Area Residents Nabbed In Major Drug Arrest

Three Knox County residents were arrested Friday, January 4, on drug charges by Department of Public Safety, FBI and Federal Drug Enforcement Agency narcotics officers.

Arrested in the Cattleman's Cafe in Seymour and charged with possession with intent to distribute marijuana were Larry Wayne Conner, 35, of Truscott, Katherine Hammonds Carroll, 32, also of Truscott, and Samuel Powell Brown, 26, of Ringgold, Ga., a relative of Conner and former resident of Benjamin.

Kenneth Wayne Carroll, 39, of Truscott, Mrs. Carroll's husband, Lewis Bates, 41, of Little Rock, Ark., and Ervin Eugene Baker, 53, of Alvin, were arrested in Wichita Falls for aiding and abetting the possession with intent to distribute marijuana.

Confiscated at the Seymour arrest was a trailer loaded with over 1,200 pounds of marijuana, the street value of which was reported to be

more than \$2,000,000. The money transaction of \$780,000 was apparently made in Wichita Falls. Also confiscated were a shotgun and two pistols and two 1980 Ford pickups possibly used in dealing with narcotics. One vehicle has since been released to the Ford Motor Co., and the other to its owner.

The group appeared before U.S. Magistrate Robert K. Roach in Wichita Falls Friday afternoon. He set bond at \$10,000 each and set a preliminary hearing for 1:30 p.m. January 14, in Wichita Falls federal court. All of the suspects are presently free on bond.

Department of Public Safety Sgt. Bobby Porter of Wichita Falls said the drug bust culminated a two-month investigation of undercover negotiations. He also stated the marijuana was possibly grown in Knox County.

None of the suspects had a previous arrest record. The offenses carry a maximum penalty of 15 years in prison, a \$5,000 fine, or both.

Theft Occurs At City Yard

Vandals broke into the city yard sometime late Monday night or early Tuesday morning and took batteries off two fire trucks, as well as doing some other damage. A radio was taken from one of the trucks, but left at the scene, and officials feel the persons committing the crime may have been scared off.

City manager Walter Hertel said the amount of items taken would probably add up to between \$200 and \$250. "The worst result, though, would have been if we had gotten called to a fire," Hertel said. "It would have been terrible if we couldn't go fight a fire because someone had stolen the batteries out of our trucks."

Hertel also said they have discovered that gas has been siphoned out of the trucks, and antifreeze taken, as well. City police officer Doug Morton and sheriff Gene Nix investigated the incident, and they were able to get some fingerprints, so it is hoped the culprits can be traced.

Building Permits Few in 1984

1984 was not a big year for building in Munday, as only three permits were issued for new homes. Construction on two additional houses that began in late 1983 carried on into the past year.

New homes were built by Melton Morgan, Ricky Decker and Stan Decker. The homes of Dan Offutt and Rickie Herring were completed last year. It is still a buyer's market in Munday as far as housing is concerned, with many dwellings remaining on the market for several months. Although several houses sold during 1984, there seems to be more houses for sale than there are buyers, and newcomers complain about the lack of rental property.

No major business construction was done during the year, but some is being planned for 1985, including the new city hall and a potato processing shed to house the TXS Vegetable Producers operation.

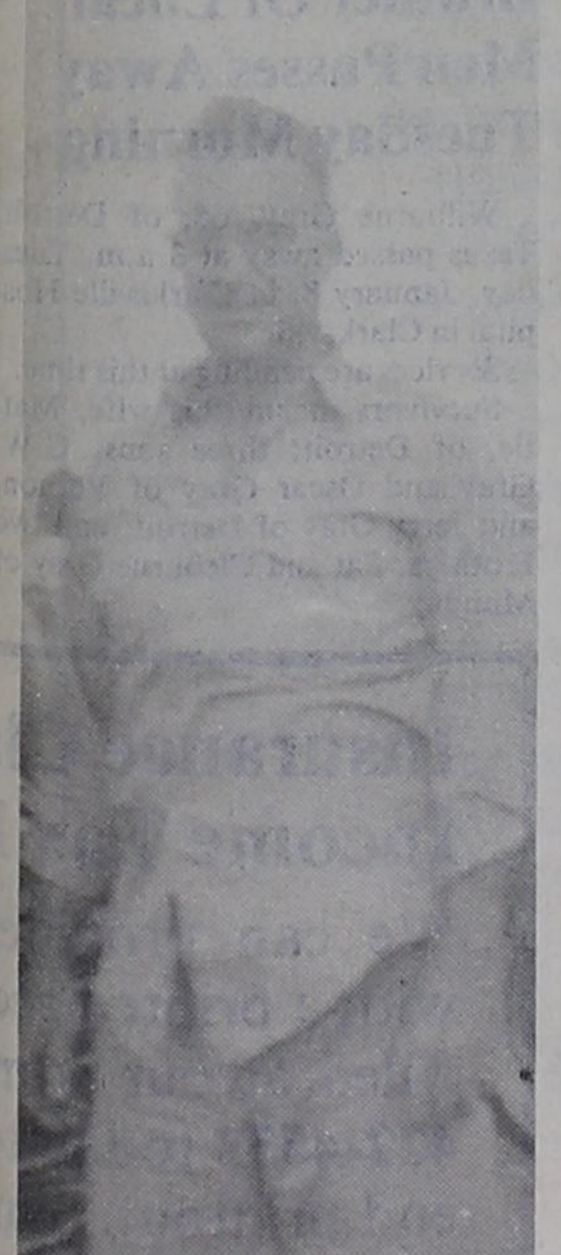
Firemen Remove Yule Decorations

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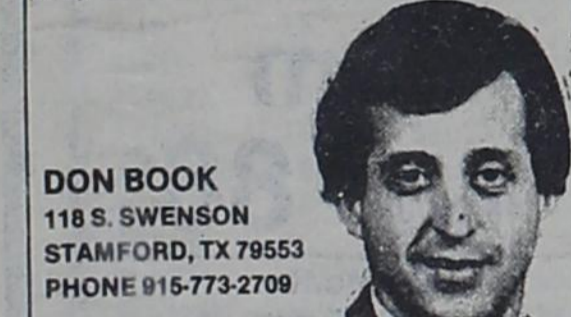

Try Conservation Tillage To Stop Erosion Of Soil

Conservation tillage is one of the most attractive solutions to the problem of wind and water erosion on cropland in Knox County.

Long term production is now threatened in one out of three farms due to high erosion rates. The Soil Conservation Service, Agricultural Extension Service and other agencies are constantly seeking new ways to help farmers apply cost effective ways to reduce this serious soil loss. The fastest growing of these is conservation tillage.

There are several benefits to conservation tillage. Farmers can greatly reduce the number of trips over the field with tillage equipment. This in turn saves money for labor and fuel. Herbicides can control weeds in some cases instead of the plow.

There are various conservation tillage systems, ranging from minimum tillage all the way to no-till. The more stubble a farmer is able to leave, the more the land is protected from erosion. Also, the stubble acts as a mulch to retain moisture.

The major deterrent to conservation tillage in the past has been its trashy appearance. A trashy looking field was a sign of poor farming. Now it is becoming a sign of a good farm manager. Some say conservation tillage is the most significant change in agriculture since hybrids were introduced.

The ASBDC provides outreach, information and referral services to area low-income residents, in order that they may make more effective use of other programs available to them.

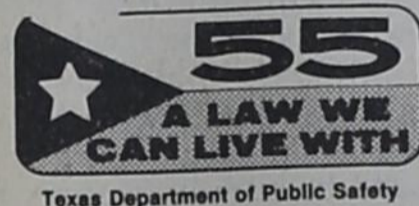
SBA Loan Assistance

Abilene Cotton Classing Report

Local cotton prices were weak to mostly steady in moderate to mostly slow trading during the week ending January 4, according to B.B. Manly of the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene. Spot prices declined by about one percent per pound late in December, and have been mostly steady during this past week. Most cotton sold at 300 to 650 points over loan prices, which was at physical prices ranging mostly from 48 to 55 cents per pound. Grade 42, staple 32 cotton with micronaire 35 to 49 sold at 52½ to 54½ cents per pound. Lubbock Spot Quotations for Thur-

day, January 3, were up 75 to 150 points with grade 41, staple 34, base mike cotton quoted at 55.95, which was down 125 points from a week earlier. Forward contracting was inactive. Cottonseed prices paid farmers ranged mostly from 90 to 100 dollars per ton.

About 10,000 cotton samples were classed at the USDA Cotton office in Abilene during the week ending on January 3. This brought the seasonal total to 145,000 samples classed. About 130,000 have been classed on HVI equipment, and about 15,000 have been classed manually.

The quality of cotton classed in Abilene was about the same as the earlier classings, in spite of an unusual amount of rain fall during the harvest season. Grades have been 31 percent white and 65 percent Lt-spotted so far this season. Grade 42 has been predominant at 35 percent; followed by grade 52 at 19 percent, and grades 41 and 51 at 13 percent each. Staple length has averaged about 32 for the season. About 24 percent has been staple 31, 23 percent has been staple 32, and 20 percent has been staple 33. The average staple length of cotton ginned in the U.S. prior to December 1 was 35.3 thirty-seconds inch, the longest since records have been kept (1938). Micronaire readings have been 81 percent within the 35-49 range, which is very high for this season in comparison to cotton grown on the High Plains. Strength readings have averaged 24.7 grams per tex breaking strength for the season. About 29 percent of the samples classed have been reduced in grade because of bark or grass content.

Weinert and Knox City will be the toughest teams in our district, so those will be important games for us. Several of the gyms we will be playing in are smaller than ours, but I feel this may be to our advantage with the type of playing we'll be using. And some of the smaller teams may find it hard to adjust to our larger facility.

Another big factor in a winning season is fan support. We are looking for the same amount of enthusiasm from the community that the football team received and appreciated, and want to encourage all the fans to make the effort to attend not only the home games but to follow the team to out-of-town contests as well.

The junior varsity is off to a good start also, defeating Archer City in their first outing.

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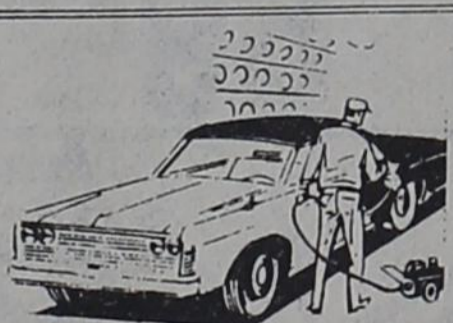
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
