State Tax Rebates Increase; Reflect Growing Economy

"The Texas economy is no longer stalled, but has shifted into drive," according to Comptroller John Sharp. The more than \$240.8 million in local sales tax rebates across the state is almost 13 percent more than last June.

The Comptroller's office has identified a net gain of 17,120 new business locations in Texas between May 1990 and April 1991. "Whatever caused the increase, those new businesses reflect increased economic activity in Texas," Sharp said.

It is hoped that the Texas economic surge will sift on down to Knox County as we are reflecting a loss in tax revenue for the period. Munday's tax rebate check of \$2,971.66 represents a 4.75 percent decrease and a yearly loss of .66 percent.

Children Need Social Security Numbers

Does your child have a Social Security number? If not, you should be aware that Federal law now requires that most children have a Social Security number, according to Patty Brandt, Social Security Representative in Vernon.

"One of the provisions of the new law," Mrs. Brandt noted, "is that 1991 tax returns, to be filed by April 15, 1992, show the Social Security number of any child claimed as a dependent who reaches age one by the end of the year." Previously, Federal law required a Social Security number for any dependent age two or older.

It is easy for a parent to obtain a Social Security number for a child if he or she has not already done so, Mrs. Brandt said. All the parent has to do is contact the local Social Security office to request a Form SS-5, (Application for a Social Security Card). It's a simple, one-page form that can be completed in a few minutes.

"A person applying for a number for a child will need to submit evidence of the child's age, identity, and U.S. citizenship or lawful alien

status," Mrs. Brandt stated. "The person also must provide evidence of his or her own identity."

A public birth record may be used as evidence of age and U.S. citizenship for a person born in the United States. Another document to establish identity...such as a medical record or day care record...may be required. If the child was born outside the U.S., a birth certificate or passport and a U.S. immigration document can be used as evidence of age, identity, and lawful alien status. The application lists examples of documents that can be used.

"Once we have examined the documents, we will give them back to the applicant and issue a Social Security card for the child, usually within two weeks," said Mrs. Brandt.

"If you are expecting a baby in the near future, chances are you'll be able to apply for a Social Security card when you're in the hospital," Mrs. Brandt said. "We urge all parents to get Social Security numbers for their children before the end of 1991 so that they do not have to worry about this matter when they get ready to file their tax returns in 1992."

Texas Investors Warned Of Horizontal Drilling Scams

The State of Texas presently faces one of the worst outbreaks of investment fraud in recent history. Currently, 51 Texas-based boiler room operations are under investigation by the Enforcement Division of the State Securities Board. These telemarketers are suspected of illegally selling interests in oil and gas horizontal drilling programs to the public, in Texas and throughout the United States. Nationwide, these suspected fraudulent telemarketing schemes may have already scammed the public out of over \$100 million.

Horizontal drilling is a recently perfected process that allows an oil and gas driller to drill horizontally into verticle fractures of oil that are difficult to locate through conventional means. Legitimate oil and gas companies have successfully used the technology in certain areas of Texas and have received enormous publicity in magazines and newspapers throughout the U.S.

However, as is the case with so many successful business stories, the con men were not far behind the legitimate firms. Fraudulent telemarketing operations are using the publicity about horizontal drilling to add an air of respectability to their schemes. These schemes are often

controlled by repeat securities law violators who use unlicensed sales agents to make high pressure telephone sales presentations to the public. The promoters may know little or nothing about oil and gas in general or horizontal drilling in particular. They are simply seeking to cash in on an opportunity to fleece the public.

The sales agents, using prepared scripts, often promise enormous profits at little or no risk and urge the investor to act quickly "before it's too late".

Texas, which has led all states in the past three years in securities fraud-related criminal indictments and convictions, expects this year to nearly double last year's total of 32 convictions. Most of these cases are against promoters of oil and gas programs.

Texas consumers should be aware that almost all investments sold to the public should be registered with the State Securities Board. If an investor has a question about a telephone pitch, he or she should contact the enforcement Division of the State Securities Board in Austin. Calls from the public can serve as a valuable early warning sign to the Board and allow the agency to take action toward the shutdown of the fraudulent operators seeking to victimize consumers in Texas. Information furnished by the public is confidential.

The following is a list of warning signs consumers should be aware of in dealing with promoters of oil and gas programs: unregistered securities or unregistered company; new company; telephone solicitation; a sense of urgency; representations of low risk, no risk guarantees; representation of future reproduction based upon initial well potential; non-disclosure of prior drilling history; non-disclosure of actual drilling costs; or inadequate disclosure document.

DEAD OR ALIVE
Read Revelations 3:1-6

What are four characteristics of living things? (1) Living things are made of cells; (2) They need food; (3) They grow; and (4) They reproduce.

The church at Sardis had a reputation for being alive, but they were as good as dead. The Lord didn't give us a direct explanation for His words "you are dead" (Revelation 3:1), but it is reasonable to believe that these Christians were weak in the same four areas that are unique to a living organism.

(1) The cells of this church body were not working well. While some members were walking with the Lord (Revelations 3:4), many others had ceased to function properly.

(2) This church had stopped taking in the right spiritual food. The Lord admonished them to begin listening to His word and spirit once again (Revelation 3:3-6).

(3) They had stopped growing as a body. Although they had knowledge,

their action left much to be desired.

(4) It is probably safe to conclude that a church in such bad shape was reproducing very little. When Christians get weak and cold they stop multiplying.

It is the last of these four that is most telling in the latter stages of the twentieth century. The population of the world is expected to double in the next thirty years. Will the church of Jesus Christ reproduce (grow) at a sufficient rate to meet this population increase?

One of the ways it can, means each of us become responsible for spreading the Gospel wherever we are.

Next week I will offer some suggestions that I think could help!

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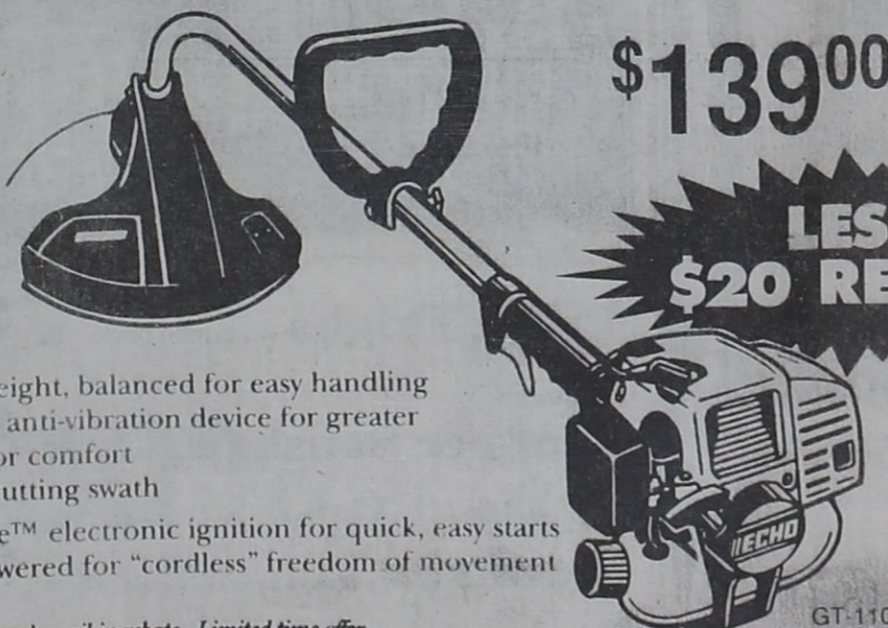

TEXAS IN ROUND NUMBERS A CENSUS LOOK

Exact 1990 census figures are being finalized, but it is still helpful to think about Texas in "round numbers." Round numbers are close to what the exact census figures tell us, but are often easier to remember when all that may be needed is an approximation. Round numbers can still help us see who we are.

Texas has about 17 million people. There are a quarter million more females than males in Texas. What proportion are young and old? Those under 18 account for 28.5 percent. Those 65 or older account for about 10 percent of the population. Texas has about six million households. Those households include both family households (which make up about 72 percent of all households), and non-family households (which make up the other 28 percent).

Sometimes there is confusion about the difference between households and families. The Census Bureau is specific in how these terms are defined. Households refer to people occupying a housing unit regardless of relationships. Family households (families) include a householder and one or more other persons living in the same household who are related to the householder by birth, marriage or adoption. Families may be either married couple families or families with a male householder (a family with a male householder and no wife present) or families with a female householder (a family with a female householder and no husband present).

Texas has 4.3 million families. Married couple families make up almost 57 percent of all households in Texas but 79 percent of all family households. The approximately 700,000 families with a female householder make up almost 12 percent of all households but 16 percent of all family households. In contrast, the approximately 200,000 families with a female householder make up 3.4

percent of all households but almost 5 percent of all family households.

Almost 1.5 million householders live alone. Of householders living alone, almost one-third is 65 years of age or older.

When census data are analyzed by race the Texas population is 72.5 percent White, 11.9 percent Black, 0.4 percent American Indian or related group, and 1.9 percent Asian or Pacific Islander. Texans of Hispanic origin represent 25.5 percent of the population. Hispanic origin is an ethnicity, not racial classification.

In "round numbers", we're a big state that continues to grow.

Farmers Reminded To Use Special Care In Storing Grain

This year many producers are looking at a good wheat prospect with good test weights and are certain to save some of this year's crop for seed. However, special care should be taken to insure a good viable seed at planting next year. Grain bins that are not cared for properly certainly can cause insect damage that can cost producers dearly if storing for higher prices.

If samples of wheat have as high as 32 grains per 100 grams insect damage, then it is considered "Sample Grade" and may be used only for animal or poultry feed, thus reducing prices drastically or receive a severe dockage.

In order to reduce risk of insect damage, grain bins should be cleaned thoroughly by removing all grain, debris and webs. Producers should also remove old grain from augers, boots of elevators and beneath false floors.

A "clean out" fumigant such as Chloropicrin can be applied to insure that insects are killed. The use of Chloropicrin should be avoided if grain is to be used for seed.

Residual sprays should be used prior to grain storage. Methoxychlor 25 percent EC at a rate of 3.75 pints per 5 gallons of water, Malathion 57 percent EC at a rate of 2.5 pints per 5 gallons of water or Reldan 4 E at a rate of .5 pints per 6.5 pints of water can be used prior to grain storage. One gallon of spray should treat 500 square feet of surface.

At the time that grain is being put into storage, the grain should be treated with any of the following: Malathion, Reldan 4 E, Reldan 3% dust or Actellic 5 E. These products should be used at the rates recommended on the label.

In order to insure infestations from occurring, grain should have an insecticide applied over the top four inches of grain with Reldan, Actellic or Bacillus Thuringiensis. Vapona strips may be used by hanging in the headspace of the bin.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."
