulted by the wife of an official personage. On hearing of it, the emperor said to her: "Je vous vengerai" and within three days he made a formal proposal of marriage. In a speech from the throne, on the 22nd of January, he formally announced his engagement and justified what some people considered a mesalliance.

"I have preferred," he said, "A woman whom I love and respect to a woman unknown to me, with whom an alliance would have had advantages mixed with sacrifices."

Of her whom he had chosen he ventured to make a prediction: "Endowed with all the qualities of the soul, she will be the ornament of the throne and in the day of danger she will become one of its courageous supports."

The French disliked "in reine parvenue" and the most aristocratic families of France declined to appear at court. In order to make the mesalliance seem less, Merimee made extensive researches to find all the long forgotten titles ever borne by a member of the house. The marriage contract contained almost a page of pompous Spanish names. The marriage was celebrated with great pomp at Notre Dame on the 30th of January, 1853. From this date until 1870 she was Empress of France.

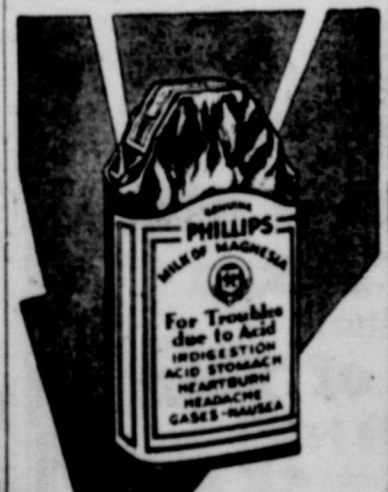
The emperor's prediction regarding her was not belied by events. By her beauty, elegance and charm of manner she contributed largely to the brilliancy of the imperial regime. On the 16th of March, 1856 the empress gave birth to a son who received the title of Prince Imperial. One hundred and one guns were fired to celebrate the event. The Empress stood godmother for all girls born on that day and gave them a present. The boys who were born on that day were freed from military service.

The empress acted three times as regent during the absence of the emperor—in 1859, 1865 and 1870—when the emperor vacilla ted between two lines of policy she generally urged on him the bolder course. When he wished to turn back from Sedan, seeing the disaster awaiting the French army, she commanded him to continue the advance which resulted in his defeat and capture of the Prussian army. She deprecated everything tending to diminish the temporal power of the papacy and she disapproved of the emperor's liberal policy at the close of his reign. It was during the reign of Napoleon III that France obtained many of her colonies, Tunis, Algiers, Morocco, and part of Indo-China.

Eugenie had often boasted that she would never leave the Tuilleries in a cab, as Charles X and Louis had done, but she was forced to follow their example when the Prussians marched upon Paris and the French populace rose against her revolution. An American dentist, Dr. Evans, helped her to reach England in 1870.

She took a house at Chislehurst and was joined by the Emperor and Prince Imperial. She treated her son very harshly in London, allowing him only twenty pounds a month, when she paid 100,000 francs for a single gown. She became "petite Bourgeoise" and made strenuous efforts to regain possession of every sou of hers which still remained in France. She became a shrewd business woman and accumulated considerable property, acquiring a fine estate at Farnborough, where she built a chapel, pompously called St. Michael's Abbey. In this church were erected three tombs, for the emperor, the prince imperial and herself. She purchased a beautiful villa at Cap Martin where she passed the winters.

Napoleon III died in January 1873. His death was attributed to an overdose of chloral which was administered to relieve the pain of

County Agent Notes

Poultry Feeding
Some of the Knox County Demonstrators are feeding their flocks a home-mixed laying mash, which has the following proportions:
100 lbs. ground maize or corn
200 lbs. ground wheat
100 lbs. ground oats
100 lbs. meat scraps (if it is desirable 60 lbs. of cottonseed meal can be substituted for 50 lbs. of the meat scraps making the mixture more economical—however use the cottonseed meal only through the winter.)

The cost of this 500 lbs. mixture equals to about the same cost of 100 lbs. of commercial mash.

In all cases where worm pills have been given, the flock shows the gravel from which he had suffered for many years.

The Prince Imperial, tiring of Eugenie's restrictions, left England to take part in the Zulu war. In 1879, while engaged in combat with natives, he was captured and put to death. The following year, the empress visited the spot and brought back the body to be interred beside that of his father.

Being left alone in the world, Eugenie traveled extensively and visited the principal courts of Europe. She took a lively interest in world events and during the World War she established a sanatorium for wounded soldiers at her residence, Farnborough Hill. She died in Madrid, Spain, on July 12, 1920, at the age of 94.

Eugenie was as capricious as a child during her court life and often indulged in horseplay. On one occasion she picked up her skirts and slid down a smooth slope. She called to her ladies to follow and they all collapsed in a huddle, looking very unlike their usual dignified selves.

Upon another occasion, she was walking in the gardens with the emperor. He bent to examine a plant and she pushed him over, laughing heartily at his comic predicament.

Once at Fontainebleau she attended a village dance in disguise with one of her ladies. The emperor arrived in time to see a workman kissing his wife and a lively fight ensued in which wig and artificial beads were pulled from the chins of court dignitaries.

Such was the life of the famous empress whose life star rose in such a whirl of splendor and set in such scenes of sorrow. She will be remembered forever for her three famous titles—Empress of France, Queen of beauty and dictator of fashion.

that worms were present. The best way to cure a disease is to prevent it; rid your flock of worms, as these parasites sap the vitality of the bird, making them susceptible to most any disease. You will also find that by worming your flock now it will be more resistant to colic and roup this fall. The round worm breeds in mud-holes and such places; this can be easily controlled by cleaning up the muddy places and keeping fresh, clean drinking water before them. The tape worm spends part of his life cycle in the flies, therefore making them harder to control, but by controlling the flies and giving worm pills will practically do the job. In giving worm pills be sure the pill or capsule is for both tape and round worm.

Plenty of Pork
Guinn Hickman of Truscott had two gilts to farrow around the 5th of the month, both litters totaling nineteen pigs. The first gilt will farrow around the first of October. This will make a nice lot to feed out and Mr. Hickman intends to feed them out by self-feeder. These were three of the gilts out of the carload lot shipped in from Iowa last spring.

Mr. Hickman also has a nice dairy herd, and what could help make more economical gains in pigs than "skim milk"? Incidentally he also has a few hundred piglets about ready to begin laying.
