

**Boll Weevil Eradication** Meeting will be October 24

The Central Rolling Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone is scheduled to vote on the referendum this November. This zone covers Knox, Baylor, Archer, Stonewall, Haskell, Throckmorton, Young, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Shackelford, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Mitchell, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan and Eastland counties. The ballots will be mailed out by the ASCS office to those eligible to vote.

Many landowners and producers have questions about the eradication process and the referendum. These questions will be discussed at a boll weevil eradication meeting Monday, October 24 at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Rhineland. The program will begin at 7:30 p.m. and will end after the last question or concern is discussed.



### **Munday ISD Board of Trustees** meets October 13

The Munday Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session on Thursday, October 13, 1994, at 8:00 p.m. in the administreation building. Following roll call, approval of the minutes of the previous meeting, and payment of the bills, action was taken on several items.

The first item approved was approval for the Munday ISD to join the Compact for Safe Schools. This is a pledge by the Munday ISD to become a safe haven for students. It is also a pledge that a quality education will be provided for all students and the school district will not tolerate wespons, assalts, and drugs. This is intended to be a collaborative effort by students, families and the community.

Also adapted was Update 46 to the local policy manual. This update will bring the local policy manual in line with new state policies approved in the last year.

Reports were heard from Bob Bowen concerning the concession stand at the football field, from Phil Hall on plans for a new program he hopes to institute, and on the cash award received by Munday Elementary and Munday High School from the Texas Successful School Award System for significant gain on the TAAS test.

The meeting adjourned following reports about upcoming projects to update the lighting and sound in the high school auditorium, a new school bus, and work on a greenhouse for the Ag program.




### Myers' watch grandson lead team to victory

The Myers plan to be on hand when the top 2 teams in Zone 1 and 2 play the 9th grade championship the first part of November.





### Mayor's Proclamation Texas Pharmacy Week 1994

WHEREAS, the need for efficient, cost-effective health care is of primary importance to all citizens of our community, and

WHEREAS, prescription and non-prescription medication is recognized as a vital element in effective health care, and

WHEREAS, nearly two billion prescriptions are dispensed annually with one of three Americans receiving no information about these medicines before they take them, and

WHEREAS, due primarily to lack of information on the part of patients, approximately one-half of all prescriptions are used incorrectly, contributing to prolonged illness, avoidable side effects, unnecessary hospitalizations, and even death, and

WHEREAS, the local pharmacists of our community are the recognized professionals who specialize in the proper use of medications, and

WHEREAS, these professionals are dedicated to increasing communication about prescription medicines thereby improving the health of all Texans,

ambulance, fire department, Knox County Sheriff's Department, Knox City Police Department, motorists, Department of Public Safety, funeral escorts, car repo, and citizens with dead car batteries or locked doors.

# New RFG fuel will be a "breath of fresh air"

What a blessing, the automobile. It takes us downtown to the office, gets us around the neighborhood on chores, and speeds us on superhighways from state to state. It's the most convenient, versatile, and economical form of transportation in history.

What a problem, the automobile. No matter how much we love it, the family car is a year-round polluter, thanks to the gasolines on the market and years of regulatory neglect. And as seasons change, so do the health hazards associated with conventional automotive fuels.

In winter, the risk of exposure to carbon monoxide rises dramatically. When inhaled, carbon monoxide interferes with the ability of blood to absorb oxygen. Yet, all too often, it goes undetected - we can't see it, we can't smell it, and we can't taste it. Cold weather causes engines to burn less efficiently and produce more of this toxic fume. At the same time, atmospheric conditions may cause ambient levels to rise as much as

With the return of warm weather comes the danger of ozone pollution. Not stratospheric ozone, which shields life from harmful ultraviolet radiation, but low level ozone, or "smog," which is formed when hydrocarbons react with nitrous oxide (NOx) in the presence of sunlight. Low level ozone turns trees brown and stunts vegetation. Its effects on human life are no less damaging. It can scar our lungs, produce biochemical changes in lungs or red blood cells, and weaken our immune systems. Those most affected by ozone are those who work, play, or exercise outdoors, a category that includes all young children, athletes of all ages, and many workers.

Year-round hazards produced by

cans in even the most environ- United States Environmental Promentally-distressed areas have begun breathing easier about their health, the environment, and their lifestyle.

The reason? Cleaner burning, more environmentally-friendly fuels. To some, the terminology is still new - "oxygenated" fuels -"reformulated gasoline" - MTBE (methyl tertiary butyl ether) - ethanol - and, the most recently developed weapon in the war against air pollution, ETBE (ethyl tertiary butyl ether) - but wherever the new fuels have been used, the bencfits have been dramatic.

During the winter of 1992-93 the first nationwide oxygenated fuels program, designed to reduce levels of carbon monoxide, was implemented under the Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) described the program's success as "overwhelming": in 26 metropolitan areas where the program debuted, bad carbon monoxide air quality days were reduced 95%.

The EPA's mandate from Congress was to establish even more rigorous criteria for RFG (Reformulated Gas), including at minimum a 15% reduction of summertime VOC (Volatile Organic Compound) emissions as well as a 15% drop in year-round emissions of air toxics compared to those of use of motor fuels. conventional gasoline.

Further guidelines include a minimum oxygen content of 2%, maximum benzene content of 1%, no heavy metal (lead or manganese) content, and, to minimize vapor emissions, a reduction in Reid Vapor Pressure.
