

School Finance . . . What's The Next Step?

(This is the first article of a weekly series written by Superintendent Doyle Lowrance of Munday ISD that will continue until election time.)

The uncertain status of school finance has been a constant concern over the past few years. School year 1993-94 is facing the biggest uncertainty to date. Voters will go to the polls on May 1 and cast a "YES" or "NO" vote on a temporary solution to this yearly problem. The ballot will contain three propositions to amend the state constitution. All three relate to school finance and public education: 1) equalizing state finance; 2) funding for future state mandates; 3) financing school facilities.

All three propositions carry financial responsibilities on local taxpayers and the states contributions toward public education.

The current system of school finance consists of local taxes, county education district taxes, federal funds, and state funds. School years 1991-92 and 1992-93, through the creation of the C.E.D.'s, have been a big boost to property poor schools in terms of total funds available for the operation of schools. (Munday ISD is in the 7% of wealth per student among all schools in the state.)

The C.E.D.'s were created by the legislature in order to share the wealth of property rich schools with the property poor schools. This has been referred to as the "Robin Hood" method of the recapture process. This method has been beneficial to property poor schools and has enabled these schools to hold the line on local taxes.

Munday ISD tax rate was \$1.30 in 1982, dropped to \$1.27 in 1990, a total of \$1.13 in '91, and \$1.37 in 1992. The increase in '92 over '91 was due to a 40¢ increase in the C.E.D. tax that was set by the legislature.

School taxes in Texas for 1992 ranged from a low of 82¢ to a high of \$2.11. Forty-five percent, or 474 school districts had a tax rate

between \$1.20 and \$1.40 which includes Munday ISD. Tax rates of \$1.40 and above were present in 167 school districts.

School administrators and boards are faced with two big factors each year at budget time - sufficient funds and local tax rates. Tax rates need to be kept as low as possible and yet not endanger the total financial needs of a school district.

April Sales Tax Rebates Reported

According to State Comptroller John Sharp, sales tax rebates to 971 Texas cities and 109 counties, were virtually unchanged from their payments of one year ago.

"Despite the slight decrease in sales tax allocation to Texas cities and counties, Texas has exhibited modest economic growth during the past 12 months. Most of Texas' major cities showed modest gains in employment," Sharp said.

This month's sales tax rebates include taxes collected on February sales and reported to the Comptroller in March by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

The City of Munday received a payment of \$5,109.91 in April, an increase of 4.41 percent. Knox City shows a decrease of .27 percent and Goree's rebate increased 2.10 percent. Benjamin did not receive a rebate check during this period.

as a drug overdose?

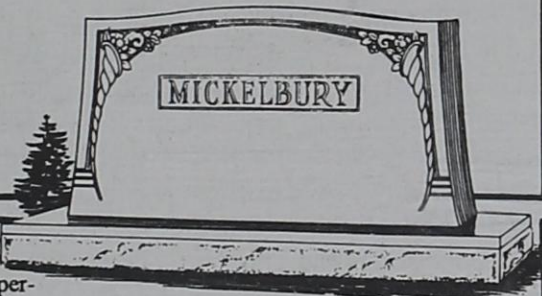

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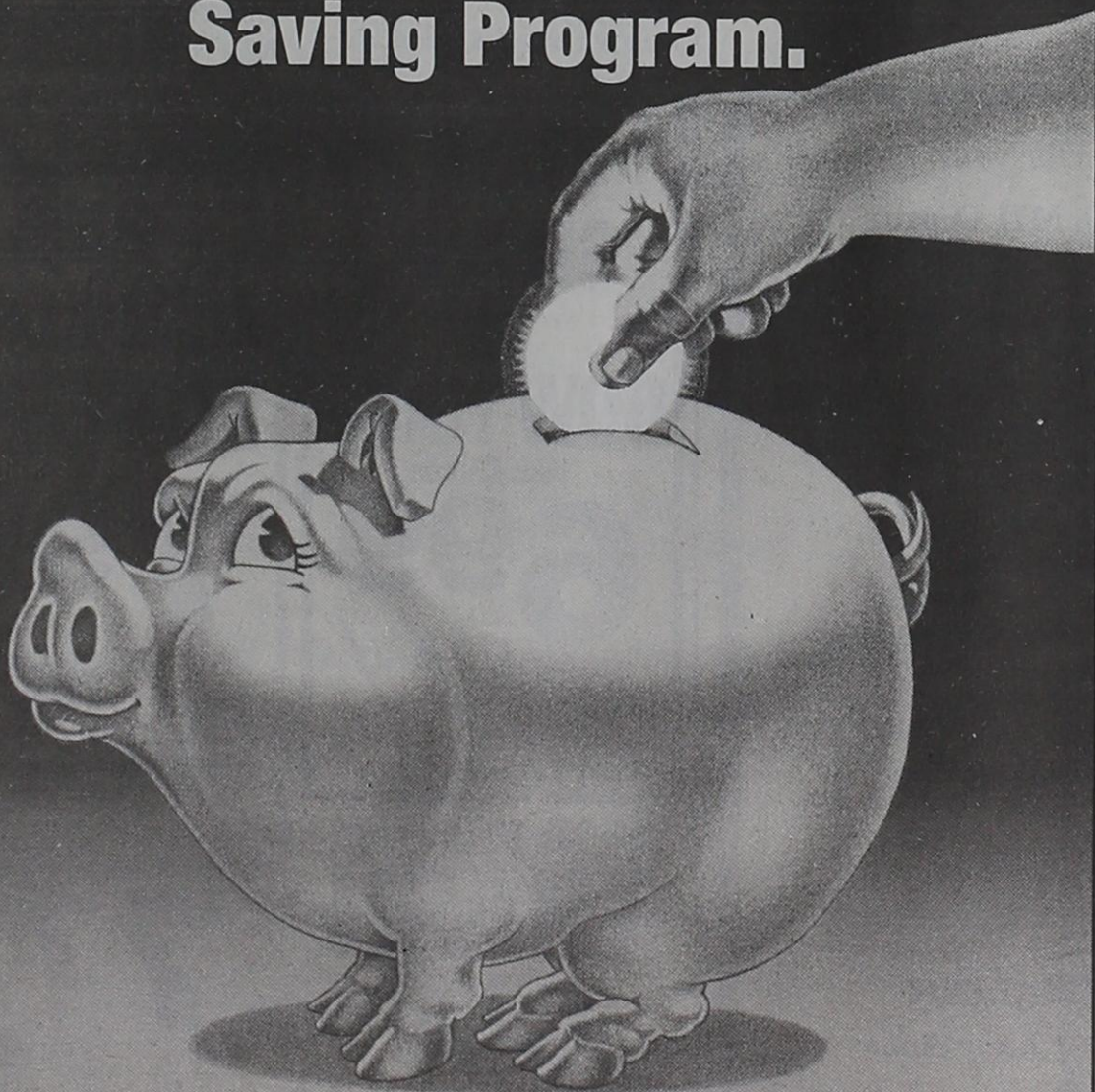
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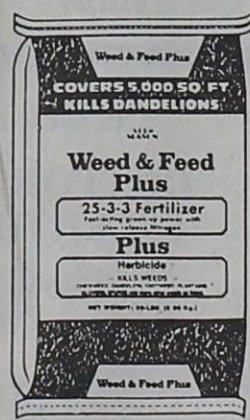
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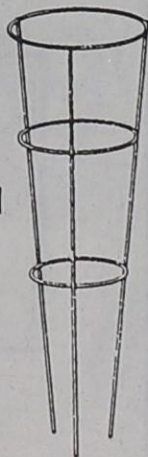


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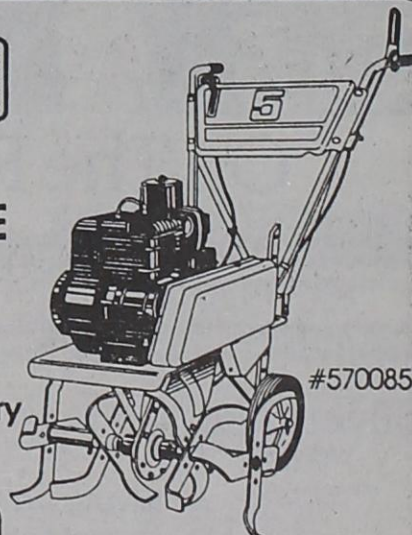
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Farmers Uged To Return Agriculture Census Data

If all farmers and ranchers are not counted in the Census of Agriculture, decisions on farm programs, agriculture trade, extension programs, and others will suffer. In the long run, every farmer and rancher will be affected.

The date from the Census of Agriculture are essential in allocating billions in agriculture funds every year.

The distribution of extension program funds depends on the census.

The number of acres of cropland that can be put into the conservation reserve program in your county is based on the census.

Funds for farm disaster relief are tied to data from the census.

Farm loan money available to states and counties depend on the numbers in the census.

These are but a few examples of why an undercount in the Census

of Agriculture could be detrimental to every farmer and rancher in this country.

In addition, the government's negotiators on agriculture commodity trade rely heavily on the census data. If the information is understated, then American producers may not get the best benefits possible from current trade negotiations.

According to George Pierce, Assistant Chief of the Census Bureau's Agriculture Division, "More than 75 percent of America's farmers and ranchers have completed and returned their Census of Agriculture report. Response in some states and counties is better than others." What does this mean? Those states and counties with the greatest undercount may not receive their share of the agriculture programs, funding, trade considerations, edu-

cational funds, and consideration in Congress.

Mr. Pierce said, "What we also think has happened is that a lot of people who are no longer actively farming pitched their forms in the trash. That's human nature. But we need to know who's not farming by sending the form back indicating their situation. Meanwhile, the slow returns from non-farmers combined with farmers and ranchers who haven't mailed back their forms keeps the returns below the level we need to publish complete and accurate data."

If someone needs help on questions or who should report, or needs another form, call toll free at 1-800-233-6132. By completing and returning their 1992 Census of Agriculture forms, they help "Make it Known . . . America Counts on Agriculture."

KNOX COUNTY KONECTIONS

Food Safety For Warmer Days
Family vacations, camping, boating, or the lake... any of your favorite outdoor activities can be even more enjoyable if you are careful when packing that cooler for lunch.

Foodborne illness is the last thing you want to think about when you are out enjoying the sun, fishing, skiing, and more! Too much sun and heat can make your perishable foods dangerous. Foods that are mishandled can also become contaminated and cause food poisoning if you are not careful.

Below are some helpful hints to make your summer time activities safe and fun!

*** Plan Ahead:** Have plenty of ice or frozen gel-packs on hand before you start packing. Blocks of ice will last longer than ice cubes. Use milk cartons to make ice blocks. Also plan your menu with foods that do not need refrigeration such as peanut butter, jelly, some cheeses, canned meats, dried meats and fruits, beef jerky, and dried soups and noodles. If you plan to take summer salads or prepare sandwiches, these items should be kept on ice until used.

*** Pack Safely:** Pack perishables directly from the refrigerator to the cooler. You can pack meat and poultry while it is still frozen. It will thaw in the cooler, extending its safety and shelf-life.

A full cooler will maintain its cold temperature longer than one that is only partially filled. Pack the remaining space with more ice or with fruit and non-perishable foods.

*** Protect:** Keep hands and utensils clean to help prevent bacteria from growing. If soap and water will not be available, pack some moist towelettes. Bag and set aside dishes and utensils to wash with hot soapy water when you reach your destination or return home.

*** Water-Is It safe?** Another tough problem is access to reliable tap water. Bring bottled water for drinking or mixing with food. Always assume stream, river & lake waters are not safe to drink. If you camp in remote areas, pur-

chase commercial purification tablets or equipment and learn purification techniques.

*** Leftovers?** Put perishables back on ice as soon as you finish eating. Don't let food sit out while you swim or fish. Food sitting at outside temperatures for more than 2 hours are not safe. At 90 degrees or above, food should not sit out over 1 hour. At high temperatures, food spoils quickly. Remember this phrase: "When in doubt, throw it out".

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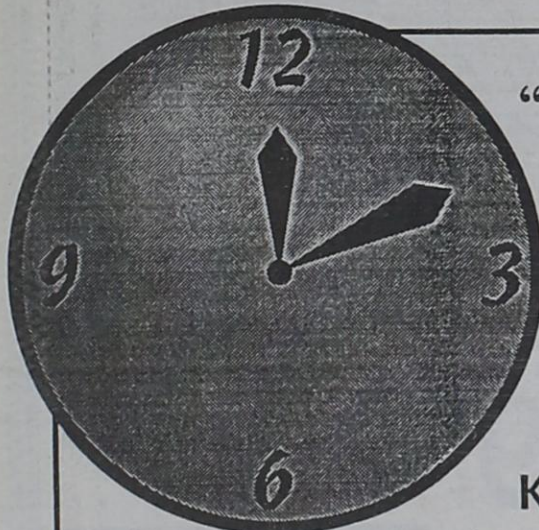


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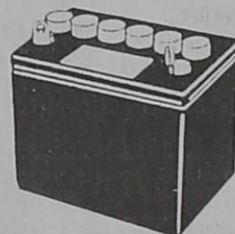
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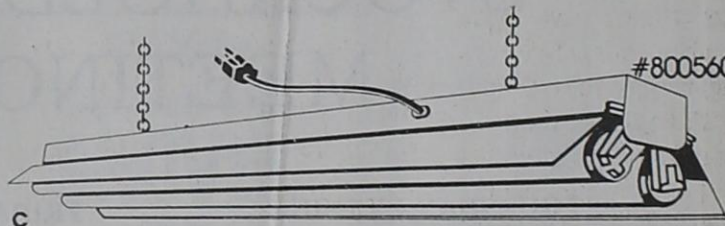

TEXAS WHEAT PRODUCERS ELECTION HELD W. R. Moore Re-Elected for Position On Board

W. R. Moore of Munday was re-elected to the Texas Wheat Producers Board, representing District III (Rolling Plains). He will serve another six-year term. Canvassing of ballots was Friday, April 2. Other elected members are David Moore of Dumas, Jerry Murphy of Dawson, C.L. Ward of Panhandle, and Foyson of Lometa. All names on the ballot were requested by the applicant with support of ten other producers. Ballots were sent to over 41,000 commercial wheat producers in the state, with available space for write-in candidates. Wheat producers fund TWPB with one-cent self-assessment on

Proceeds from such participation supports programs of foreign and domestic market expansion, food and wheat technical service, insect control, research and demonstrations, and other activities designed to strengthen wheat producers income.

Results of the election vote have been certified to the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, Rick Perry.

The new and re-elected Board members will be seated at the organization's next meeting May 19 in Vernon.

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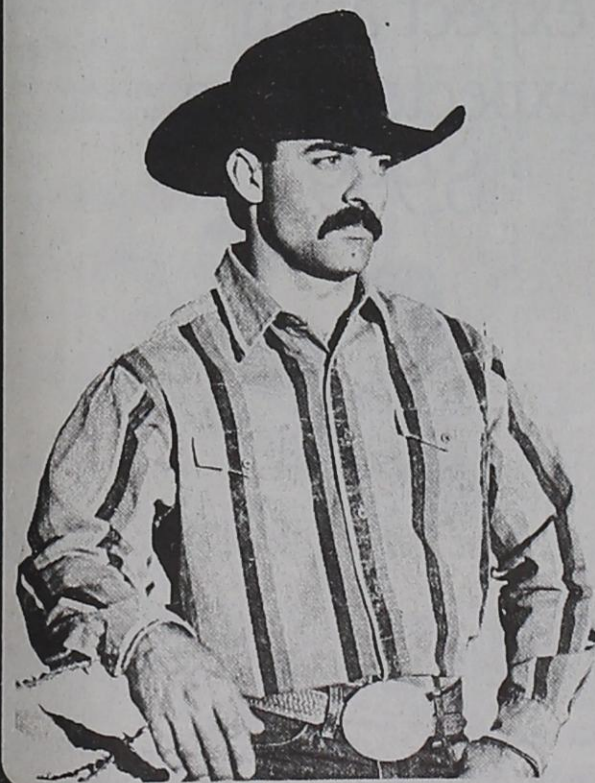

Q: How did Judas Iscariot die?
A: Matthew (27:5) tells us that Judas hanged himself. Luke reports that Judas "fell headlong and burst open in the middle and all his bowels gushed out" (Acts 1:18).

There is no contradiction here. Judas hanged himself as Matthew reports. He was obviously upset at his betrayal of Jesus. Perhaps he thought that by having Jesus arrested, he could force Jesus' hand. Thus Jesus would hurry and set up an earthly kingdom. When Judas saw that his master

and friend was going to be executed the disciple committed suicide.

Jews did not want to handle dead bodies. To touch a dead person would make them unclean (Numbers 19:11-22). There is also a natural revulsion to the dead especially if the body isn't discovered for some time and it begins to decay. Probably that is what happened to Judas' body. When it finally fell -- either because of the weight on a tree branch snapped the wood or the decay of the neck -- the body burst open at the middle.

Remember that Luke, the author of Acts, was a physician (Colossians 4:14). In his writings, Luke shows a doctor's interest in the post mortems of individuals (compare with Luke 16:21; Luke 13:11-13; Luke 8:43-48; Luke 8:49-55; Acts 3:1-9; Acts 5:5,10; Acts 9:36-40; Acts 12:23; Acts 16:22-23,33).

Some have suggested that Judas hung himself over a ravine so that as a branch broke he fell to his final death but I think this is stretching the explanation. Judas died by hanging himself, as Matthew records. Luke, in Acts, simply reports the final humiliation that Judas' body was allowed to decompose in contrast to the dignity given to Christ's dead body (Luke 23:44-24:1).

What's The Future Of Small Rural Hospitals In Texas?

What's the future of small rural hospitals in Texas? One lesson that rural hospitals have learned during the last few years is that we must adjust to change, or perish. Knox County Hospital is studying all kinds of alternatives for the future. Some of those options include swing beds, managed care, a hospice unit, and visiting specialists. But plans cannot be finalized until the changes in health care on the national and state level are clear.

Health care reform is coming.

What shape it will take is still a matter of guesswork, but the American health care system will probably undergo the biggest change in this century within the next few months. Those changes will affect Americans who live in urban as well as those of us who live in rural areas.

There are two primary directions that reform could take: 1) a centralized health care system in which national health insurance would be administered and underwritten by the government, or 2) a system that retains the parts of the health care system that are working and reforms those which are not.

President Clinton has promised that his task force will report by

mid-May with recommendation for reforms. Although no one knows for sure what final form those recommendations will take experts predict that the reform package will have at least the following components: enacting insurance reform, encouraging managed care, expanding Medicaid to reach all living below the poverty line, and reforming the tort system (malpractice).

During the next few weeks, you will be bombarded with a flurry of complicated information about health care reform. This issue is so important that we must look beyond emotional rhetoric and try to analyze the pros and cons thoughtfully.

Since this is legislation that will affect our lives and the lives of future generations, I urge you to study the issues carefully and contact your legislator with your opinions.

April 30 - Sign-up Deadline

April 30 is the final date to sign up in the cotton, wheat, and feed grain program. Do not let this date slip by you.

Sign-up is by appointment only - call 817-658-3537.

May 15 - Certification Deadline

May 15 is the final date to certify your 1993 crop small grain (wheat, oats, barley, rye, triticale, etc.).

If you have a wheat, oat, or barley base, you must certify even if you have 0 acres planted. You must certify all acres of small grain you have planted, regardless of whether or not you have a base, including any acres of small grain planted on set-aside or CUPAY acres.

Baling and Grazing Set-Aside and CUPAY

Set-aside and CUPAY acres may be grazed or baled until June 1. Small grain must be baled, grazed out, or otherwise destroyed before the hard dough stage.

Baling or grazing on set-aside and CUPAY is not permitted June 1 thru October 31.

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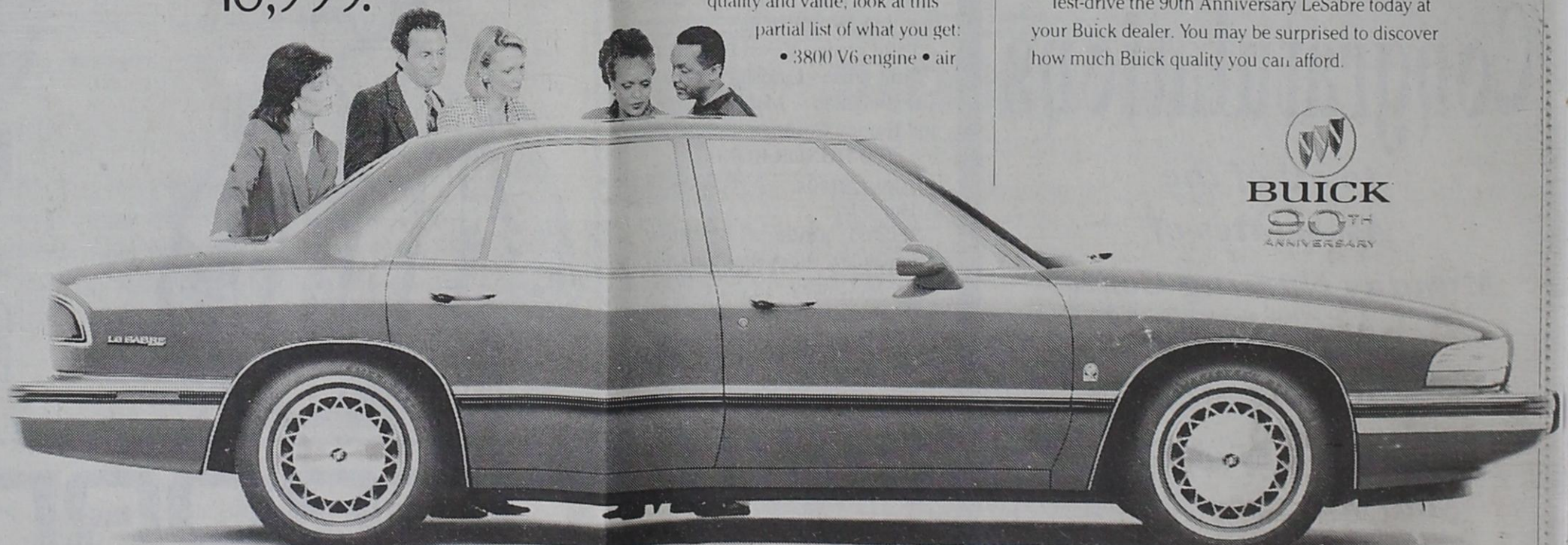
