Social Security Can Be Collected Even With A Full-Time Job
(The following article is courtesy

I received a call recently from a I received a call recently from a
Vernon resident who was just turning Vernon resident who was just turning
65 and had a question about Medi65 and had a question about Medi-
care. After answering her question, I
asked her if she was planning to file asked her if she was planning to file
for Social Security benefits. She told me that she had not planned onfiling since she was working full time and did not think she would be entitled to any Social Security. I did some quick figuring and let her know that, even though she was working full time, she was about to lose a sizeable amount of money from Social Security by not filing an application this year. How much? Over
$\$ 5,000$ ! \$5,000!
How can this be? Well, the main
reason is that in 1990 there was a reason is that in 1990 there was a
significant change in the way earnsignificant change in the way earn-
ings affect Social Security benefits ings affect Social Security benefits
for people 65 and older. Because of for people 65 and older. Because of
this change, a number of people who otherwise would not have been eligible for benefits can now receive some money from Social Security. If you are between the age of 65 and 69 , you can earn up to $\$ 9,720$ in 1991 and get all your Social Security benefits. For every $\$ 3.00$ you carn over the $\$ 9,720$ limit, $\$ 1.00$ is withheld from your benefits. Before the
rate was $\$ 1.00$ for each $\$ 2.00$ of earn ings over the limit. This means there's a good chance you might be due you work this year even if your earriings were too high before the chaniin the law. (For beneficiaries under age 65 . the withholding rate is still $\$ 1.00$ for each $\$ 2.00$ of earnings; if you're 70 or older, the carnings limits do not apply.
