## Americans Don't Follow Basic Nutrition Guidelines

not eating enough foods considered beneficial in preventing cancer, and Dr. Mary Kinney Sweeten, Texas A\&M nutritionist, says it's an indication people aren't following basic nutrition guidelines.
The survey showed that on a given
day, 40 percent of adults did not eat a fruit and 20 percent did not eat a vegetable. Eighty percent of those
surveyed did not eat any high fiber cereals or whole-grain breads. Researchers looked breads. dietary recall data collected between 1976 and 1980 during the second National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey conducted by the National center for Health Statistics. They survey covered date from 11,658 people.
Blossom Patterson,lead investiga-
tor of the study, said that the tor of the study, said that the date should still largely reflect current
eating pattems, particularly fruitsand vegetables, based on U.S. Department of Agricultural Continuing
Survey data that showed minima changes in the consumption of these foods between 1977 and 1986. Although 24 -hour recall data a not necessarily representative of an individual's usual daily intake, Patterson said, it does give a picture o group intake on any given day. Women followed what's consid ered a better cancer prevention diet than men, and people over 55 had beter diets that younger adults. But
all the groups needed much ment in consumption of fruits, vegetables, and whole grains. Eating more of these increase the fiber in American diets and reduce the amount of fat. "Fruits and vegetables thought to
be of special importance be of special importance to cancer risk reduction are those rich in Vitamins A and C," Patterson explained in a survey report. "But about threequarters of the study population failed ich fruit or vegetable in the day's
re dark green leaf vitamins $A$ and $C$ us fruits, and deep yellow-orange uits and vegetables.

## METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recenily adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed $\$ 5,000$.
Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than $\$ 200$. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount
of loss is now a felony of the third degrec. of loss is now a felony of the third degrec.
Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:
(1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
(2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
