loans for losses caused by hail, high winds, excessive rainfall and abMay 19, 1985 and December 12, 1985, are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office in Knox City, FmHA county supervisor Joe T. Boone said Friday.

Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting
from the drought. from the drought.
eligible for loans of up to may be 80 percent of their actual losses, or the operat ing loan needed to continue in business, or $\$ 500,000$, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain
credit from private commercial credit from private commercial
lenders, the interest rate on the first $\$ 100,000$ borrowed is 5 percent; interest is 8 percent on the balance borrowed over that amount. For farmers who can obtain commercial
credit but who choose to borrow credit but who choose to borrow 13.75 percent.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan, Boone
said. Farmers participating in the said. Farmers participating in the
PIK or federal crop insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.
Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until December 3, 1986, but possible. Delays in applying could possible. Delays in applying could
create backlogs in processing and possibly carry over into the new
farming season, Boone stated. FmHA is a credit agency of the is authorized to provide disaster mergency loans to recognized emergency loans to recognized
farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S.
citizens, and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.
