

# Local's Brother Wins The **Gold In Culinary Olympics**

Douglas Ray of Dallas won two gold medals and two silver medals in the Culinary Olympics held in Frankfurt, Germany, October 13. He was a member of a 12person team taking part in the international event sponsored by the American Culinary Federation.

The Olympics, held every four years, is "the show" for top-notch cooks across the country.

Douglas graduated in 1979 from Knox City High School. After changing majors numerous times at Southwest Texas State University, he finally decided he liked working in restaurants better than he liked college. So he left San Marcos and headed for Hyde Park, N.Y., to attend the Culinary Institute. Following graduation, Douglas headed for Dallas and became the head pastry chef for the six Harvey Hotels located there.

Douglas' entries in the competition were distinctly western, perhaps an inheritance from his Knox County roots. One of his entries was a 3-foot tall chocolate cowboy sculpture. Bracing his body against the West Texas wind, the cowboy holds a cup of coffee in one hand and uses the other to keep his hat on his head .. Another chocolate sculpture is of the cowboy's wife, holding a baby and also fighting the Texas wind. As you might guess, Douglas'

favorite food is chocolate.

#### KNOX KOUNTY KONNECTIONS By Jane Rowan, County Extension Agent

A Stitch In Time Saver Nine Whatever the reason you sew, you can always use short cuts to help you use your sewing time effectively. Try these tips:

\* Cut everything at one time. \* Use tape to "pin" the pattern to the fabric. You can cut through the tape and not waste time removing pins.

\* Eliminate time consuming seam finishing by using the selvage when cutting straight seams.

\* By cutting 3/4 inch seams, you will have sufficient room for any seam finish.

\* Make 1/4 snips into the seam line in places of notches. \* Pin baste.

\* Speed stay-stitching by stitching one continuous thread. Do not cut thread between pieces. Backstitch at the beginning and end of each piece you sew. Since all pieces are attached to one continuous thread, they are easy to find, even if you have to stop sewing.

\* Mark your machine throat plate with masking tape to keep seams even. Be sure to mark both sides of the presser foot, with the closest edge on each side measuring the seam allowance to the needle hole. Tape can be placed in front of the presser foot at the same distance from the needle hole as the other strips, to allow for accuracy at corners and curves. 





# Farm and Ranch Report

Frost Can Cause Prussic Acid Poisoning

Now that fall is officially at hand, a killing frost will be hitting the area before long. This could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock. Every year I get reports of loss from prussic acid poisoning and with the high cost of cattle it certainly pays to pull cattle off pastures after the first killing freeze.

While many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, the greatest culprits are Johnson and Sudan Grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these that cause the highest mortality if livestock graze them after a heavy frost.

The most dangerous time for the grazing of these plants is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt.

Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely following three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

Prussic acid poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10 to 15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three minutes.

Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing



and frequent convulsions may re-

sult. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues.

The key to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe period of time has passed.
