A Stitch In Time Saver Nine Whatever the reason you sew, you can always use short cuts to help you use your sewing time effectively. Try these tips: * Cut everything at one time. * Use tape to "pin" the pattemto he fabric. You can cut through he tape and not waste time removing pins.

* Eliminate time consuming eam finishing by using the selage when cutting straight seams. * By cutting $3 / 4$ inch seams, ou will have sufficient room for any seam finish.
* Make $1 / 4$ snips into the seam ine in places of notches.
*Speed stay-stitching by stitching one continuous thread. Do not cut thread between pieces. Backstitch at the beginning and end of each piece you sew. Since all pieces are attached to one continuous thread, they are easy to find, even if you have to stop sewing.
* Mark your machine throat plate with masking tape to keep sides of the presser foot, with the closest edge on each side measur ing the seam allowance to the needle hole. Tape can be placed in front of the presser foot at the same distance from the needle hole as the other strips, to allow for accuracy at corners and curves News In Major Appliances While there is nothing totally evolutionary in the major appliance market, there are plenty of new features to dazzle the aver age buyer.

Later, as Christianity spread, the holiday known as "All Saints Day" or "All Hallow's Day" was celebrated on November 1. ("Hallow" means "holy.") Thus, Ottobe 31st is "All Hallow's Eve" or "Halloween." Observance of "holy days" is forbidden by the New Testament (Col. 2:16; Gal.
4:9-11).
The original motivation of Halowen (driving away evil spirits) is certainly a noble notion even though one would quarrel with its effectiveness. The Bible clearly reveals that a Christian does not need elaborate ceremonies to de-
feat Satan's helpers because the Holy Spirit is in every Christian (1 Corinthians $3: 16$; Galatians $4: 6$; Ephesians 2:20-22; Galatians 5:22-23, etc.). A Christian simply must demand that such a evil being depart and that being will do so (compare with Acts 19:11-20).
