

Bloodmobile Falls Short Of Quota

"Give Life - It's In Your Blood" was the theme of the American Red Cross Bloodmobile that came to the Perry Patton Community Center last Monday, October 15.

Even though the quota of 60 pints was not reached, Munday was blessed with 39 productive donors. Forty-four people showed up, ready to donate, but due to health reasons only 39 were able to give blood. At times, even regular donors are not able to give. This makes it even more important for everyone to consider giving blood - so that Munday's quota will be met each time and will provide a plentiful supply of blood in case of medical emergencies.

Donating blood for the first time was Elaine Morgan Reece. Donors who reached the two gallon mark were Charles Pankhurst, Mary Murphy and Pat Hutchinson. Paula Schur has now donated a total of three gallons and is to be commended for her continuing service to the community.

Brenda Smith, who succeeds Latrece Lane as Bloodmobile Coordinator, said, "Although our goal was not met this time, I am impressed at the quality of volunteers who have given their time and efforts for years in such an unselfish and cooperative way."

After giving blood, it is important to rest and restore the blood sugar level by eating. The Munday ladies were complimented by the Bloodmobile Coordinator from the Wichita Falls Center for having a well-supplied refreshment table. Other volunteer workers were Elaine Gulley, Almeda Blair, Ida Oustad and Sue Bryan, who coordinated the canteen; Winters Matthews and Virginia Cary, who registered donors; Ernestine Dickerson, who prepared the blood bags; Betty Hamilton, LVN, who took donor histories and EMT's, Mickie Sanders and Pat Hutchinson, who took temperatures and blood pressures.



Moguls Outdistance Greyhounds, 21-0 In First District Game Of The Year

A small block ad appeared in the Knox County News last week which read:

"Question: What is a Mogul?"

Answer: Lunch for a Greyhound."

1983 was the last time Knox City Greyhounds had anything to chew on as they nibbled by Munday, 15-12.

The Moguls kept their record perfect Friday night as they battled the Greyhounds and came away with a 21-0 victory.

Knox City took the opening kickoff and came out passing, picking up one first down before the Moguls took control on defense. After a 42-yard punt to Munday's 32-yard line, the Moguls drove 68 yards in 10 plays, with Terry Collier scoring on a two-yard run with 5:06 left in the first period. Bobby Dockins kicked the PAT.

Munday held Knox City on their next possession, allowing only three plays and a punt. From the 38-yard line, it took only eight plays this time, as Tyler Thompson scored on a 17-yard run. Dockins kicked the PAT with 1:12 left.

In the second period, Munday sewed lunch three times, as they lost the ball by fumbles. The Greyhounds were unable to chew any yards as the stubborn defensive unit allowed Knox City only five net yardage, while the Moguls had 108 yards running and passing.

The second half, hoping to get back in the game, the Greyhounds tried and onside kick. Munday, from their own 44-yard line, took only four plays to score. Terry Collier carried for 22, Tyler Thompson for 8 and Bobby Dockins for 24, putting the ball on the Knox City one. A penalty moved the pigskin back five yards, but did not stop the Moguls as Terry Collier scored his second time with 10:15 left in the third quarter. Dockins kicked the extra points.

After an exchange of possessions, the Greyhounds, from their own 25-yard line, started nibbling at the Moguls. Knox City drove 71 yards in 15 plays to the Munday 17-yard line, before the Moguls were able to stop them.

In the final quarter, Munday again fumbled on the Greyhound 43, but Knox City was unable to take advantage. The Moguls drove 60 yards to the Greyhound 2-yard line as the game ended with a 21-0 Munday victory.

In Thursday night football action, Knox City defeated Munday's 7th and 8th grade teams, but the Mogul junior varsity trounced the Greyhound JV, by a score of 36-0.

The Moguls face their second district foe of the season, the Paducah Dragons, this Friday night at 7:30 p.m. at Scruggs Field.

COACHES COMMENTS

Our game against Knox City was a very well-played game. Our defense continues to improve. I thought we played extremely well against their offense, which changed a lot in the last few weeks. They had some plays that we hadn't seen them use before, but we adjusted extremely well. Dwayne Redder played his best game of the year.

Offensively, we controlled the football all night. This has long been one of our goals. We executed real well at times. We seemed to have some communications problems, but we're working on those for this week. Our offensive line was soundly blocking Knox City and we were able to average about 8 yards a snap. I was very pleased with this.

Paducah, our opponent this week, will have excellent athletes and will be a challenge for our players. They have an outstanding tailback in Marshall Holcombe. It should prove to be an exciting game.

First Cotton Of The Year Received At Area Gins

Area gins are beginning to take in their first cotton of the season, as local cotton farmers take their strippers to the fields.

Bringing the first cotton to the Rhineland Co-Op Gin was Bill Myers of the Sunset area. Bill received a \$50 check from the Rule Compress on

October 9 for the first bale of cotton brought to them this year. The bale weighed in at 495 pounds.

Bobby Raynes was the first Weinert farmer to bring in a load of cotton

Munday Gin and Seed received their first cotton Monday, October 15, from Rhiney Redder. The load was tagged out at 54 bales and came from a farm near Goree.

At press time, neither the Goree Gin nor Knox Prairie Co-Op had received any cotton, but it won't be long before the yards are backed up with trailers and modules. If the weather holds, area farmers will be taking to the fields in large numbers, as it's "cotton-pickin' time" in Knox County.



The Munday City Council met in special session on Monday, September 24. The purpose of this meeting was to secure liability and property insurance coverage for the City. The current coverage was scheduled to expire on September 30. Three proposals had been submitted for consideration. After reviewing all three proposals, Alderman David Booe made a motion to allow the Mayor and the City Administrator to select the best package offered and to purchase the new policy for one year, with coverage to commence October

1. The motion was seconded by Matthews. All in favor.
Motion was made by Booe to adjourn. Seconded by Oustad. All for. Meeting adjourned.

The City Council of the City of Munday met October 9 in regular session at City Hall at 7:00 p.m.

Motion by Andrade to pay bills as follows: Airport, \$41.44; ambulance, \$1,379.05; swimming pool, \$31.88; and operating, \$15,898.28.

Motion to adjourn by Tucker. Seconded by Andrade. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned.



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



The Fishing Doc

By "Doc" Fitzgerald

MILLERS CREEK RESERVOIR

Level: full
Temperature (at surface): 75°F
Condition: clear

Black Bass: Fair. Largest reported at 4 1/2 lbs. Hitting top water and shallow lures. Best colors are gold, sand and black.

Striper: Fairly good to 9 lbs. on trolling lures near dam areas. Also running in creeks taking live large minnows, small perch, Rat L Traps and PowerPack lures.

White Bass: Good in creeks during feeding runs. Taking jigs and minnows. Some are being caught on dry flies, too. Be careful not to harm small feeding fry.

Crappie: Excellent. Cool weather has started feeding runs. Taking chartreuse combination jigs and minnows. Hitting various depths.

Catfish: Slow to fair. A few nice cats caught in creeks by rod and reel on blood, fresh liver and live minnows. Very few reported on trotlines.

Carp & Buffalo: Excellent on Tan Bait, minnows and worms. Largest reported at 12 lbs.

Fishing Tip

Q: Where's the best place to catch trout in Texas? Why don't we have a native species?

A: Let me answer your last question first. Trout require cold running water all year long. Texas waters are basically too warm and are not dependably running all year long. (There are a few exceptions, though.) Summer waters in Texas cause what few (very few) stocked trout to become turtle food.

Copper Breaks State Park and Possum Kingdom are two areas which stock winter trout. The best Texas

waters where I've caught large rainbows is the Trinity River in Fort Worth. In fact, my largest Texas rainbow (4 1/2 lbs.) was taken there. At the time, it was less than one pound from the state record.

I have heard of the possibility of a stocking in Knox County this winter.

The "trick" to catching trout is to be quiet, use ultra light tackle, and to chum bait where your hook is. Hooks should be no larger than a number 8. My favorite bait for stocked trout (in any state) is plain old inexpensive canned corn. Corn is one of the major foods of stocking tanks. Native trout are not quite as fond of corn, though. Other baits include: Tan Bait, marshmallows, salmon eggs, dough bait, worms, dry flies, small spinning lures, etc.

At Your Service

Q: How can you expect a man of science to accept your Bible as being from a god and without error?

A: Since I have been both a scientist and a preacher, I can truthfully say that any person who is open to the evidence of the Bible will come to realize that it comes from a superior being (God) and is without error. Science does not testify against the Bible. In fact, two aspects of science favor the Bible.

First, the Bible has many instance of scientific foreknowledge which would be impossible for the time of its writing. The Bible was written over a period of over two to three thousand years ago, yet it contains scientific knowledge only recently discovered. A few of these examples are: the fact that the earth is in space (Leviticus 14); the necessity of isolating communicable diseases (Leviticus 13:45); the necessity of washing in running water as opposed to stagnate (Leviticus 14); the fact that the earth is round (Isaiah 40:22); the fact that the sea has currents (Psalms 8:8 - it was the reading of this passage that lead M.F. Maury to discover sea currents); the northern black hole (Job 26:7); the movement of the planets (Job 38:31-32); the fact that woman produces "seed" and not just man in reproduction (Genesis 3:15); the infinite number of stars in the universe (Genesis 13:16; 15:5; Jeremiah 33:22). Where did this knowledge come from?

Second, the Bible is in complete harmony with proven scientific principles. There are a few theories which seem to contradict the Bible but all

proven principles are in harmony. Such principles include: Light being created before the existence of stars (a very recent Einsteinian discovery - compare with Genesis 1:1, 17-18); and the Spencerian five-fold manifestations of the unknown in existence (time, force, action, space and matter) which is the five-fold elements of the very first verse of the Bible. "In the beginning" (time); "God" (force); "created" (action) "the heavens" (space); "and the earth" (matter) is the content of Genesis 1:1. Moses used the language of his time but the concept is entirely rational and certainly Spencerian over three thousand years prior to Spencer's birth (Henry Spencer, 1820-1903).

Other evidence that the Bible is from God and without error includes: it claims to be God's very words (or breath) (2 Timothy 3:16-17; 2 Peter 1:21, etc.); the history of the Bible, the uniqueness of the Bible, biblical

archaeology, fulfillment of specific prophecy, the pragmatic argument (it works in our lives), its realistic picture of its heroes, and its ability to produce faith.

I have found that many who criticize the Bible have not really studied it. If you wish to prove me wrong, spend some time on a daily basis, reading the Bible in a modern translation and we'll discuss it.

The seminar, attended by 76 justices of the peace from Region 10, was held in compliance with Supreme Court rule and statute of the Texas government code.

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


