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

Almost overnight, the grass has gone from brown to green, little trees are blooming profusely, and even the old mesquite, who almost always knows to wait until all the frigid winter is over, has put on little green sprouts. Spring is definitely in the air.

And while a young man's fancies may turn to thoughts of amore in the spring, the old woman's turn to gardening.

There's something satisfying about the smell of fresh soil being turned over and the planting of the tiny seeds that will finally produce beautiful and nourishing food. Who cares if nobody has ever grown a watermelon or a squash that looks like the picture on the packet of seeds?

I don't even mind the hoeing and the watering that goes into gardening. It's just that every year, I feel like the "Little Red Hen".

Everybody remembers the Little Red Hen. She's the old chick who, upon preparing to raise some wheat, asks, "Who will help me plant the wheat?" "Not I," says the dog.

"Not I," says the cat.

"Not I," says the pig.

So, she does it herself, as well as the harvesting, the grinding, and even the baking of the bread -- asking for help each time, but receiving none.

Then, when the bread is taken out of the oven all warm and fragrant and covered with butter, she asks, "Who will help me eat the bread?"

Then, of course, the dog, the cat, and the pig are all pushing and shoving to help -- "I will," they say in unison.

At our house, nobody just flat out says they won't help. They're much more subtle than that. Everybody has reasons: "I'd help you, but when I bend over for very long at a time, my back just kills me."

"I'm not really sure which is a weed and which is a vegetable."

"I don't have any gloves."

"I just can't take this summer heat anymore."

"I don't even like stuff from the garden."

So throughout the long, hot summer, I plant and hoe, water and weed, and somehow, with the help of Deep Heat rub and Lanacane, I bring the plants to maturity. Then, I pick and cook.

As I turned the soil over with the hoe and raked it clean, Tommy stood by complaining.

"You can't possibly work this whole patch with a hoe," he said.

Final Day For 1989 Farm Program Signup Is Friday

Program sign-up for the 1989 Acreage Reduction Program (ARP) is drawing to a close.

John Rector, executive director of the Knox County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said operators wishing to participate in the 1989 program are reminded that Friday, April 14 (tomorrow) is the final day to enroll or withdraw from the program without liquidated damages being assessed.

Operators have two weeks additional time to obtain owners signatures on the applications to participate in the 1989 program, until April 28. After that the County Committee has no authority to approve a contract to participate in the 1989 program.

Rector also reminded producers that new payment limitation forms must be completed by all individuals who will receive payments in 1989 and they must be reviewed and approved by the county committee.

Committee members must determine that each applicant is actively engaged in farming, the shares are commensurate and whether they are single or joint requests.

Under current legislation, an operator who does not file a timely operating

plan before the deadline is not eligible to receive payments for the 1989 crop year.

Other information issued to Knox County farmers includes:

May 15, 1989, is the final date to certify any acreage of wheat, barley, rye, oats, or any other small grain crops, regardless of the intended use. This includes small grain cover crops for ACR and CU. A request to leave small grain standing as cover must be filed by May 15.

Producers that are going to graze and/or hay ACR/CU are reminded that the acreage must be baled or substantially grazed off by May 15 since that is the disposition date established for Knox County. Acreage that is found to be in the "hard dough stage" after this time will have to be considered grain for program purposes.

Knox County's non-grazing period is June 1 through October 31.

Producers must report disaster affected acreage prior to making other use of the land. They must certify the crop and file a disaster application (ASCS-574) with the office within 15 days after the crop is abandoned and the acreage is put to another use.

May 22 Selected For Area Uniform Cotton Planting

May 22 has been set as the uniform cotton planting date in Knox County.

The date was agreed upon at a meeting held Monday, April 7, at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Rhineland. Sponsors were the Knox County Boll Weevil Association and the Knox County Crops Committee.

A fish fry was catered by Stanley White of Stephenville, after which the producers and guests were welcomed by Vernal Zeissel, chairman of the boll weevil association. Result demonstrations were recognized by Donnie Pe-

ters, chairman of the Knox County Extension Program Council.

Demonstrators included Gerard Kuehler, Chris Brown, James Albus, B.M. Brown, Zeissel Brothers, Clarence Brown, L.D. and Loyd Welch, R&W Cattle Co., Ken and O.L. Patterson, Bobby Robinson, Bill Baker and Doyle Lowrance.

Emory Boring of Vernon, A&M Extension Service entomologist, discussed the boll weevil outlook for the 1989 cotton crop and explained the importance of a uniform planting date. Sonny Moore, secretary/treasurer of the Knox County boll weevil association, introduced the suggested date and outlined the steps taken in reaching that date. Charles Escobar, chairman of the Knox County crops committee, also had a part in the program.

After the date was selected, Stanley White presented a short program featuring his well-known humorous entertainment.

Tax Rebates Show Increase Locally

Sales tax rebates for the first four months of 1989 are up 13.4 percent over last year's tax allocations for the same period, according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

"The economy is in good shape, which is being reflected in our state and local sales tax collections," Bullock said.

Last year's sales tax rebates through April were up 6.5 percent over the 1987 rebates for the same period, while 1987 rebates through April actually fell 6.3 percent compared to the same period in 1986, Bullock said.

Checks totaling \$57.2 million were sent Friday to 902 cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent.

Munday's sales tax rebate for April totaled \$2,836.93, a 26.34% increase from the same time period in 1988. 1989 payments to date total \$15,468.56, a 4.74% increase compared to 1988 payments.

Knox City received a check for \$5,072.91, a 1.54% increase from this time last year and Goree's \$663.45 check represented a 30.57% increase compared to the same time period in 1988. Benjamin and Weir did not receive checks for the month of April.

April's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in February and reported to the Comptroller's office by March 20.

Bobby Sosolik was promoted to senior vice president, assistant credit manager and Munday branch office manager and Clint Norman was named assistant vice president and assistant Munday branch office manager during an announcement by PCA president John S. Rike, III.

Other promotions included Mike Sloan, first vice president, credit manager elect and association secretary, Central office; Gary Decker, vice president and Stamford branch office manager; Gene Bruce, assistant vice president and assistant Childress branch office manager; Ronnie White, assistant vice president and Spur branch office manager; Mike Guess, assistant vice president and assistant Stamford branch office manager; and Pat Golden, executive secretary and Stamford assistant loan officer.

Bill L. Glenn, first vice president and credit manager, was presented a plaque by John S. Rike III, on behalf of the membership and staff in appreciation of

his 34 years of service to the association. Mr. Glenn, who began his Farm Credit System employment in 1955 in the Spur Branch office where he was named Branch Office Manager the same year, is planning retirement in the fall of this year.

Lance Morris, director, of Crosbyton, gave the board report to the gathering. Rolling Plains PCA is one of the strongest capitalized of all Texas lending institutions with a capital-to-total assets ratio of 28.88%. County Viet Nam Veterans Gather For First Reunion

Coming together as a group for the first time since the Viet Nam conflict ended, Viet Nam veterans from Knox County gathered for a reunion last Saturday afternoon at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Rhineland.

Sixteen veterans of the Viet Nam war showed up at various times throughout

the afternoon and evening to meet with one another during the reunion. Although not an official organization, the Knox County Viet Nam Veterans Association was recently formed and includes those who resided in the county when they went into the service and left for Viet Nam and also those who served in the war and have since established residence within the county. While reunion organizer Jim Cardin of Munday was enthusiastic about the turnout, not all of the county's Viet Nam vets were able to attend. Over forty letters of invitation were sent out, but several who formally resided in the county have moved away and were unable to make it back for the event.

Of the sixteen that attended, branches of military service represented included the U.S. Army, U.S. Air Force and U.S. Marines. A listing of jobs performed in Viet Nam included infantry, demolitions, pilot, flight crew observer, communications, truck driving, computer specialist, armor crewmen, helicopter door gunners, mechanics, military police and advisors. Ranks included both

enlisted and officer, with many years of honorable military service present at the gathering.

While most of the veterans agreed that the treatment they received upon returning to the United States could have been better, no one appeared to have retained bitter feelings and all seemed to be glad that it was over and behind them. Most of the conversations during the evening had a light-hearted tone and many humorous stories were exchanged. Some of the more memorable conversations included stained glass windows and Military Police, a white Pontiac GTO convertible supposedly seen cruising the streets in Viet Nam and lizards that used rather foul language. As you might imagine, you would have had to been in Viet Nam to understand some of these tales. (Actually, a few of us who were there are still having a hard time believing the one about the white GTO convertible!).

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

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
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Beta Chi Chapter Installs New Members April 2
