Quarter Horse Show Is Slated Here For July 4th

A quarter horse show and "approved youth activities", the first of its kind to be held in Munday, will be staged on Wednesday, July 4, at Lake Creek Arena, according to Sharron Kiser, co-ordinator. Events will begin at 8 a.m., and the full day of activities will highlight the Fourth of July activities of this area. These activities will embrace all of the 45

classes involved in the show. Some of the outstanding of these will be showmanship, English pleasure in several classes, western pleasure for both junior and senior entries, western horsemanship, western riding, barrel racing, pole bending and dally team roping, to mention a few. Bill Lewis of Tulsa, Okla., will serve as judge of the show, and some 300 horses

are expected to be entered. Billie Metsgar of Abilene is secretary of events, while Sharron Kiser of Munday is show manager.

Mrs. Kiser has contacted many of the local merchants and reported that they are cooperating nicely in sponsoring various classes and providing funds for meeting expenses of the show.

This show is approved by the American Quarter Horse Association and the Quarter Horse Association of Texas. All horses entered must be registered by these associations.

Classes will be run in the order listed on the show program, and entries will be accepted until each particular class is called.

A concessions stand will be in operation on the arena grounds, Mrs. Kiser stated.

Funnel Cloud Spotted On Monday Afternoon

Tornado-conscious persons in Knox County are always on the lookout for signs of those vicious twisters, but they appear at times without being seen by many.

While rain clouds were threatening here last Monday afternoon, an employee of West Texas Utilities Co., Tony Diaz, spotted a funnel cloud to his west as he was returning from Munday to his Knox City home. The funnel, he reported via radio, dipped briefly, then went back into the cloud. Munday received very

little precipitation in this threat.

The local area has received a total of 1.57 inches of rainfall, however, since last week's report of Goodson Sellers, local U. S. weather observer.

The quickie thundercloud that produced destructive hail on Wednesday of last week brought a total of .45 of an inch to Munday, according to Sellers. Then on Monday morning during the "minor deluge" he recorded a total of 1.12 inches, making a total of 11.43 since January 1, 1979.

Destruction Released By Thundercloud

A heat-generated thundercloud that formed quickly, and disappeared almost as quickly, released fury over an area of farmland just east of Munday late Wednesday afternoon, June 20, leaving a path of destruction in its wake.

In some 30 minutes, or more, crops of cotton, feed grains, watermelons, cantaloupes, etc., had heavily felt the brunt of this storm. Hail of varying sizes plummeted the tender crops, while rains ranging from a light shower to better than 3 1/2 inches also fell.

Reporting crop damage from light to almost total destruction were Cecil Booe, on the Bowden place which he farms, James Edward and B. E. Smith, Leland Floyd, Levi Bowden, Gerard Kuehler, and heavy hail at the G. W. Hawkins home.

The storm crossed Highway 277 just west of Goree and did some damage to experimental plots of Munday Vegetable Research Center. Don Combs, who farms near there, expressed fear that his cantaloupe crop was destroyed. He said each melon he examined showed to be hit by hailstones some three or more times.

Rhineland Coop Gin Holds Annual Stockholders Meeting

The annual stockholders meeting of Rhineland Co-Op Gin was held Monday night, June 26 at Knights of Columbus Hall in Rhineland, with approximately 150 patrons in attendance.

In welcoming guests, Marvin Zeissel, Board President, commented that weather conditions causing cotton harvest to linger and wheat harvest following so closely, caused the meeting to be held at a later date this year.

A delicious meal of barbeque and "All the trimmings" was served by Dairyland Caterers of Jacksboro.

Rev. Brendan McGuire, pastor of Saint Joseph's Catholic Church in Rhineland, worded the invocation.

Minutes of the 1978 stockholders' meeting were read by Kenneth Baker, secretary of the board of directors.

Annual audit report was presented by James M. Castagna, auditor for the Co-op and certified public accountant from Seymour.

It was pointed out by Mr. Castagna that the Co-op is not able, by law, to take advantage of investment tax credit; therefore, the Co-op is allocating the tax credit to their patrons.

He also reminded mem-

bers that the Co-op's fiscal year ended March 31, at which time 9403 bales of cotton had been ginned. Approximately 900 bales were ginned after this date, and will be reflected on next year's audit.

Marvin Zeissel reported a new burr machine has been purchased and a pollution system is being installed this summer. Gin output of dust and lint should diminish making air more pleasant for residents of Rhineland.

Dividends were paid to the stockholders on a 500 bale basis, with \$16.13 paid in cash and 8.06 book credit.

A drawing was held for a number of prizes, furnished by Rhineland Co-op Gin and Zeissel Bros. Fertilizer and Seed.

A Better Tomato Goal Of Tom Lewandowsky Research

In January when most of us were dawdling over Christmas aftermath, New Years and income tax, Tom Lewandowsky was seeding tomatoes.

A student at Texas A&M University, Lewandowsky is in Munday performing a

tomato experiment as a thesis toward his masters degree in horticulture.

Asked why he chose A&M Vegetable Research Center in Munday, he stated, "I needed a greenhouse and Munday had one available, it is that simple." While

conversing with him, we determined his experimental site was the only thing simple; a lot of time and labor have gone into this project.

Dr. Larson, A&M greenhouse vegetable specialist and Tom's major professor, is developer of the TVT variety chosen for this research. After six weeks in a seeding tray, 150 plants were transplanted into two and one-half gallon containers, to continue their growth. The purpose being to isolate the soil around each plant, consequently Mr. Lewandowsky can determine the exact amount of nutrients each plant is receiving.

This brings us to the main objective of his experiment - to determine the correct amount of copper each plant needs to prevent fruit cracking and bursting. Carefully, he hand feeds the plants fertilizer solution daily, using different amounts of copper for each plant. Use of city water is much preferred over well water in an experiment such as this because mineral contents are known.

Weighing tomatoes from each plant separately, he records the weight to determine each one's yield. Several have grown in excess of one pound. He also records data on skin texture and imperfections and analyzes leaf tissue.

Greenhouse temperature is kept above 56 degrees and under 95 degrees, as tomatoes seem to thrive under these conditions. They are as beautiful to the eye as any flower garden ever witnessed.

Large, rich, green leaves show fruit of green, white and shades of orange to red as one views tomatoes in different stages of maturity. This experiment will finalize near the end of June, and it is obvious that it has been a very rewarding but time consuming one for Tom Lewandowsky.

A native of Millis, Mass., with a B. S. degree in plant and soil science, we doubt he ever had the slightest inclination of being a temporary resident of Munday, Texas. However, we are pleased to have him here and enjoyed his hosting us to a most interesting tour of his "experimental grounds".

This research is "living proof" that plants - even tomatoes - will readily respond to know-how and tender loving care!

False Ideas Of God

What is your conception of God? Get yourself a clear mental picture. Do you see him as a weak-kneed old man with white flowing robes and a long beard? Many of us have a false idea about God, especially when it comes to his dealings with mankind. These myths, or false ideas, can be hazardous to our eternal life.

Many believe that God is uninterested in us, but is this reasonable? Man is God's masterpiece creation. "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the earth, and over every creeping thing that creepeth upon the earth" (Genesis 1:26). The Bible claims God is interested. How interested? With the evidence and the commands of God, he gives us motivation to obey. "I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also." (John 14:2,3).

Many would say God is a God of confusion, encouraging mankind to be divided and believe different things. Yet Paul, inspired of God, said, "There is one body, and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling; One Lord, one faith, one baptism, One God and Father of all who is above all, and through all, and in you all." (Ephesians 4:4-6). Unity is in God's plan

division opposes God's will. Again Paul confirms this in I Corinthians 1:10, "I beseech you...that you all speak the same thing, that there be no divisions among you; but that you be perfectly joined together in the same mind and judgement." "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved, but he that believeth not shall be condemned" (Mark 16:16). God has set up the ground rules, and has extended his grace. It is now up to man.

You can see that misconceptions about God can be fatal to our spiritual being. Don't be misguided by false ideas about God. Check God's word for the truth! Read Acts 17:11 and I Peter 3:15 and notice it is your responsibility to know and obey the truth.

Fireworks stands that have begun business along roadsides in Texas this year should be a reminder not only that July Fourth is near, but also that fireworks bodily injured at least 6,139 people in America last year.

That statistic includes 1,207 serious eye injuries. Most resulted to some degree in permanent vision loss or impairment, Texas Society To Prevent Blindness (TSPB) spokesman Bobby Williams said.

Most accidents - about 60 per cent - occurred to children younger than 15. In one Texas accident, the child was merely a bystander not using the fireworks that damaged his eye, the TSPB Eye Safety chairman added.

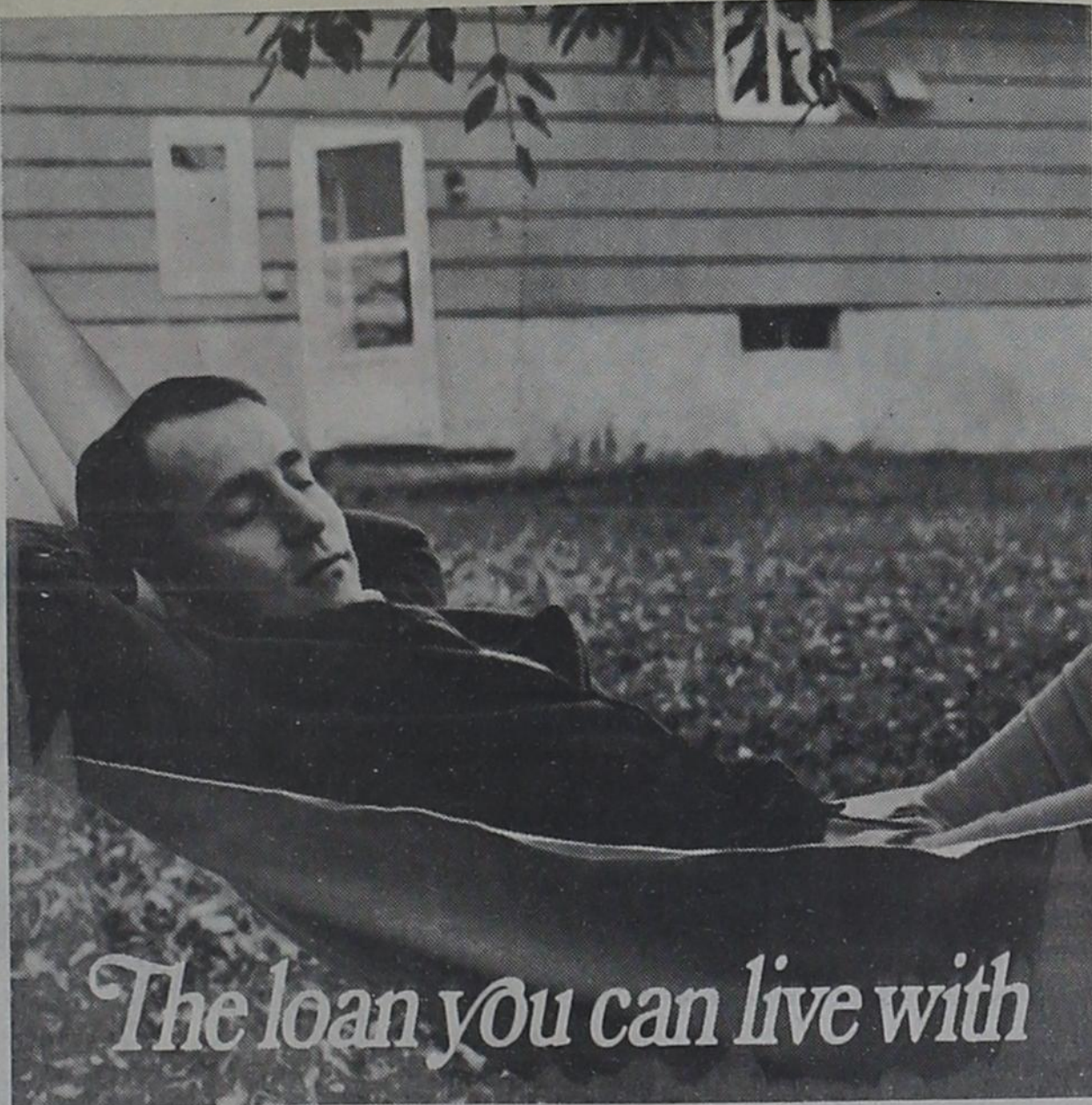
The statistics, compiled by the Consumer Product Safety Commission, are probably low, since they include only people who were treated in hospital emergency rooms, Williams pointed out.

Minutes Of City Council June Meeting

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met June 12, 1979 at 7 p.m., at the Munday City Hall in Regular Session.

Members Present: Mayor A. Dale Selzer and Alderman Ray Lynn Hardin, Jessie Andrade, M. M. Booe, and Von Marr.

Members Absent: Donald Hobert.

Mayor Selzer called the meeting to order and Alderman Booe led in prayer at his request.

City Secretary Hertel read the minutes of a May 22, 1979 Special Session. Booe moved for approval. Hardin seconded. All in favor.

Gerald Saffel, Police Chief, met with the Council. He requested repair of the radar unit, or if too costly, the purchase of a new unit, at a cost of \$58.00 per month for 36 months and the old unit (includes maintenance). The Council decision is reflected as follows: To send the old radar unit to Chanute, Kansas for repair to be checked out. If repair is over \$200.00, another meeting is to be called. The Administration or Police Chief is to be notified as to costs prior to ordering repair. The Council authorized an \$89.00 expenditure for a high candle-power, rechargeable flashlight for the P. D. upon a motion by Marr, seconded by Andrade. All voted for.

Saffel next briefed the Council on remaining vacation time due himself and Gene Nix and plans for National Guard Duty and taking balance of vacations.

City Administrator Walter Hertel next reported on water usage trends for the four member cities of the Water Authority for the first 5 complete months of operation. Munday has run below its estimated minimum use to date, however the Council suggested we keep records and see what usage is at the end of the Authority fiscal year. Adjustments as to usage and

charges should be made at that time to member cities.

Next discussed was H. B. 1060 and its effects on Munday. The Administrator is to secure information from the T. M. L. in regard to passage of a resolution or ordinance.

Ray Penman, City diesel supplier, has offered for sale the 1,000 Gallon diesel tank, hose and nessel now used by the City, for \$170.00. He also agreed to continue the Cities diesel allocation. Andrade moved the City purchase the tank. Marr seconded. Carried with all in favor.

Eight persons signed a petition to secure city water on the South end of Munday Avenue (across the drainage ditch). Several hundred feet of pipe, meters, boxes, etc. will need to be installed at considerable expense. Andrade moved that if 5 persons or more pay the \$40.00 tap fee, that water is to be installed as time permits. (Paving seal-coat project will need to be completed first). Persons receiving water are to put up a \$25.00 deposit at time each meter is turned on. Booe seconded. All in favor. (Two or three inch plastic line, as needed for pressure, is to be installed.)

Next discussed was building of two manholes, emerging repair of some broekn water main valves, installation of two sewer lines, etc. City Administrator Hertel was authorized to continue with this work as time permits; also to work on a valve mapping system to secure sectional water shut down without turning off the whole town when water mains break and fire plug replacement is needed.

Andrade moved the following charges be made: a \$100.00 charge to Viola Cude for a sewer installation (Manhole could not be installed); also that any water taps made for sprinkler systems or extra watering systems be billed as follows: all meters, fittings, valves, meter boxes, ect.

(Materials used) are to be billed 100% to the customer when more than the normal 3/4 meter is needed. The extra meter charge is to be made at the regular prevailing meter rate charge per month for additional meters. The extra meter is a customer convenience and not a normal requirement of regular city water service. Booe seconded. All in favor.

Next considered was employee salaries. After considerable discussion, the following changes were made upon a motion by Andrade. Each of the following persons are to be increased by \$50.00 a month beginning June 16: Salvador Sosa, J. B. Tomlinson, Marty Navaratte, Gene Nix and Walter Hertel;

Hourly increases: R. D. Gray, 30c per hour; Monthly increase: Omar Cure, \$35.00 - Case fee increase by 50c each;

Vehicle Expense: Walter Hertel, \$50.00 per month increase (fuel, maint., and insurance up).

Hardin seconded. All in favor.

Marr moved bills be paid and a transfer made as follows: From Operating Funds \$12,583.31; From Airport Funds, \$280.63; From Ambulance Funds, \$64.75; From Swimming Pool Funds, \$249.63; From Waterworks Improvement Bond Funds, \$1,454.08; Transfer from Operating to Airport Funds, \$400.00. Andrade seconded. All for.

Marr moved for adjournment. Booe seconded. All members in favor.

Gas Dealers Practices To Be Probed

Retail gasoline dealers offering special treatment to preferred customers or requiring the purchase of a product or service in order to buy gasoline may be violating federal pricing regulations, it was announced today by G. Dan Rambo, Dallas, Regional Representative for the U. S. Department of Energy.

DoE regulations prohibit changes in business practices which give special treatment to preferred classes of customers, such as credit card holders, cash-paying motorists, or regular customers.

Also prohibited are tie-in sales that require a motorist to purchase products or services such as a car wash, food, or auto accessories and repairs as a condition to buy gasoline. Rambo pointed out that these practices occur more frequently during times of gasoline supply shortages and long service station lines. "Any new tie-in sale, business practice or credit arrangement may be a violation of the regulations," Rambo said.

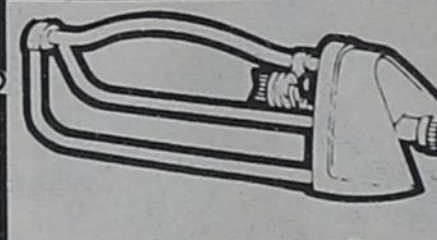

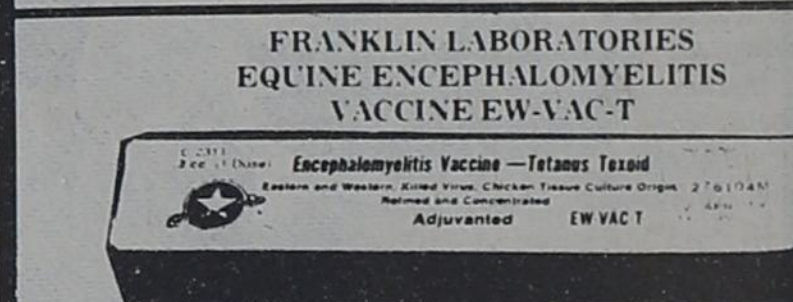

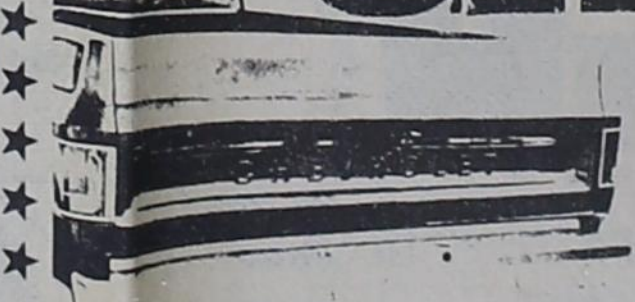

The fuel, made from coconut shell charcoal, worked well in a 5 horsepower diesel engine used for irrigation. Moreover, the engine seemed to run at greater thermal efficiency than when powered by diesel oil. Their work is part of an effort to cut down on oil imports. They're also studying increased coal use and the production of butane from industrial wastes, especially sugar cane plants.

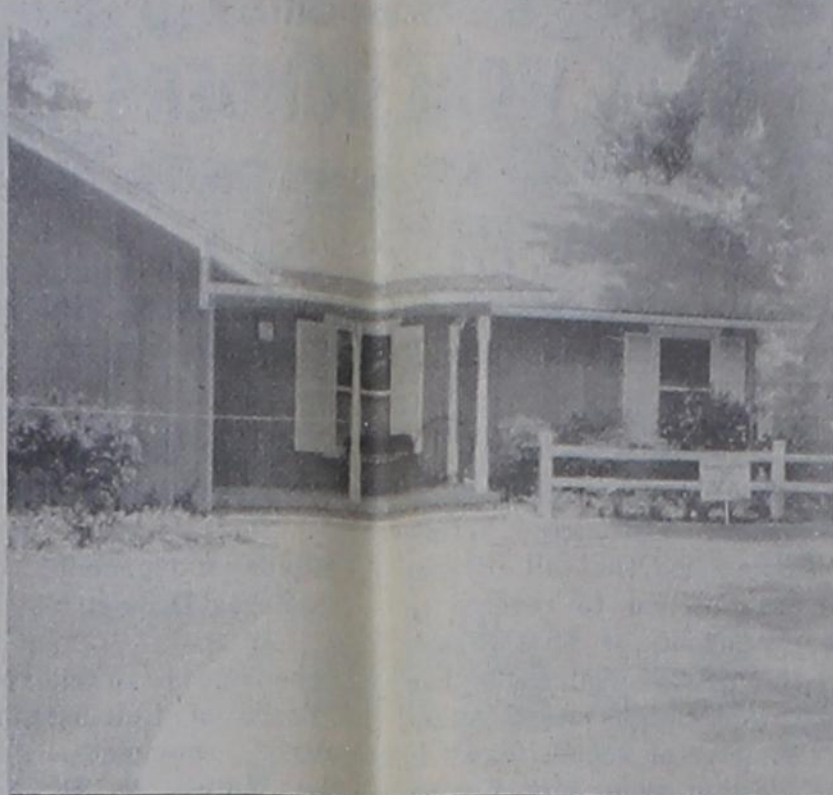

The 'Book' Report

"Treat me as a person, not a thing" stems from everyone's need for recognition as an individual.

There are times when the idea on a message card could come in handy as a reminder to others and to ourselves. Every person has a need to feel good about himself. Part of our self-concept is determined by how others treat us and part is determined by how one perceives himself.

Actions, gestures, words, all communicate in both positive and negative ways the manner in which one is received by others.

For example, an adult becomes frustrated when someone pulls into a parking space he was waiting for. Or a child is disturbed when another child breaks in line ahead. Both of these actions indicate that the other individual did not place value on that person's presence.

Gestures may equally damage the ego-state. Everyone gets pushed, shoved or rushed through situations in which they feel completely out of control. Feelings of low self-esteem prevail when such occasions occur.

Words and tone of voice used by others are additional clues to one's acceptance. Most people feel a bit uneasy when a sales clerk yells "Take a number!" Or a child may wonder what is wrong with himself when an adult yells "How many times do you have to be told?"

At times it might help to show a card which reads "treat me as a person not a thing."

As a person thinks of himself, it is important to recognize successes as well as failures. Examining the reality of emotions, skills and abilities can be devastating unless there are some "pluses" along the way. Recognize capabilities but also recognize humanistic limitations. Pull out the card and read "Treat me as a person, not a thing."

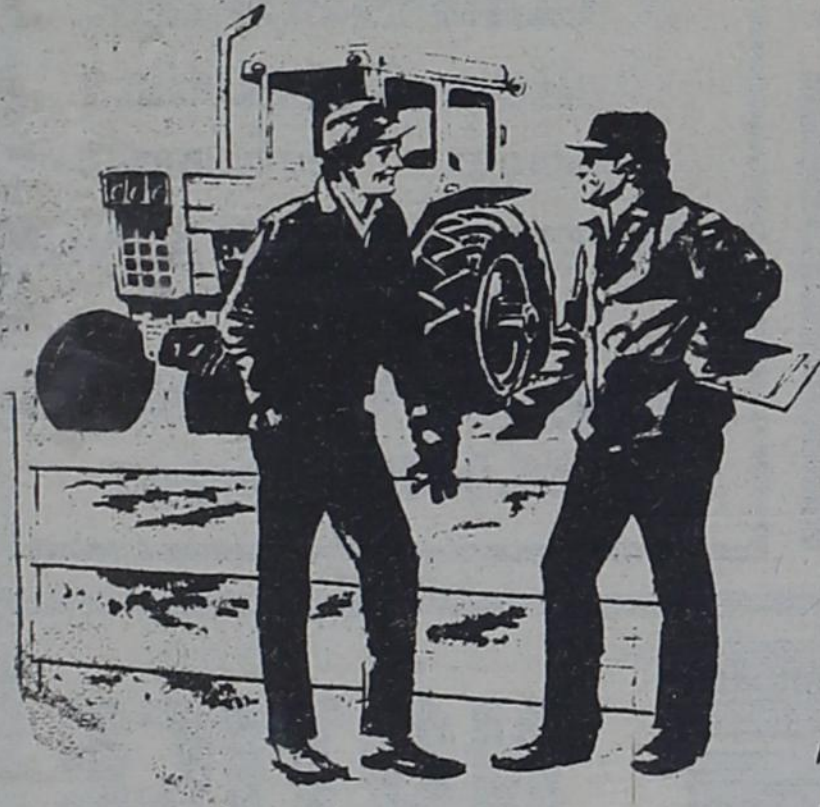
