District Track Meet Is This Week

The District 9-A track meet will be held at the Phillip McAfee Track in Munday on Thursday and Friday, April 14-15. Schools eligible for track competition in the district are Munday, Knox City, Benjamin, Goree, Weinert, Aspermont, Paint Creek, Rochester, Rule and Lueders-Avoca.

Field events will begin at 4:30 p.m. Thursday with the boys' high jump, shot put and pole vault and the girls' long jump and discus. Set for 6 p.m. are boys' long jump and discus and girls' triple jump, shot put and high jump.

Running preliminaries will get underway at 10 a.m. Friday and will continue until approximately 1 p.m. A lunch break will follow, and the Munday Booster Club will operate a concession stand near the track. Running finals begin at 3 p.m. with the final races, the 1600 meter relay, set for 5 p.m.

Both Mogul and Moguelette teams are expected to make an extremely good showing, and as many fans as are able to attend the meet should be in the stands to support the local teams.

Musical Program Slated Saturday To Help Band

Anyone who enjoys listening to various types of musical entertainment should be sure to attend the band benefit set for 7 p.m. Saturday, April 16, at the Munday High School auditorium. Hosted by the Minor Chords barbershop quartet, the show was designed to help send the MHS Purple Cloud band to Austin next month for the capitol centennial celebration.

Also performing will be the Munday Community Choir, the Country Gold band of Munday, River Bend, which features musicians from Munday, Knox City and Seymour, guitarist/singer Tommy Guy Waldrip of Knox City and the Four

Friends gospel group of Haskell.

Band members will also be doing advertising spots promoting businesses who are helping sponsor the program, and some surprises are promised in the course of the entertainment.

Tickets will be available at the door, and it is hoped that the auditorium will be packed with music lovers and others who want to help the band in this effort.

Tax Rebate Checks Reflect Recovery

Knox County is still showing an economic upswing, according to statistics sent this week by State Comptroller Bob Bullock, who also issued checks to the cities which levy a one cent city sales tax. The county received almost \$6,000, over 34 percent more than the amount gained last March.

Munday's April check was for \$2,245.40, compared to \$1,704.71 at this time last year. The city's total tax rebate for the first four months of 1988 was \$14,768.80, a 19.24 percent jump from 1987. Goree received \$508.11 this month, for a four-month total of \$2,718.67, which is a 44.90 percent increase from last year.

Knox City coffers were enlarged by \$4,996.02 this month, a \$1,500 increase from April, 1987. Their year's total is \$26,299.68, up 25.28 percent from 1987. Benjamin and Weinert did not receive checks this month.

Court Cases Heard By District Judge

In district court held April 6 in Benjamin, District Judge David Hajek arraigned four defendants on separate charges. Brought before the judge were Derrick Hardin, burglary of a vehicle; Rudy Jacques, delivery of cocaine; Anita Collier, delivery of marijuana; and Linda McCrary, theft.

The judge also heard the case of Gilbert Sinor on a change of venue from King County. The defendant pled guilty to a charge of driving while intoxicated, third offense, and was sentenced to ten days mandatory jail time with a four-year probation and suspension of the subject's drivers license for 180 days. In addition, the defendant was ordered to pay a \$1,500 fine plus court costs in the amount of \$374.50.

The state was represented by District Attorney Tom Schrandt.

Local Spelling Bee Winner Competes In District Contest

Michele Berryhill, winner of the Munday Elementary School spelling bee, traveled to Wichita Falls Saturday, April 9, to compete in the Times Record News North Texas District Spelling Bee. The event started at 10 a.m. and was held at the Women's Forum.

Out of 37 contestants, Michele placed 12th in the competition. After spelling several words correctly, Michele's hope of victory was dashed when she misspelled the word "flotilla".

Last year's winner, Christy Mitchell, who placed seventh in the Scripps Howard National Spelling Bee in Washington, D.C. was defeated by challenger Stephen Rhone of Episcopal School in the 21st round after two and one half hours of competition.

Michele is the sixth-grade daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Buford Berryhill.

Baseball Tryouts Planned April 23

Tryouts for the Munday Pee Wee and Little League teams will be held at 3 p.m. Saturday, April 23, at the Little League field. All boys and girls who will be seven years old by August 1, 1988, and who will not be older than 12 by that date are eligible to try out for a team and are encouraged to become involved in the summer baseball season.

Youngsters participating in the program will be required to bring a \$10 entry fee with them to the tryouts. Pee Wee participants will also have to pay for a team t-shirt at a later date.

Daniel Ramirez, president of the Munday Little League Association, has announced that the annual workday at the baseball field will begin at 1 p.m. the day of the tryouts. Prospective ball players and parents are urged to come to the field at 1 o'clock so everyone can pitch in and get the field in shape for the 3 o'clock tryouts.

Regional Qualifiers To Practice Here

A regional qualifiers' track meet will be held at the McAfee Track in Munday on Friday, April 22. Regional track competition will be held the following week.

Events will begin at 4 p.m. and the competition will probably continue until approximately 9 p.m., according to Munday athletic director Jim Edwards.

Puppet Show To Benefit Munday Ambulance Fund

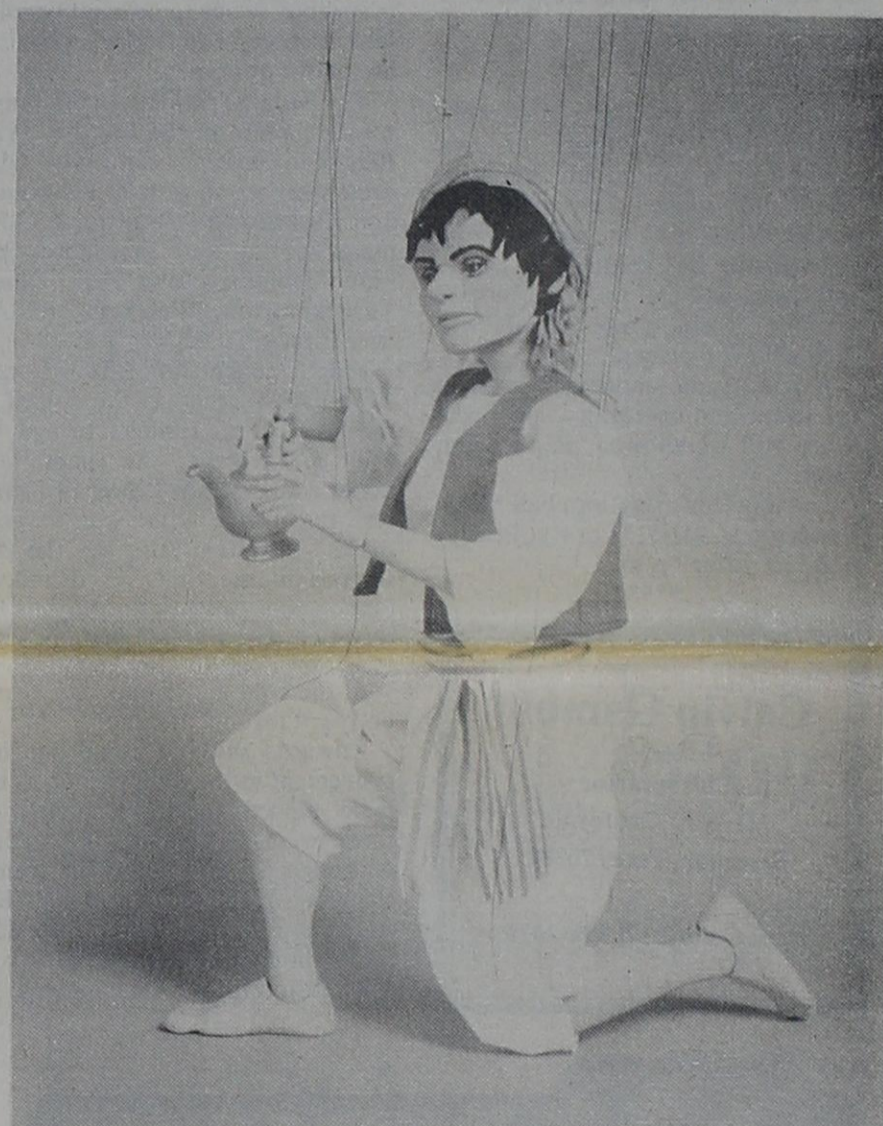

PCA Members Elect Director And Hear Financial Reports

Lance Morris, a PCA member from Crosbyton, was elected to a three-year term as director of the board at the annual Production Credit Association meeting held last week in Childress and Stamford. Other board members are W.J. Boykin of Childress, B.H. DeBusk of Anson, Dan Henard Jr. of Wellington and Garon Tidwell of Munday.

Williard H. 'Snooks' Williams of Spur, a Rolling Plains PCA director since 1976, was presented a plaque by Garon Tidwell, chairman of the meeting, on behalf of the membership and staff in appreciation of his 12 years on the board. Williams, who elected not to place his name in nomination for the director's position this year, served as vice-chairman of the board for the last eight years.

Henard gave the board report to the gathering. With a capitol-to-total assets ratio of 30.21 percent, Rolling Plains PCA is one of the strongest capitalized of all Texas lending institutions. A 1987 net profit of \$690,645 enabled the association to further strengthen its financial base. The surplus and allowance for loan losses accounts are now some 207 percent greater than they were eight years ago, despite the most adverse climate seen in agriculture since the 1930's.

Considerable improvement in the credit quality of Rolling Plains PCA's loan portfolio coupled with net loan losses of less than half

those incurred in 1987 enables PCA to maintain some of the most economical interest rates in the territory.

The nominating committee report was given by Kyle Josselet of Munday, chairman. Elected to serve on the 1989 nominating committee were Steve Piper of Paducah for the Childress office, Stuart Dixon for the Matador office, Don Walker for the Stamford office, Alton Sander of Weinert for the Munday office and Williard H. Williams for the Spur office.

President John S. Rike III reviewed highlights of the fiscal 1988 operating results and amendment to the 1987 Farm Credit Act in the report of management. Rollin Plains PCA experienced its most profitable year since 1983.

Through an amendment to the Farm Credit bill, the Farm Credit System Financial Assistance Corporation assessed Rolling Plain PCA \$743,305 in March. This assessment was part of a law passed by Congress and thus was not eligible for lawsuit as was the 1986 lev in the amount of \$1,900,000 blocked by court action. Because of the association's capital strength the \$743,305 assessment will not initiate additional restraints by regulators. Under the terms of the 1987 Farm Credit Act, this will be the only assessment allowed.

Truscott Rancher Honored As Oldest Active Producer

Truscott farmer and rancher Edgar Jones, 84, was named the "oldest producing producer" in the Texas Department of Agriculture's 18-county Vernon District as part of the district's observance of Texas Agriculture Week.

Jones received his award in a special ceremony during the commissioner's court meeting held Monday at the courthouse in Benjamin. District supervisor Ronald Bertrand made the presentation.

The Truscott resident operates 10 sections in which he farms 3,000

acres of wheat and hay. He also raises high quality commercial Hereford cattle. Jones said he started in agriculture at a young age, being born and raised on his ranch, and continues because "I like the work."

The selection of the district's oldest producer was based on applications received by the district office, Bertrand said. "We just wanted to do something for the folks who have had the staying power to continuously provide food and fiber for the rest of us."

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GEARING UP FOR DISTRICT

Munday Teams Score Track Meet Victories

Braving high winds and chilly rain, both Mogul and Mogulette track teams were victorious in their respective meets last weekend, regaining their momentum before the district track meet is held here late this week.

The Mogulettes, the only Class A team at the Amarillo Relays Friday and Saturday, finished with 150 points and a huge trophy, edging out Class AA Panhandle, which put together 143 1/2 points. Class 3-A Dalhart was third with 134.

"The times were slow because the wind was blowing so hard," commented girls' coach Gina Farmer. "It was a really good experience for the girls to run against athletes from bigger schools and to see very fast 4-A and 5-A runners in their meet."

The coach handed out special praise to Kathy Wilde, who missed three days of school last week but "came through with flying colors" in the hurdles and triple jump and notched personal best efforts in hurdles and in the long jump. Mindy Myers tied the meet record with her personal best in the high jump. The field events athletes recorded 37 points, and sprint and distance runners turned in equal performances.

"I think we impressed a lot of people," Farmer concluded. "Now, everybody seems to be healthy going into district, and we're optimistic about our prospects."

The Moguls racked up 133 points for first place in the Panther Pride Relays in Seymour Saturday. Childress was second with 97-1/3 points, and Electra had 90 for third. Other teams scoring were Jacksboro, Seymour, Holliday, Iowa Park, Olney, Throckmorton, Woodson and Archer City.

Mogul coach Jim Edwards also cited bad weather as the culprit in the slow times runners turned in. "On an average, the times were about four seconds slower per quarter. But if the wind was at your back, you could sure see the difference in the times or distances. Some teams pulled out of meets because of the weather, and we were concerned about pulled muscles, with the cold and damp, but everybody got through it okay."

Edwards said he could see improvement in the field events, as the team placed special emphasis on those events in last week's practice. Although hopeful about the team's chances in the district meet, Edwards said Rochester and Knox City teams should give Munday plenty of competition for the team trophy.

WHEN TO CALL YOUR CHILD'S PHYSICIAN

At one time or another, every child has some kind of physical trauma -- a cut on the head, a broken arm, a wasp sting. Amid the flowing tears, parents have to decide whether to call the doctor, make a trip to the emergency room or treat the child at home.

If you don't feel confident about such decisions, consider some ways to gain competence and confidence in handling these situations. Reading a good book on children's health and family medical care is a start. Taking a first aid course and a course on cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) will also help equip you for emergencies.

Understand that some situations require an urgent call to your child's doctor, while others can wait for regular office hours. But don't worry about making a mistake in deciding which is urgent and which is not. If you're in doubt, frightened or seriously concerned, call immediately.

The medical experts tell us that urgent situations include the following:

- *Losing consciousness.
- *Any ingesting of a known or suspected toxic substance.

You can also get help from a Poison Control Center. The number for our area is 409-765-1420; be sure and write it down by the phone. This is a toll call.

- *Impairment of breathing accompanied by a change in color of the skin, including the lips, fingertips or general skin surface.
- *Bleeding from nose that cannot be stopped, or bleeding from the mouth, ear or bowel.
- *Temperature of 103 degrees or above.
- *An accident in which you suspect damage to the head, back or limbs.
- *Persistent vomiting beyond a two-hour period.

Parents can't be prepared for everything, but they can learn enough to handle minor illnesses and injuries and know which situations require a trip to the doctor.

SLOW COOKER SAFETY

How safe is food prepared in a slow cooker? If it's done properly, slow cooking is safe. The potential problem in using a cooker is the time it takes the pot to heat to bacteria-killing temperatures, which is generally about two hours.

For tasty - and safe - slow-cooked dishes, remember these precautions:
*Keep perishable foods refrigerated until you're ready to use them. Refrigeration prevents rapidly reproducing bacteria from getting a head start in the two-hour danger period.

*Don't use frozen meat or poultry. It takes longer for frozen foods to reach bacteria-killing temperatures. Using frozen meat or poultry can also result in undercooking since the cooking times given in most recipes are based on thawed ingredients.

*Don't overload the cooker. Portions of meat or vegetables rising above the cooking area won't fully

cook. Also, when too much food is stuffed into the pot, it will take longer to cook it thoroughly. Since overloading can delay cooking and make thorough cooking uncertain, it raises the chance of bacterial growth.

*Don't use a cooker for large cuts of meat, like a roast. Even after the pot reaches temperatures hot enough to destroy bacteria on the roast's outside, it will take longer for these temperatures to penetrate to the center of the roast. As a result, it may be undercooked.

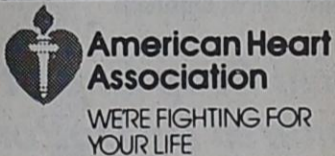
*Don't use a slow cooker to heat leftovers. They need to be reheated at high temperature to kill bacteria. Reheating leftovers in the cooker spells danger because the pot doesn't heat fast enough.

Munday Girls Stand Out At Junior High Meet

Munday junior high track teams made their presence felt at the district track meet held April 7 in Aspermont. The junior high Mogulettes overwhelmed their competition, racking up 234 points for the first place trophy. Runner-up Knox City/O'Brien could only put together 131 points, and third place Aspermont was far behind with 67. Other teams involved were, in order of finish, Lueders-Avoca, Rochester Goree, Rule, Weinert and Benjamin.

The Munday Braves also had an outstanding meet, finishing a close second to Knox City/O'Brien. The point margin was 144½ to 130, and Goree was close behind with 128½ points for third. Bringing up the lower totals in the schedule were Paint Creek, Rochester, Rule, Aspermont, Weinert and Lueders-Avoca.

"The girls really did a great job," said Mogulette coach Gina Farmer. "The times weren't as good as they could have been, but we weren't pushed very hard in most events. They have had an outstanding season, and our eighth graders will score some points for the varsity track team next year."

Munday junior high boys' coach Bill Green had praise for all his team and especially pointed out the mile relay team, which closed a big gap to edge Goree by less than a half-second to win.

Employees Attend Training Course

Jimmy Urbanczyk and David Wolsch, service technicians at Parker Implement in Munday, have just completed a five-day intensive training course at the Case IH service training center in Racine, Wisconsin. The course emphasized the new Case IH 7100 Series tractors, called the Magnum line.

Treat Minor Sports Injuries Rapidly

There's something about the warm spring air and sunny Texas skies this time of year that brings out sports enthusiasts. The Texas Medical Association knows that this zest for exercise can result in many minor injuries. Knowing how to treat these injuries will ease your pain and hasten the healing process, says TMA.

Pulled muscles, sprains and strains are the most common recreational sports injuries. They happen most often when the athlete tries to do too much too soon.

Pulled muscles occur when the muscle is over-stretched and some of the fibers tear. Recovery usually is quick, although the muscle is painful in the meantime.

Sprains occur in joint areas such as the knee, ankle, and wrist. Ligaments, the tissues that connect neighboring bones and keep the joint in place, are torn. When you sprain a ligament, it is painful to use that joint, and there may be swelling

and skin discoloration.

When tendons are stretched or torn, it is called a strain. Tendons are the tissues that connect muscles to bones and other tissue.

The key to treating these injuries is to act fast. Apply ice to the injured area as soon as possible.

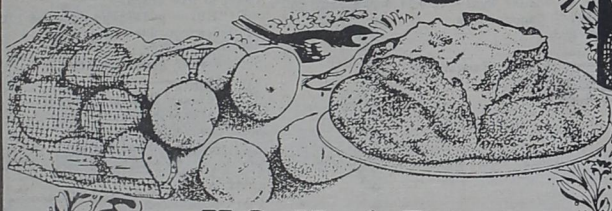
