
Completing the homecoming activities will be a dance held at the Rhineland Gym for those interested. Music will be provided by Edward Melton and the Kuntry Kings.

The Mighty Moguls won of the season by defeating the Paducah Dragons 24-0 in action Friday night at Paducah. The Moguls, now 2-0 in district will take on the Knox City Greyhounds this week during homecoming activities in Munday. Knox City is the only undefeated team in the district for the season.
