Moguls Win First State Championship

"It feels good to be winners!" said Munday head coach and athletic director Jim Edwards after his team won the state championship football game with a 13-0 shutout over the Union Hill Bulldogs. This was the Mogul's eighth shutout of the year.

The Moguls combined a balanced offense and a tough defense to preserve their undefeated season and bring home their first state title. The winners controlled the ball for most of the crucial fourth quarter, taking away every opportunity the Bulldogs had to score. It was a great effort by a group of very determined young men who sensed victory from the beginning.

Both teams played conservatively at first, feeling each other out. But after an exchange of punts, the Moguls struck. After Todd Thompson raced 21 yards to the 43 to set up the big play, Tim Collier averted disaster by falling on a loose ball five yards behind the line of scrimmage. On third down, quarterback Dent Offutt threw a perfect pass to Frankie Stinnett, who darted into the endzone, and Ronny Lowrance made it 7-0 with his extra point kick.

Munday's offense continued to roll, getting back into Bulldog territory before the first quarter ended, but had to punt at the 43. Forced back to their three yard line, the Bulldogs made one first down before giving the ball back to the Moguls. From their opponents' 43, Thompson, Offutt and Collier ran the ball five plays, then Offutt scooted across for two yards and another six points. The extra point was unsuccessful, but as it turned out, the Moguls had already scored all the points they needed.

The remainder of the half was marked by punts and turnovers, as Dent Offutt intercepted a Union Hill pass, then fumbled the ball back on the 36. But the Bulldogs didn't get anything going, and the half ended with the Moguls holding on to a 13-0 lead.

Union Hill came out of the dressing room fired up and reeled off a series of first downs, edging their way towards the goal. It appeared the Bulldogs had a touchdown on third and two from the five, but Buford Jones stumbled as he went into the end zone and the ball fell free. Dent Offutt grabbed it and the Moguls went back into business.

Turnovers were an important factor in the second half. The Bulldogs gave the Moguls a golden opportunity midway through the third quarter on a Mogul punt. The fair catch was called for, but the ball dropped down and Jerry Shields recovered for Munday. Then the Moguls returned the favor, coughing up the ball deep in Bulldog territory.

Union Hill began a march that stalled on the Mogul 30 when Munday's defense stiffened, stopping Jones for no gain on third down. On the next play, linebacker Jim Earl Dockins broke through the line and stole the ball away from Jones. The defense was called on again just a few plays later, after Thompson fumbled at the 37. The Bulldogs moved down to the Munday 11 on two passes from quarterback John Clemens to tight end Steve Lawson, but that was where the forward motion ended. Clemens was tackled for a loss, and a desperation pass on fourth down was caught out of the end zone by wide receiver Donald Timmons.

From that point, Munday's offense showed its domination. A long, time-consuming drive led by Collier and Dockins came up short as the Union Hill defense held on a fourth and inches, but it was just as successful as if more points had been put on the scoreboard. With just 55 seconds remaining, the Bulldogs were out of time and out of luck. Neil Waggoner recovered the final

Union Hill fumble at the 23, and the Munday fans began pouring out of the bleachers to meet their team as they came off the field the 1984 Class A football champions.


Coach Edwards said the officials told him the game was the cleanest, most sportsmanlike contest they had ever seen in a state championship game. This statement is emphasized by the fact that there was only one penalty in the entire four quarters.

Another note concerning the outstanding abilities of the Moguls is

that Todd Thompson played three quarters with a broken collarbone. Although he told the coaches his shoulder was sore, he continued to play and play well. This kind of persistence has contributed all year to the Moguls' success.

The victory was a perfect end to a perfect season, and there can be little doubt that the Moguls are, indeed, the best there is in Texas Class A football.



moments when we thought you might not pull a game out, they were all worth it. The Union Hill game made up for everything, and we hope you know how proud we are.



Moving Classes Adds To Christmas Excitement

The day before Christmas vaca-
 tion begins is always an exciting,
 hectic time in any school. But that
 day in 1984 will be long remembered
 by students and teachers alike in the
 Munday school system.

Renovation work on the elemen-
 tary school will begin in January,
 and the vacation period has been ear-
 marked for some time for the pro-
 cess of moving everything out of the
 building. But before the moving
 crew could go to work, students and
 teachers had a few chores to per-
 form, also.

Elementary students will be housed
 in the junior high building for the
 remainder of the school year. Jun-
 ior high students will move into the
 high school when classes resume af-
 ter the holidays. Each student was
 responsible for moving his or her
 textbooks and notebooks to their
 new home before the end of the day
 Thursday. In addition, teachers
 were boxing their belongings at the
 same time, and everyone available
 was involved in the work of tagging
 items to be moved or stored.

Students' desks will be labeled
 with the name of the youngsters
 who occupied them, then taken to
 their new designation. When school
 begins again, each pupil will occupy
 the same desk they had before. All
 articles that are not absolutely
 necessary to the school system will
 be stored in the junior high, so every-
 thing must be labeled whether it
 should be used or stored. A meticu-
 lous system is being used in labeling
 filing drawers and other important
 material to try to cut down on the
 chance of misplacing things.

The sixth grade will be housed in
 the agriculture building when school
 resumes, and seventh and eighth
 grades will be in various classrooms
 in the high school building. These
 students will be involved in a home-
 room environment to some extent,
 in which teachers will go to the
 students' classrooms, eliminating
 movement in the halls during the
 four-minute class break as much as
 possible. Their classes will run on
 the same schedule as the high school
 classes, and they will be studying
 with the teachers they have had all
 year.


In the junior high building, ele-
 mentary students made several trips
 Thursday with sacks of books to
 store until after the holidays. These
 youngsters will follow their usual
 routine but will do so in a different
 building. The band hall will be uti-

lized for some classrooms to alle-
 viate crowding. Elementary students
 will be bused to the high school
 lunchroom at their usual meal
 times.

Both principals, Doug Donoho
 and A. B. Martin, said things were
 running smoothly Thursday, and
 expect very few problems when the
 new system goes into effect on Jan-
 uary 7. Some confusion is inevitable,
 of course, and some students - and
 teachers - may be uncertain for
 a few days. But any problems are ex-
 pected to be ironed out within a
 short time, and the business of learn-
 ing will go on as usual.

Elementary and junior high prin-
 cipal Martin had one word of ex-
 planation to parents of elementary
 students. "The teachers' parking lot
 south of the junior high building
 will remain vacant, and we are ask-
 ing parents to park there when pick-
 ing their children up from school.
 Since the buses load in front of the
 building, it would be more conven-
 ient for everyone and much safer for
 the children if parents waited in the
 parking lot."

Work on the elementary renova-
 tion is expected to begin in January,
 and the building should be complet-
 ed by the start of the 1985-86 school
 year. New classrooms for junior
 high students will be added on the
 high school campus, and the Mogul
 band will also have a new home.

New Vegetable Shed To Be Constructed

Larry Smith and Joe Tidwell, part-
 ners in B. E. Smith and Sons vegeta-
 ble producing operation, announced
 last week that they will move their
 business from its present location
 between Munday and Goree to a
 new spot, and it will be known as
 TXS Vegetable Producers Associa-
 tion.

The Smiths have been growing
 potatoes for 25 years. The business
 was originally owned by B.E. Smith
 and his sons, Edward and James.
 Larry Smith, who is a grandson, and
 Tidwell bought shares in the business
 in 1979, and Edward and James re-
 mained active only as investors.
 They will no longer be involved in
 the company.

Smith said they were coming off a
 very good year in potato produc-
 tion, so the decision was made to
 move the operation to a different lo-
 cation nearer Munday. The new
 processing shed and cold storage
 area, which will encompass approxi-
 mately 6,000 square feet, will be east
 of the Colville-Wilson potato water-
 ing area along the drainage ditch.
 The mobile units which are used to
 house employees will also be moved.

Work on the new shed will begin
 sometime in January, Smith said, if
 the weather cooperates. Boyd Build-
 ers of Boyd, Texas is the contractor.

The company has upgraded its
 processing operation by including a
 48-inch processing line. "This will
 triple our capacity," Smith said. He
 explained that the new line will be
 used along with the existing 36-inch
 processing line during the next pro-
 cessing season to speed up produc-
 tion.

The men will extend their potato
 acreage next year, extending it to
 around 310 to 320 acres. They will
 also continue to grow a few acres of
 sweet onions. Four harvesters will
 be used when the potatoes are ready

to be taken from the ground, and
 the company will employ over 100
 people during the season, a substan-
 tial increase from past years.

Smith and Tidwell agreed that
 government farm programs are like-
 ly to be responsible for a big push
 toward vegetable production in this
 area. This could make things harder
 for all the producers, as those who
 grow vegetables locally must com-
 pete for the market with growers
 from other states. Tidwell explained
 that there is about a three-week
 period between staggered potato
 crops in other locales in which
 Munday producers can sell their
 crops.

"In the future we may be limited
 on how much water can be used for
 agriculture," Tidwell added, ac-
 knowledging the bleakness of the
 farming outlook around the nation.
 But even with these prospects, the
 men felt the time was right to ex-
 pand their production operation,
 and think the move will pay off with
 larger profits.

Courthouse Personnel Honored At Reception

Two retiring Knox County officials and one retiring county employee were honored Thursday, December 20, with a reception in the assembly room at the courthouse.

John Smith, County Tax Assessor-Collector, Homer T. Melton, County Judge and Kathleen Melton, Deputy Tax Assessor-Collector, who have combined a total of 83 years service to the county, have decided to call it quits as of January 1, 1985. Each received a plaque with their name and number of years service with the county inscribed on it in appreciation of their dedicated service to the county government.

John Smith began working as deputy tax assessor-collector in Knox County in 1935 for Earl Sams. He held that position for eight years. In September, 1956, he was appointed by the Commissioners Court to fill the unexpired term of Buddy Bumpas. He was certified by the Democratic Executive Committee that same year and his name was placed on the ballot for the General Election in November 1956. He was elected and took office as an elected official January 1, 1957 and has served in that capacity since that time.

John is a lifelong resident of Knox County. His parents were Knox County pioneers, Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Smith. He is a member of the Methodist Church, Lions Club, Masonic Lodge and has been a member of the Knox City volunteer fire department since 1942.

The Meltons are also life-long residents of Knox County. His parents were J.W. and Pearl Melton of Benjamin and Kathleen is the

daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Earl Sams, also of Benjamin. Homer T. served as Knox County Sheriff 14 years and as a Texas Ranger 13 years before retiring in '74. He was also D.A. Investigator before becoming judge in November, 1976. He is completing his eighth year as Knox County judge.

Kathleen has worked as deputy tax assessor-collector since February, 1962. She cooked for the prisoners at the jail while Homer was sheriff and was a homemaker.

We are going to miss them a lot but wish them well in their retirement.

County Tax Official Ends Long Career

Almost thirty years of service to Knox County comes to an end this week when county Tax Assessor-Collector John Smith locks the door to his office on the last working day of 1984. When the office reopens, a new man will be in charge.

Smith announced earlier in the year that he would not seek reelection to the office that he has held since 1956. Oscar Mangis won his bid for election and will begin his duties in January, thus combining the jobs of chief appraiser and tax collector.

Smith said he really didn't intend to stay at the job very long when he was approached by commissioners in September, 1956, to take the post left vacant by the death of Buddy Bumpas. Smith had been a deputy assessor-collector under Earl Sams for several years in the 1930's and 40's, but had left the courthouse to serve as tax assessor for the school district in his hometown of Knox City. He had other business interests as well, and had to give some of them up to take the county appointment.


"I knew what I was getting into," he said. "We had to get the tax roll out, and it took me almost a month, even with additional help."

He told commissioners he would take the job until he had all the work caught up or until someone else wanted it. Apparently not very many people thought the task worth the salary, as he has had only two opponents throughout the years, and they were in the same election. So he just stayed on, and now he is glad he did.

Smith has seen many changes in the office during his tenure. "There is as much difference in the tax office today and how it used to be as there is in daylight and dark," he mused. The tax office will now handle appraisals, assessing, collecting, car registration and voter registration.

Smith said he'd had his "ups and downs" during his time in office, but as a whole has enjoyed his almost 30 years in the courthouse. A faithful employee for some 22 years of that time, Kathleen Melton, is

also retiring this year, as is her husband, County Judge Homer T. Melton. The Meltons and Smith were honored on December 20th with a retirement reception at the courthouse.

The decision to retire was prompted, in part, by impending hip surgery. Smith has had one hip replaced, and said he will undergo surgery to replace the other hip and another operation to redo the original work sometime in 1985.

Also, he said, "I just thought I'd been there long enough."

Smith graduated from Knox City schools and attended McMurry College in Abilene. He and his wife, the former Daisy Dean Roch were married in 1927. They have one son, John Ed Smith of Midland, and twin daughters, Judy Leaverton of Whiteface and Jane Schoonmaker of Carrollton. Six grandchildren round out the family.

When he recovers from the operations, Smith plans to keep busy even in retirement. He farms and keeps some cattle, and does woodworking in his home workshop. "I'm not much of a fisherman," he claimed. "I can sit there about thirty minutes, and if that fish doesn't want the bait in that length of time, I figure he can just do without it!"

3/4 cup mayonnaise
2 tbsp. chopped green olives
1/2 cup toasted almonds
2 tbsp. chopped ripe olives
2 hard-cooked eggs, diced
1/2 cup raisins
Combine ingredients; toss lightly. Serve on lettuce and garnish with spiced apply rings, ripe olives and watercress. Just before serving, crush 1 cup potato chips over the top, if desired.




