violating federal pricing violating federal pricing
regulations, it was an nounced today by G. Dan
Rambo, Dallas Ramb, Dallas, Regional
Representative for the U. S. Representative for
Department of Energy. Department of Energy.
DoE regulations prohibit changes in business prac
tices which tices which give special
treatment to preferred treatment to preferre
classes of customers, such as credit card holders, cashpaying motorists, or regula
customers. customers.
Also prohibited as tie-in sales that require a motorist to purchase products or
services such as a a car wash, food, or auto accessories and repairs as a condition to buy
gasoline that these practices occur more frequently during
times times of gasoline supply
shortages and long service station lines. "Any new
teie.in sale, business pratic tie-in sale, business practice
or credit or credit arrangement may
be a violation of the
regulations," Rambo said.
