I'm going to play Andy Rooney
today and get a few things off my
chest. Ever since I first became a
part of the Body of Christ, over 15
years ago, there have been a few
things about the Church institu-
tion that have always bothered me.

First, it has always bothered me
that we fight so much amongst
ourselves. I don't mind having
different denominations. I think
variety is great, and there is room
for a lot of different methods and
practices under the banner of our
faith. What bothers me is the
hostility, competitiveness, and
suspicion which exist between
differing denominations, and even
sometimes, between people within
the same denomination. (Or even
the same church!) What hope can
we have to reconcile the world to
Christ, if we can't even reconcile
ourselves to each other?

And why is it, in a church which
worships a God who cares about
our hearts and minds and who
views us all the same, that we
choose our time of worship to
wear all our best clothes? Who are
we trying to impress? God? Surely,
the One who crafted the universe
and existed before all time is going
to be less than amazed by any
piece of brightly colored cloth I
choose to tie around my neck,
even if it was woven together out
of strands made by bug larva! (silk)

And where did we get all these
labels: fundamentalist, liberal,
charismatic, conservative, penta-
costal, evangelical. When will we
learn that there is only one name
that is really important, the name
of Jesus! More importantly, when
will we learn that we can't claim

that Name by simply painting it
on our signs or printing it in our
bulletins? The Name must be
written on our hearts and commu-
nicated through our lives!

I could go on and on with this
list, but then I would need to ask
myself a question. When will I
learn that listing off all the things
I don't like about another person
or organization can be just an-
other way for me to obscure my
own faults and short-comings?

I realize that fighting between
members of the Body of Christ,
dressing up for church, and label-
ing different factions of Christi-
anity were all going on long be-
fore my birth, and they may well
continue long after I am gone. I
have no control over what hap-
pened before, and Jesus, himself,
said to "save tomorrow for tomor-
row", but I can, to a degree, con-
trol my own actions. I can stop
beating up the church for its short-
comings, and face my own. I can
realize that the church is only made
of people. People just like you and
me. And I can love those people,
and serve those people, and serve
my God.

Forget the excuses, forgive the
shortcomings. The people in
church are no better or worse than
anyone else.

Go to church. Go to a church.
Love the people. Forgive the
people. You need them . . . and
they need you.

meets October 13**

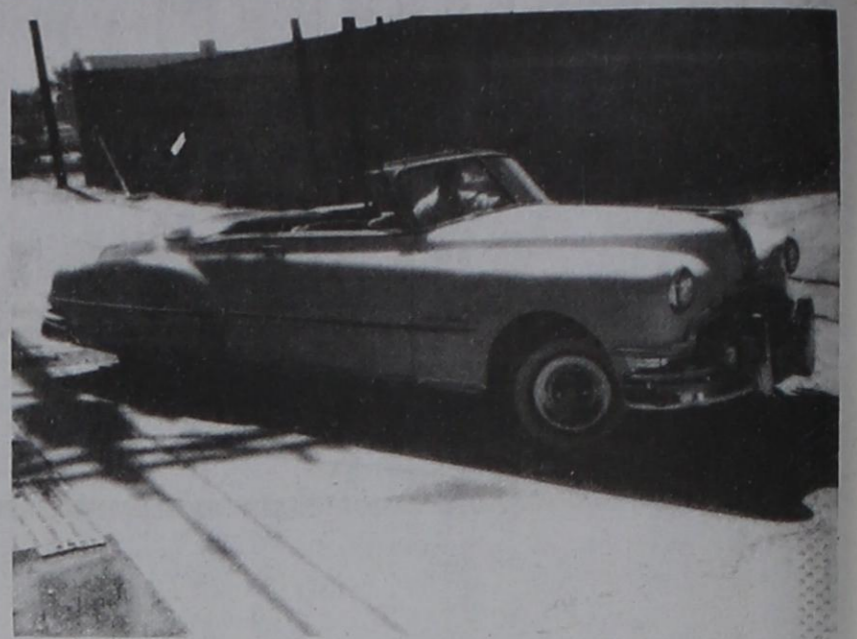
The Munday Independent
School District Board of Trustees
met in regular session on Thurs-
day, October 13, 1994, at 8:00
p.m. in the administration build-
ing. Following roll call, approval
of the minutes of the previous
meeting, and payment of the bills,
action was taken on several items.

The first item approved was
approval for the Munday ISD to
join the Compact for Safe Schools.
This is a pledge by the Munday
ISD to become a safe haven for
students. It is also a pledge that a
quality education will be provided
for all students and the school
district will not tolerate weapons,
assaults, and drugs. This is intended
to be a collaborative effort by
students, families and the com-
munity.

Also adapted was Update 46 to
the local policy manual. This
update will bring the local policy
manual in line with new state
policies approved in the last year.

Reports were heard from Bob
Bowen concerning the concession
stand at the football field, from
Phil Hall on plans for a new pro-
gram he hopes to institute, and on
the cash award received by Mun-
day Elementary and Munday High
School from the Texas Successful
School Award System for signifi-
cant gain on the TAAS test.

The meeting adjourned follow-
ing reports about upcoming proj-
ects to update the lighting and
sound in the high school auditor-
ium, a new school bus, and work
on a greenhouse for the Ag pro-
gram.

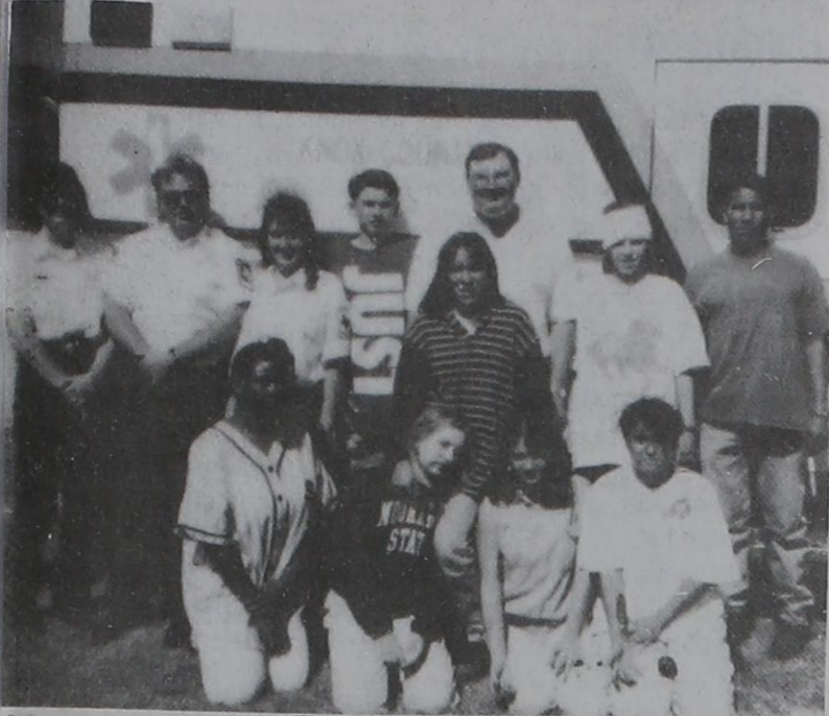

Disaster drill held at Goree School last week

Goree firemen, Knox County EMS personnel, Lone Star Gas employees and West Texas Utilities employees joined forces on Wednesday, October 12, for a mock disaster to familiarize students and faculty of Goree School with emergency procedures in case of a real disaster.

Goree fire chief, Slick Myers, notified emergency organizations and 9-1-1 dispatchers on Monday of plans for a mock explosion at the school to see how quickly all units could respond and the students and faculty could evacuate the building.

The drill began at 1:30 p.m. when secretary, Donna Cotton, made the 9-1-1 call to report an explosion in the building. 9-1-1 dispatcher, Barbara Ainsworth, immediately paged Goree fire department and Munday EMS as school fire alarms were sounded and teachers quickly evacuated the students to a designated place on campus.

Members of the drama club were victims with Crystal Hibdon pretending to suffer from smoke inhalation and internal injuries;

Crystal Huffman, a broken leg and deep lacerations of the thigh; Latisha Allen, third degree burns to the right side of her face; Emily Flores suffered lacerations to the right forearm; Stephanie Latham escaped with emotional shock and minor injuries to her right arm. Art Ramos and Mike Hernandez were not so lucky however, with Art suffering deep lacerations to the throat which would probably be fatal and Mike dead on scene.

The students had fun pretending to need emergency medical assistance, but all agree it was good to know it was just a class assignment.

Emergency units, as well as electricity and gas personnel, responded immediately with students being evacuated in record time. The students learned a lesson on the importance of getting out of the building in a swift, orderly fashion and that emergency help is only a 9-1-1 call away if the situation should ever be other than "just pretend".

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station jointly operate an experimental ranch (the Y Ranch) in southern Foard and Cottle counties. Thursday, October 27 these two organizations will be conducting a field day on the Y Experimental Ranch.

Topics to be covered on this field day include: Body Condition and Effect on Rebreeding, Shipping Stress, Old World Bluestem Grazing and Destocking Protocols, Brush Management and Quail Nest Depredation and Fire Effects on Population and Movement.

The field day will run from 9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. A registration fee of \$10 will be charged to cover the cost of a meal and printed materials. More information is available upon request.

The Texas Sheep & Goat Commodity Board recently mailed out ballots for their biennial election. If interested in voting, a ballot may be received through the Extension office.

All youth interested in showing animals at the 1995 Knox County Junior Livestock Show should be busy preparing for this event. Many individuals have already purchased their animals, others are still looking. Here are some important dates to remember: November 14 - hatch date for broilers; November 15 - all swine, sheep and cattle must be owned and validated, breeding rabbits must be owned; November 29 - market rabbits must be owned.

Anyone wishing to show animals at the Knox County Junior Livestock Show must contact their supervisor - Ag. Science teacher or County Extension agent - prior to November 15. Those needing assistance in locating animals to show will need to contact their supervisor as early as possible.

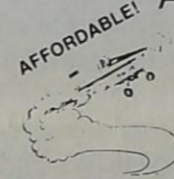

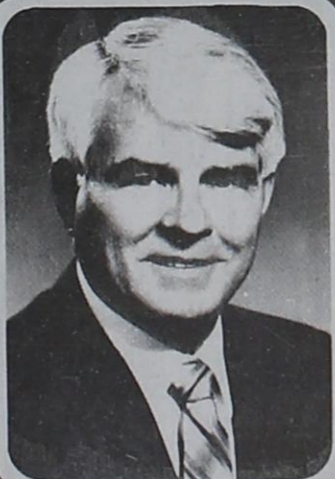

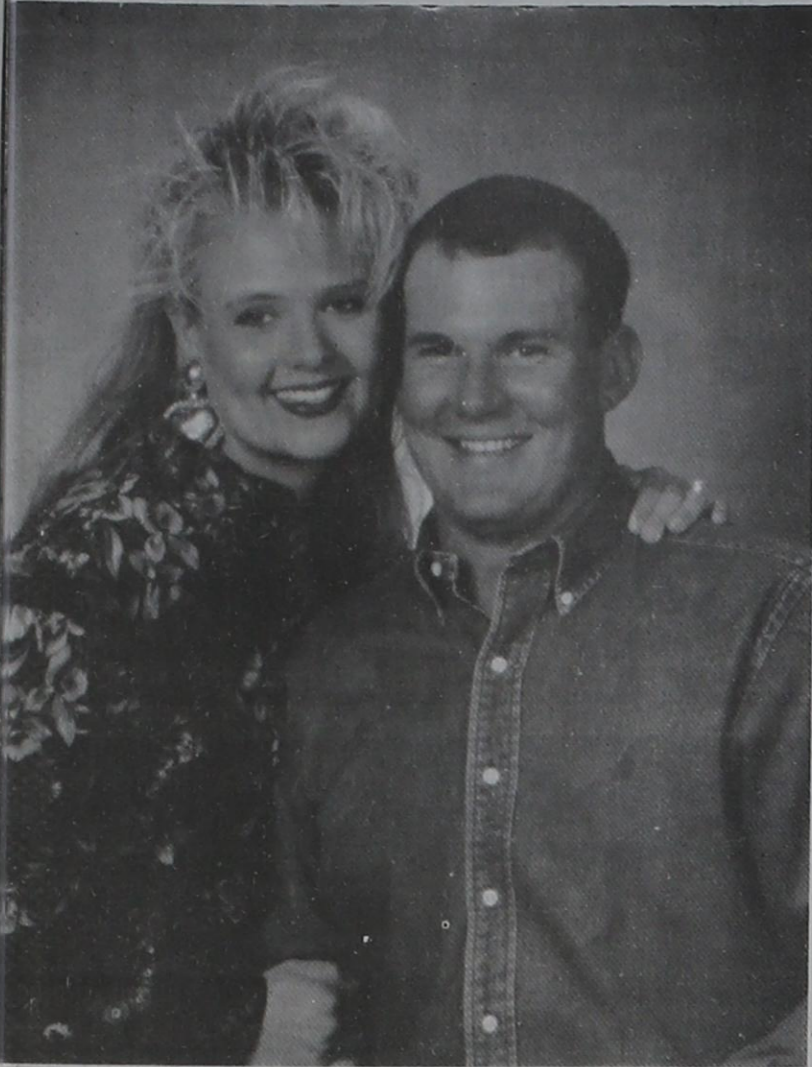

None of us mind doing good. We especially don't mind doing good when we know people will do good to us in return. But how much "doing good" would we do if we were "done wrong" every time we did good?

Even doing good does not shield us from troubles and persecutions in this world. I heard a story this week about a good samaritan who stopped to help a lady with car trouble, and was shot three times and left for dead. He did good and got done wrong. How should you respond when you do good and get done wrong?

People have varied responses when this happens. Some begin to repay evil with evil. This is not a Christian response. Some say "I'll never do good again." This is also not a Christian response. Some continue doing good, even when they know the risks.

We should know, when we do good, that usually people will respond in goodness. Normally, you reap what you sow. Ordinarily, there will be few people so satanic and evil as to harm those who do good. However, on occasion, it will happen. You remember Cain

killed his brother Abel because he was jealous at Abel's good act.

When we endure unjust suffering, what a wonderful example we have in Christ. The suffering Christian must always remember that He has a suffering Savior. In the case of our Lord's suffering, it was the just for the unjust. He who knew no sin suffered for those who knew no righteousness.

Don't give up when you do good and get done wrong in return. The Bible says "Be ye not weary in well doing, for in due season ye shall reap, if ye faint not" (Galatians 6:9).

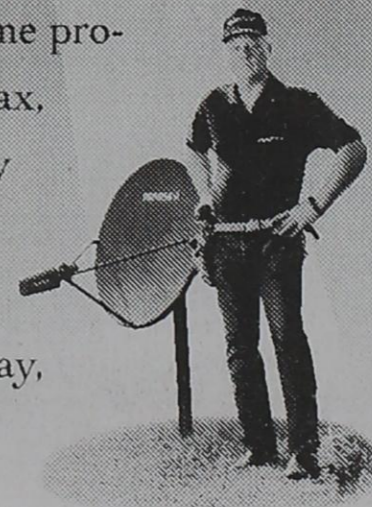

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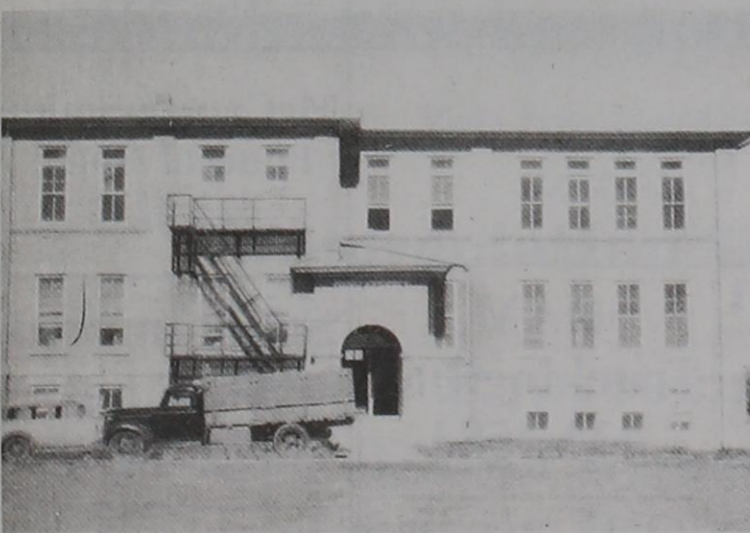

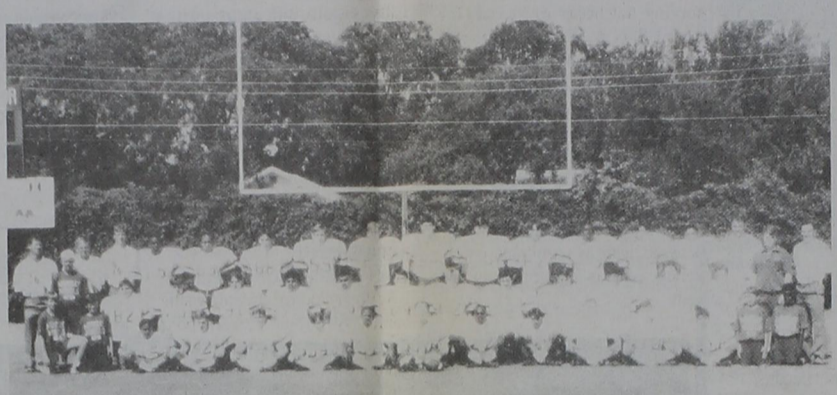

ACP - Conservation Work

We have a very limited amount of funds available for cost sharing of conservation work under the regular ACP program and the Seymour Aquifer Special Project. This money is due to cancellations and under earnings of prior approvals. No allocation has been received at this time.

We understand that funds for the regular ACP will most likely be cut by approximately 50% for the 1995 fiscal year. Additional funds have been requested for the Seymour Aquifer Special Project area which is applicable to southern Knox and northern Haskell Counties; however, the outcome of this request is not known at the present time.

If you are interested in carrying out conservation work, come by and sign up and we will see what happens.

Have you ever tried to discipline a cat? Dogs usually take a hint after two or three mistakes. But there is something about a cat that just won't give up.

My wife has an aloe vera plant sitting in our front window. (At least, she used to keep it there.) Every time we would turn around, there appeared a cat, sitting smack-dab in the middle of the plant. She was attracted to no other plant in the house - just the aloe vera plant.

We would take her out, throw her out, scare her out, spank her, chase her, throw remote controls at her, meow at her, yell at her, hiss at her, even bribe her; but nothing seemed to work. It was frustrating. (So frustrating, in fact, that the alleged aloe vera plant now resides in the guest room... no cats allowed!)

What causes stubbornness? What makes living beings want to be so unruly? Have you ever stopped to think that God may feel frustrated at times trying to get us to do what He wants? Surely God knew when He created us that giving us the power of choice would be a dangerous thing. But He did it anyway.

We have the power to choose. And like cats, we often decide to exercise our will. Choosing to let God rule over us is probably the toughest decision a person ever has to carry out. Sure, it is so easy to want God to rule your life. But to let God rule is a totally different occasion altogether.

It is not easy to let God's desire overshadow our own. It is not easy to admit that He understands more than we do. Surely He gets frustrated at times trying to keep us out of situations where He knows we do not belong. Even though we see nothing wrong with a particular situation, He understands the bigger picture. Nevertheless, we still attempt to get up in the aloe vera plant time and time again, even if we've been taken out a hundred times.

It is easy to talk about the will of God, but it is an entirely different matter to live it.

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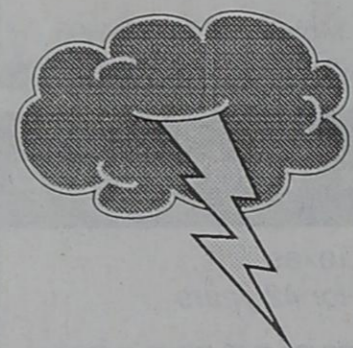
