Half the time (about one hour) I fished th motorized lure and caughtseven bass The largest was four pounds. Another hour I used a Jitterbug (also a top water lure) of the same colors. It a scientific test but I was impressed with the action. Instructions on how to use the various powerpak lures are on the back of the carton along with a unique way to clean the motor by covering the hooks with bits of plas ic worm and throwing it in the washing machine.

Iron - Who Needs It? Everyone needs iron, especially growing children and adolescents,
menstruating women and pregnant momen who have the greatest need. Iron is required for growth of new body tissue and increasing blood volume. Iron is also needed to replace blood cells lost through menstruation.
Iron is an essential mineral which plays a role in a variety of body
functions. Its primary role is to carry oxygen and carbon dioxide within the red blood cells from one body tissue to another. Iron is also necessary for the production of energy and to support the immune system.
To help your body absorb more from the foods you eat:

* Include HEME IR
* Include HEME IRON sources. There are two types of iron foods heme iron and nonheme iron. Meat, poultry and fish contain heme iron
which is much more easily absorbed by the body than nonheme iron, found mainly in plant food.
* Remember that Meat Factor. Meat, poultry anf fish also contain a special quality called the Meat Factor which helps the body absorb more eat meat and vegetables together, you absorb more iron from the vegetables or breads/cereals than if you eat them
*Include Vitamin C Sources. Foods

and vegetables help the body absorb more nonheme iron. For example, if you eat citrus fruits along with your
cereal, you will absorb more iron from the cereal than if you eat the cereal alone.
*Be alert to iron absorption blockers. Some foods block the absorption of iron. Coffee and tea (both regular and decaffeinated), whole grains, bran, legumes (beans), spinach and a high fiber intake in general are a few examples of iron absorption blockheme iron sources and/or Vitamin sources to help the body absorb more iron. *Refried beans and tortillas block absorptions of iron, but when com bined with beef, pork, lamb, poultry
or other absorption helpers or ouperruit absorption helpers such as can help the body to absorb more iron.
