While local students soak up the sun and relax, school officials are busily preparing for the next school term.

A check around the grounds will show a new sidewalk annex between the junior high and high school. This welcome addition will aid students who must walk between the buildings to go to lockers and classes. The walkway also extends to the band hall. The remaining area between the two schools was sowed in grass to complete the refurbishing.

Plans are also in the making for a new storage building to replace the old ag shop by the tennis courts. The new facility will be located just south of the new bus barns.


At the elementary school, regular summer maintainance is taking place, with no new additions.

The teaching staff will remain the same as last year, with the addition of Christy Workman to the elementary faculty. One position, that of migrant teacher, remains to be filled.

As far as the current school legislation is concerned, local Superintendent Doyle Lowrance expects no tax increases for Munday so long as the present plan for 1991-92 is carried through. The Texas legislature will meet in special session in July in order to come up with funds to support the bill already passed.

On a local level, the County Education District, composed of Knox, King, Cottle and Dickens counties, will hold an organizational meeting Tuesday, July 2, at Munday Elementary School. The purpose of the group is to equalize funding among the schools in these counties. Maynard Moore will represent Munday on the Board of Directors.

All in all, it's been a pretty busy summer for local school officials. Don't they get vacations, too?!

Farm Producers Must Maintain Crop Residue

This is a reminder that producers farming highly erosive land are required to maintain their crop residue. Burning wheat stubble will destroy residue and put them out of compliance. Burning stubble from an average wheat crop sends about \$10.00 worth of nitrogen up in smoke. All nitrogen in residue is lost by burning. Using residue management, however, you can plant into that stubble and use the nitrogen that is tied up in residue.

The use of wheat residue is especially important in the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District, where more than 140,000 acres of wheat are planted annually.

"When residue decomposes on the soil surface, the nitrogen is made available for the next crop. In addition to the nitrogen, decomposing stubble ads organic matter to the soil, helps control erosion, reduces soil

moisture loss, and improves soil aeration, tilth, and permeability. The stubble also helps provide a habitat for such wildlife as dove and quail," stated Stephanie Riethmayer from the Soil Conservation Service.



ployee task force completed the study in April, and the recommended changes were begun immediately.

Overall, WTU plans to reduce its workforce by about eight percent over the next several years through attrition by resignations and retirements. This will be done by reviewing various positions throughout the company. The workforce has already been reduced by 10% during the last five years by following this plan.

Other basic changes include regrouping operations into four divisions from the present six districts; establishment of business operations areas within each division to supervise groups of local offices and produce a smaller and more manageable span of supervision; and the creation of an Operations support group to consolidate the customer accounting and various engineering functions that support customer operations activities. Several departments in WTU's General Office in Abilene have undergone restructuring and reorganization.

Concerning specific local changes, the new Northern Division includes the Childress district, plus the towns of Munday, Spur and Knox City from the Stamford district. Dayton Jackson of Childress, who has been with WTU for 27 years, will be division manager.

One area, as well as the division, will be headquartered in Childress to supervise local offices in that part of the division. Business operations manager for this area will be Pat Buscher of Albany. David Hawk of McCamey will be business operations manager for the Vernon area.

The re-drawing of district lines is not a new concept to WTU. The company has had as many as ten districts in its history and has several times consolidated its districts...in 1929, 1962, and 1976. Each time, the changes were made for the sake of economical company operations, just as today's changes attempt to improve WTU's efficiency to customers now and in the future.

WTU serves 177,000 customers in 52 counties stretching from the Red River to the Rio Grande.



Have you ever made a telephone call and been put on hold? People do this to change phones, transfer a call from one person to another, or to talk to someone in their office while the caller waits. It is a wonderful ability to have.

The only danger in being put on hold occurs when they forget that they did it. I have been put on hold and ten minutes later still be on hold. Someone forgot me, or someone never got the message that I wanted to talk to them. It is easy to become





Social Security Can Be Collected Even With A Full-Time Job

(The following article is courtesy of Patricia Brandt, Social Security Resident Representative in Vernon.)

I received a call recently from a Vernon resident who was just turning 65 and had a question about Medi-

After answering her question, I asked her if she was planning to file for Social Security benefits. She told me that she had not planned onfiling since she was working full time and did not think she would be entitled to any Social Security.

I did some quick figuring and let her know that, even though she was working full time, she was about to lose a sizeable amount of money from Social Security by not filing an application this year. How much? Over \$5,000!

How can this be? Well, the main reason is that in 1990 there was a significant change in the way earnings affect Social Security benefits for people 65 and older. Because of this change, a number of people who otherwise would not have been eligible for benefits can now receive some money from Social Security.

If you are between the age of 65 and 69, you can earn up to \$9,720 in 1991 and get all your Social Security benefits. For every \$3.00 you earn over the \$9,720 limit, \$1.00 is withheld from your benefits. Before the change in the law, the withholding

rate was \$1.00 for each \$2.00 of earnings over the limit. This means there's a good chance you might be due some money from Social Security if you work this year even if your earnings were too high before the change in the law. (For beneficiaries under age 65. the withholding rate is still \$1.00 for each \$2.00 of earnings; if you're 70 or older, the earnings limits do not apply.)

Whether or not you can get benefits depends on your estimated earnings for 1991 and your Social Security benefit amount. But even people who will earn in the neighborhood of \$40,000 this year might be eligible to receive money from Social Security

First, get an estimate of your monthly benefit amount from Social Security and then multiply by 12 to find out what your yearly benefit will be. We have a form you can use to get this estimate. It usually takes about two weeks after you send it in.

Second, determine your estimated earnings for 1991.

Third, divide your earnings by three. If the answer is less than your yearly benefits figured in Step One, then you're probable due some money from Social Security.



Survivors include his wife; two sisters, Audrey Gulley of Munday and Estelline Dixon of Fort Worth; and several nieces and nephews.



At Your Service

Q: Concerning your article on baptism being immersion only, I tend to agree with you. I have to even though my church doesn't teach that. But I just want to know one thing. Does the Bible teach us we are saved by faith

A: One of Satan's most useful weapons is to take plain biblical teachings and make them false by re-defining the terms in the scriptures. Let me illustrate... The state law says it's illegal to steal. Stealing is taking another person's property without permission. Should a thief get caught, after having stolen property from your house while you are on vacation, you would expect him to be arrested and convi cted. What if his defense was: "I believe that stealing occurs only if I take property by forcing my victim with a gun or knife." Should the thief be allowed to "interpret" the law by use of re-definition? Of course not.

God through his Bible tells we are saved by our faith but not by faith alone. In fact, the only place in the Bible where the phrase "faith alone" is used is James 2:24 ... "You see that a person is justified by what he does and not by faith alone." Faith is not simple belief in God but trusting obedience as well. This is made plain in Hebrews 3:18-19 where obedience and belief are used interchangably. Otherwise even the demons would be saved since they have simple belief in God (James 2:19-20).

Salvation can be illustrated this way. A passenger falls overboard while on a ship at sea. Another person throws the drowning man a life perserver. What saved the man's life? Without the free gift of the life perserver, he would have likewise died. Without the drowning man reaching out, grasping and holding on to the perserver, he would have perished. What would have happened if the drowining man had folded his arms and said "this salvation is a free gift, therefore I don't have to do anything." Of course, he would have drowned. The fate that the unfortunate passenger had to do something to be saved did not make the perserver any less of a gift. The person who

tossed the perserver is God, the perserver is the blood of Christ and the action of holding on to the perserver is belief, repentance, confession of Christ and immersion for the forgiveness of sins. Without these, there is no salvation (Romans 5:1; Acts 17:30; 2:38; 1 John 4:2-3, 15; Romans 10:9; Acts 22:16: 1 Peter




