## Moisture Boosts Wheat Prospects

Rain clouds drifted away about mid-afternoon Friday, allowing "Old Sol" to cast his warming rays on a rain soaked and cool earth of this area.

Sunshine was welcomed after some two or three days of rainfall, ranging from a light drizzle, to light showers, to heavy precipitation. As the let-up came, signifying a possible end to rain, the gauges of Goodson

Sellers had recorded a total of .732 of an inch for the day. Further precip during the period brought a total of 1.53 for Munday.

Other places recorded more, with Knox City reporting two inches, more at Seymour and heavier rainfall at Haskell. Munday was spared the turbulent weather which other places had.

The moisture is a welcomed boom for wheat prospects in Knox and adjoining counties, as wheat farmers had cited a need for moisture on their crops that were in booting and heading stages. A bumper wheat crop can be assured with a few more light showers.

Coming at this time, the rains bring adequate moisture for planting of cotton by the uniform planting date of May 15, as well as other row crops.

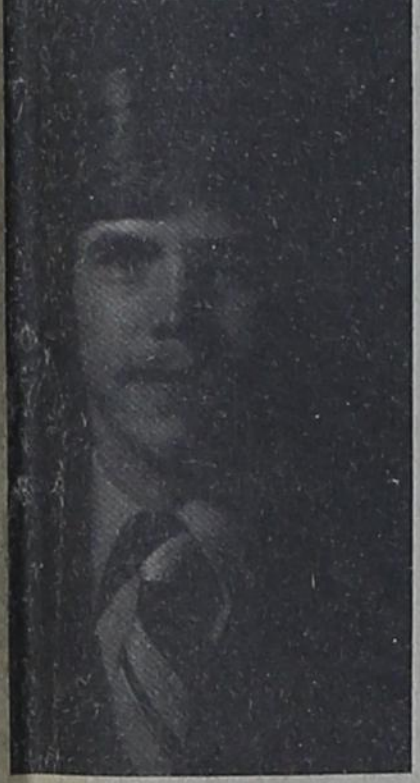

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met May 4, 1979 in Special Session at 7 p.m. at the Munday City Hall.

Members Present: A. Dale Selzer, Mayor and Aldermen M. M. Booe, Von Marr, Ray Lynn Hardin, Jessie Andrade and Donald Hobert.

Mayor Selzer called the meeting to order. Purpose of the meeting was to conduct a public hearing before the Council to determine public recommendations in regard to the April 1, 1979 to March 31, 1980 budget. Mrs. Virginia Carey met with the Council to request \$150, for a pull up screen, tables for dominoes and markers. After discussion the Council voted to honor the request. After consideration of the full budget the Council voted to approve the budget as changed by the Council body and which reflects the following figures:

Cash Bal. \$54,830; Funds vested funds \$138,772.; Receipts Est. \$346,897; for a total Available Funds in the amount of \$540,499; Less Estimated Disbursements of \$351,036.; Estimated Surplus at 4-1-1980 is \$189,463.

A complete copy of the budget is in the City files. (Budget Files). Marr moved the budget be approved as submitted by the City Administrator, with changes authorized by the Council. Booe seconded the motion. Carried with all members voting for. A copy of the proposed budget, which is to be finalized on May 22, 1979 will be published in the next issue of the Munday Courier.

## Myers Sisters Are Tops In State Track, Tolliver Fourth In Shot Put

Winning state medals has become a family affair for the Myers sisters, Julie and Caroline, as they added two more first places at the state track meet held in Austin on Friday and Saturday, May 4 and 5. They are the daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Billie Jake Myers.

Julie, a junior at MHS, won her third consecutive first place medal in the mile run Saturday. She will now begin training for next year's meet which will give her an opportunity to set a new record by winning four consecutive first place medals in a row.

Caroline, a sophomore at

MHS, brought home her second first place medallion for her efforts in the 800 meters. She broke her own Class A record with a time of 2:16.0.

Together with teammate Vicki Tolliver who placed fourth in the shot put, Munday scored 24 points to place fourth in the 69th girls state track and field meet held on the University of Texas campus.

Julie ran a fine race, taking the lead on the back stretch of the final lap and cruised in at 5:25.5, short of the Class A record she set in 1978 with a 5:22.9. But her time was the least of her

concerns when it was all over. "I'm satisfied", she said. "I wanted to break the record but I'm just glad it's over. It seems like it's harder every time."

Caroline held off a strong kick by Noreen Brown of Franklin on the final turn in the 800 meter, after breaking away from a very tight field at the 400-meter mark. "I almost got boxed in," she said. "I didn't think it would be so bunched up. Last year it was just a long line."

The MHS girls track team has had an outstanding season, bringing home many first place trophies as well as the district title. Although

the relay teams were edged out at regional in Odessa, they gave a superb showing. All members of the track team and their coaches deserve a big pat on the back and hearty congratulations for one of the most outstanding years Munday's girls track team has ever had. The team is full of exceptional talent and has set new records that will be hard to top. ## The 'Book' Report

## Farm And Ranch News

Spring is the time when many homeowners discover they have termites. This is time when winged forms appear and swarm.

If winged termites are seen outdoors, usually there is no problem, since this is a natural occurrence. But if they are found indoors, usually on a window sill, chances are good that an infestation has established in your home.

Termites can cause extensive damage to wooden parts of your home, so take some precautions.

Quite often termites and certain ants swarm at the same time and it's important to be able to tell the difference between these two insects. Carpenter ants swarm in the springtime and can cause some structural damage to wood. However, termites are much more destructive and require different control measures.

Termites have a broad waist - ants have a narrow, constricted waist; termite wings are the same size and shape - winged ants have a front and back pair of wings of different lengths and shape; termites have straight antennae (feelers on their heads) - ants have elbowed antennae.

Termites may be attracted to your house by dead tree limbs, stumps, old lumber and other source of termite food. These should be removed. If soil is above the point where wood or brick meets the foundation, termites have easy access to your home. Anywhere that wood meets dirt (sidewalk, wooden steps), is a potential spot for termite entry into the home.

Termites also have the ability to build mud tunnels over non-wooden structures to reach a food source. These tunnels (about 1/4-inch wide) may extend several feet up concrete surfaces. On a slab home, these may be seen on foundation concrete between soil and brick. On homes built above the ground, these tunnels can be found on piers or pipes that go from soil to structure. The bath trap in homes built on a slab is another source of entry. Plumbing in this situation has contact with soil under the slab, and termite tunnels may be found in this area.

Although a thorough inspection is best done by a professional, a homeowner can make a quick check for termite infestations. If termites or damage is found, contact a local pest control company. This is one insect pest that should not be handled by a "do-it-yourselfer." Commercial pest control companies have the necessary equipment and experience to effectively rid a home of termites.

## BRIDAL GOWNS

Traditional gowns are the most popular with antique laces, high Victorian necklines, tiered skirts, empire waist and princess styling.

Other popular styles include thin straps on bare shoulders with a lace or chiffon camisole, often covered with a soft capelet or blouson bodice. Soft, floaty skirts continue the feminine mood.

Bodice interest is often created with capelet collars, big smocks over flowing dresses, or chiffon blouses over Venise lace camisoles.

Popular traditional fabrics include soft chantilly lace or Venise appliques and intricate alencon laces. Soft, flowing styles are created with shiny lightweight knits, satin, moire, chiffon, silk and velvet.

## BRIDESMAID GOWNS

Current styling for bridesmaid gowns are flounced skirts, capelets, tiered skirts and gathered shoulder.

Important colors are violet, mauve, banana and dusty peach.

## STUDIES SHOW

Recent studies have shown that 98 percent of today's brides have formal weddings with a white or ivory dress. Most choose floor length gowns with a chapel train.

Most brides buy their gowns ready-made spending an average of \$230.

The 16 percent who make or have their gowns made spend an average of \$100 to \$150, including fabric, trim, lace and notions. Current pattern books feature a number of bridal fashions enabling today's bride to create a totally individualistic look.
