She prides herself on having always allowed Joe plenty of 'self-expression'. I never curbed the child," she boasts. And now the children and I are paying the piper. O, don't misunderstand me. Of course I love him and I've never mentioned this to anyone else. But Joe has a terrible temper—absolutely no self-control. Often when he's helping the children with their lessons he'll become provoked at some trifle and snap! he's off. A hectic scene follows, with Judith and Dickey in tears. The last time, he yelled at Judith. "You're dumb, Judy! Just plain dumb! That's why you don't know." I told him I would rather he would never again help with the lessons, and I meant it. O, yes, Joe was never curbed, and his children are suffering in consequence. I'm trying my best at this late date to teach him self-control, but it has meant many unpleasant scenes, without very good results. Oh! why did his mother encourage, yes, actually encourage, those tantrums when

he was small!" And my little friend's eyes snapped.

So let's all take a hint; what may seem "cute" and indicative of a strong mind in a child may become an odious characteristic in an adult.

THE PASSING OF J. N. CAMPBELL

Another hardy old pioneer has crossed the Great Divide that is looming in the offing for us all. Called to the Great Beyond from a long and useful life, and methinks he heard the welcome plaudits as the waves lashed the other shore, and life's sunset flecked the sky with threads of gold.

Though a shaft of marble or a tower of bronze mark his last resting place these cannot compare with the monuments he erected to himself in the hearts of those who knew him. Even though they pierce the heavens the greatest monument that can ever be erected to J. N. Campbell has already been built in the hearts of men who are now scattered to the edges of the world.

A pioneer of the unconquered West he met the exacting tests and the hardships of a new country. A good citizen when neighbors were few and far between, and to the day of his death a right thinking man with those kind the world is blessed with far too few. He was an unheralded hero, a keeper of the confidences of men. A quiet man of whom the world hears little but of a type whose constituents are the foundation of this commonwealth.

He was as gentle as the sunshine, but as uncompromising as the storm when right and justice were involved. His keen sense of justice, his rugged honesty and his brutal frankness marked him as a pioneer. His affability and personal charm always brought back memories

of the days of the sparsely settled west when with a few others he laid the foundation of the Knox county of today.

J. N. Campbell was doing his bit when Knox county was dotted with scattered dug-out homes, when the scourge of drouth cursed its now fertile fields. He helped to build its schools and churches. He saw the passing of the cattleman and the coming of the farmer, a transformation that was like magic. Every man, woman and child who lives in Knox county and enjoys the environs of this garden of the west owes to Mr. Campbell and other pioneers a debt of gratitude. He lived and carried on when it took nerves of steel and a heart of oak to stay.

Let us not forget that along Munday's white way where arc lights glint welcome to the world that once there glowed the camp fire of the trail herding North, and that this wonderful transformation is a part of the life work of our friend who has been called home. Let Munday with its silken terrors, its sturdy business institutions, its superb schools and its churches whose spires rise heavenward and attest to its faith in God, stand as monument to the little man whom the Great Father has called away from us. Let the youth of the town be taught to honor the name and reverse the memory of one whose handiwork is woven into every good institution that makes up this model city.

DOES IT PAY?

We were very much impressed Sunday when reading the Dallas News and saw that one Dallas store had used 16 full pages in that one issue. We could but think of some merchants who live in the small towns who do not believe that advertising pays. When business is dull they tell us that they are not getting enough business to justify advertising. When business is good they tell us they are getting all the business they can do without advertising. When we study the methods of the big business men, and some who are not so successful, we are made to believe there is a reason. And we may be wrong, but we sometimes believe the little town might have been different with men who are of the type of some to be found in the cities. After all, it's us.—Goree Advocate.

Certainly it isn't a difficult matter to determine the successful business concerns in the towns and cities by looking over the newspapers. Business concerns that have grown from small concerns to dominating positions have been persistent advertisers. With them advertising is as much an integral part of their business as is any other phase of their business, in fact, it is the most important factor, for it is the only means by which they can reach the public with their messages. When business is poor—they advertise. When business is good—they advertise. And by watching the progress of these advertisers from year to year one will find that they are continually expanding, and in this instance one of Dallas' most persistent advertisers was announcing its ex-

pansion in order to care for its ever growing business, and the merchant who fails to recognize the value of good advertising is destined to remain in the class in which he has placed himself. He is deliberately depriving himself of the measure of success that has universally rewarded those who advertise persistently and intelligently.

Some merchants have the idea that there is some deep mystery about advertising, but such is not the case. If a customer walks into your store with a request to see a certain item certainly you are sufficiently familiar with that item to explain its merits intelligently to the prospective customer, and after all, that is about all that constitutes good advertising. It isn't price cutting, for everyone knows that merchandise cannot be sold for less than its cost. It isn't the art of misrepresentation, for indeed that policy would bring about dismal failure, but it is a straightforward presentation of the merit of your merchandise offered at its cost plus a reasonable profit.

Many of the successful merchants of Dallas have gone from the smaller towns. Through persistent advertising, backed up by good merchandising methods they have outgrown the small towns and have reached out for greater possibilities, and the business men of all our large cities are composed almost entirely of progressive business men from the smaller towns, and it would be impossible to find one among them who is not a strong believer in advertising.

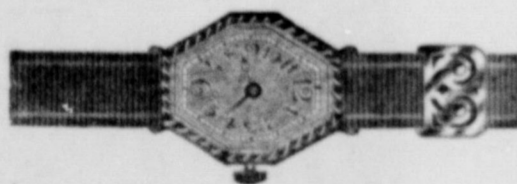

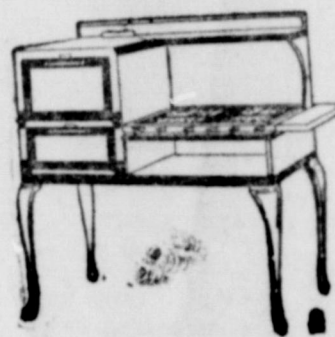
