Changes Taking Place In High School Faculty

While local students take a summer break, the Munday School Board is busy filling vacancies in the high school faculty. To date, three new members have been added to the staff, with two vacancies remaining to be filled.

One full-time math teacher was added to the faculty to help cover the necessary math curriculum. Kim Stewart of Munday will join the faculty this fall to teach sev-

eral math courses, including advanced math and computer math. She has taught in the Knox City-O'Brien ISD for the past two years.

Bert Leaverton has been hired to fill the position of head boy's basketball coach and will also teach Social Studies. A Benjamin native, he comes to Munday from Stephenville where he was head basketball coach for the past four years.

Also assuming coaching duties this fall will be Allen Seay, a native of Byers. Seay, who will be head girl's coach, will assume Social Studies classroom duties. He has been coaching at Anton, Texas, for the past five years.

It was recently announced that Dr. Bill Kingston, high school principal, has tendered his resignation to the school board. He will assume the same position at Chico High School later this summer.

Kingston, who has been with the local school system for 12

years, has been principal of Munday High School for the past five years. He stated that it will be difficult to leave, as his family has lived here for many years and consider Munday their "home".

"I have really enjoyed working in the local school system," Kingston said. "Everyone... including the administration, the teachers, the students and the parents... made my job a pleasure."

However, Kingston felt that the position in Chico was an excellent opportunity, and is looking forward to the challenge.

In addition to Kingston's position, the school board is also considering applicants for the position of seventh and eighth grade English teacher.

This staff turnover results from the retirement of Dan Sloan and Ann Therwhanger and the resignations of Kingston and Charles Meurer. Meurer recently accepted the head coaching position at Lindsey ISD.

County Vegetable Show Set For This Weekend


The annual Knox County Vegetable Show will be held Saturday, June 27, at the Vegetable Research Center in Munday.



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

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

BE CAREFUL HOW YOU PRAY. GOD MAY GIVE YOU WHAT YOU ASK FOR.

Examine your prayer life. IS it characterized by "demands" or "requests"? "God, you must heal me . . . You must bring my husband back . . . You must give me what I ask for". Check up on your motives. Are you making requests with "Your" comfort and convenience in mind, or HIS glory? And have you considered what might happen if God did answer your prayer? Could it be that God has something even better in store for you than the answer you would supply to your own prayer? Talk to him about it right now.

See you next week and remember: When you pray, do you give God instructions, or report for duty?

Making Jams and Jellies from 10:15-10:45 a.m.; and *Pickling* from 11:00-11:30 a.m. The videos will be shown again on July 1, in the same order as above, from 2:00 to 2:30 p.m., 2:45-3:15 p.m. and 3:30 to 4:00 p.m.

These videos are an excellent introduction to canning, as well as a good review for those with canning experience.

The pressure canner method is necessary for processing all non-acid vegetables and other non-acid foods in order to prevent possible spoilage or botulism. Canners are equipped with a dial or weighted gauge, which should be tested at least once a year. Now Is The Time To Control Borers

Mid-June is upon us and that means time for an important management practice for fruit tree owners. I'm referring to the control of peach tree borer, and the time to control is now.

Marla Hawkins and Laura Anderson, both of Knox City, called me about controlling borers in their peach trees.

The peach tree borer navigates from the ground around the trunk of fruit trees, including peach, plum and apricot trees.

The borer pupae digs into the tree, where it becomes an adult and lives until the next spring. At that time, it will come out of the tree, lay eggs and die.

If the borer is imbedded into the fruit tree, there are no control measures that I know of to kill the dreaded pest.

Chemicals that are labeled for use to control the borer include Dursban, Lorsban, Malathion or Lindane. Be sure to follow label instructions when mixing the

pesticide.

The insecticide should be applied to the scaffold limbs, trunks and around the trunk extending two to three feet away from the base of the tree. Control measures should be repeated in mid-July and mid-August.

Another good tip is to keep the fruit trees watered, fertilized and

actively growing. This will deter most borers.

Homeowners should also remove dead wood from the tree to avoid infestations of borers of trees.

Following these techniques will assist in the riddance of the pesky borer and possibly protect your trees.

City Adopts New Animal And Fowl Ordinance

The City Council passed and approved a new Animal and Fowl Ordinance at the regular City Council meeting on Tuesday, June 9. It will become effective on July 1 and will be enforced. Everyone within the City limits and within one half mile of the City limits will be subject to this ordinance. The State grants all Cities extraterritorial jurisdiction of one half mile to enforce ordinances. The following is a copy of the ordinance. If an explanation or interpretation of the ordinance is needed, please feel free to call City Hall.

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

Sec. 6.1 Definitions
 For the purpose of this ordinance the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them:

Animal: Any live, vertebrate creature, domestic or wild.

At Large: Any animal off the property of its owner and not under the control of a competent person.

Domestic Animals: Those animals which are naturally tame and gentle or which by long association with man have become thoroughly domesticated and are now reduced to such a state of subjection to his will that they no longer possess a disposition or inclination to escape.

Kennel: Any place where more than four (4) dogs or more than four (4) cats, or any combination of cats and dogs where the total exceeds four (4) animals over the age of ten (10) weeks, and where said animals are raised, trained, boarded, harbored or kept.

Owner: The actual owner of an animal and/or the person who has the care, custody or control of such animal.

Restraint: An animal shall be deemed to be restrained when it is:

- Confined on the premises of the owner within a fence or enclosure, or
- Fastened or picketed by a lead, rope or chain so as to keep the animal on the premises, or
- Under the control of a person by a leash, or
- On or within a vehicle being driven or parked, or
- At heel beside a competent person and obedient to that person's command.

Wild Animals: Those animals of wild nature or disposition so as to require to be reclaimed and made tame by art, industry, or education, or else must be kept in confinement to be brought within the immediate control of the owner.

Sec. 6.2 Violations - Citing To Appear

(a) When an animal is found in violation of a provision of this ordinance and its ownership is known to the agent of the animal control department, such animal need not be impounded by the agent. The agent may, if the owner agrees to sign a citation, issue a citation which shall require the person to appear in court within ten (10) days to answer a charge of a violation of this ordinance.

(b) Signing the citation shall only be a promise to appear and is not an admission of guilt.

(c) It shall be unlawful for any person upon being issued a citation to give the animal control employee a false name or address.

(d) It shall be unlawful to fail to appear in municipal court within ten (10) days of the signing of the citation.

Sec. 6.3 Same - Impoundment.

(a) When an animal is found in violation of a provision of this ordinance and its ownership is known to the agents of the animal control department and the owner cannot be located or refuses to sign a citation, the agent may impound the animal or file a complaint against the owner in municipal court.

(b) When an animal is found in violation of a provision of this ordinance and its ownership is not known to the agent of the animal control department, such animal shall be impounded.

Sec. 6.4 Interference With Department.

No person shall interfere with, hinder or molest any agent of the animal control department in the performance of any duty of the agent, or seek to release any animal in the custody of the animal control department, or its agents.

Sec. 6.5 Records

It shall be the duty of the animal control department to keep, or cause to be kept, accurate and detailed records of:

(a) **Impoundment and disposition.** Impoundment and disposition of all animals coming into its custody.

(b) **Bite Cases.** All bite cases reported to it and its investigation of same.

(c) **Monies received.** All monies received under this ordinance.

Such records shall be open to inspection at reasonable times by persons responsible for similar records of the city, and shall be audited by the city auditor in the same manner as other city records which are audited.

Sec. 6.6 Noise.

It shall be unlawful for any person to own, keep or be in control of any animal which causes unreasonable loud or unnecessary noise that causes material distress, or discomfort to persons, or persons of ordinary sensibilities in the immediate vicinity.

Sec. 6.7 Keeping Certain Animals - Prohibited

It shall be unlawful for any person to harbor or maintain within the city limits the following animals:

- Bats.
- Skunks.
- Poisonous Reptiles.
- Any wild animals whose mature weight exceeds forty (40) pounds.

Sec. 6.8 Same - Exceptions

The provisions of section 6.7 shall not apply to or prohibit the keeping of wild animals by the following:

(a) A publicly or privately owned zoo maintained or operated by a non-profit organization or governmental entity.

(b) Publicly or privately maintained circus, traveling show or rodeo which does not remain in the city longer than thirty (30) days out of each year.

(c) Hospitals, clinics and other premises operated by licensed veterinarians for the care and treatment of animals.

Sec. 6.9 Restraint Of Wild Animals

It shall be the duty of each owner of a wild animal in the city to keep the same under restraint at all times.

Sec. 6.10 Keeping Swine Restricted

(a) No person who is the owner of any swine, or any person who has any swine under his/her management or control, shall keep the same or allow the same to remain in any pen or in any other place within the city.

(b) This section shall not apply to or prohibit the keeping of swine by the following:

(1) A publicly or privately owned zoo maintained or operated by a non-profit organization or governmental entity.

(2) Publicly or privately maintained circus, traveling show or rodeo which does not remain in the city longer than thirty (30) days out of each year.

(3) Slaughterhouses.

(4) Any person, persons, organization or corporation keeping swine in an agricultural open space district provided that said swine is kept no closer than six hundred (600) feet from a residential district, church or school and is maintained as to not be offensive to any person within a reasonable distance.

(5) Hospitals, clinics and other premises operated by licensed veterinarians for the care and treatment of animals.

Sec. 6.11 Running At Large Generally

If any animal, other than dogs, cats or other domesticated pets, is found at large within the city limits, the owner thereof shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Sec. 6.12 Herding

The driving of herds of animals, other than dogs, cats or other domesticated pets, along or upon any street, avenue or alley of the city is hereby prohibited. This section shall not apply to or prohibit the herding of animals along or upon any street, avenue or alley of the city by:

(a) Publicly or privately maintained circus, traveling show or rodeo which does not remain in this city longer than thirty (30) days out of each year.

(b) Any officer, agent or employee of the federal, state or local government or agencies thereof, if such herding is done in the performance of its official duties.

Sec. 6.13 Dead Animals - Leaving Carcass Exposed A Nuisance.

No person shall place or deposit the exposed carcass of any animal or fowl on any street, alley, highway or public place or upon private property or shall stand or permit to stand any truck or other vehicle containing such carcass on any street, alley, highway or public place or on private property within the city. The term "exposed" as used in this section is meant the exposure of the carcass of an animal so that putrefying odors may escape therefrom and contaminate the air.

The exposure of the putrefying carcass of a beast so that noxious or disagreeable odors may escape therefrom and contaminate the air shall be a public nuisance, and the health officer or police officer may summarily remove or cause to be removed such carcass to a point outside the city to be buried and the expense of such

disposal shall be included in the fine collected from the person so violating this section.

Section 6.14 Same - Removal By Owner

No person shall allow or permit any animal or fowl which has died and which at the time of death was owned or controlled or kept by such person to lie in or upon any street, alley, lot or other place in this city. Such person or persons shall cause the carcass of such animal or fowl to be disposed of as the health officer or police officer may direct.

Sec. 6.15 - Removal And Disposal Service, Fees

The fees and charges for services furnished by the city shall be determined from time to time and placed on file in the office of the city secretary.

Sec. 6.16 - 6.28 Reserved.

*State Law References - Vernon's Civ. Sts., arts. 180 et seq., 6890 et seq.

ARTICLE II. PETS

Sec. 6.29 Exemption

Hospitals, clinics and other premises operated by licensed veterinarians for the treatment of animals are exempt from the provisions of this ordinance except as otherwise stated.

Sec. 6.30 Number Kept Restricted.

No person shall harbor or keep more than four (4) dogs and four (4) cats or any combination thereof over the age of ten (10) weeks except in an animal pound, clinic, hospital or kennel.

Sec. 6.31 Vaccination.

No person shall own, keep or harbor a dog or cat over the age of four (4) months within the city limits unless the dog or cat has been vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian with an anti-rabies vaccine. Said animal shall be vaccinated periodically at one (1) year intervals from the initial date of vaccination.

Sec. 6.32 Restraint of Dogs.

Every person who owns, keeps or is in charge of a dog shall restrain his/her dog at all times.

Sec. 6.33 Special Confinement Requirement For Fierce, Dangerous, Vicious Dogs.

The owner shall confine within a building or a secure enclosure a fierce, dangerous or vicious dog and not take such dog out of such building or secure enclosure unless such dog is securely muzzled.

Secs. 6.34 - 6.44 Reserved.

DIVISION II. LICENSE

Sec. 6.45 Required.

No person shall own, keep or harbor a dog or cat over the age of four (4) months within the city unless a license has been obtained for the same.

Sec. 6.46 - 6.47 Reserved

Sec. 6.48 Conditions For License

The dog and cat license tags shall be issued upon payment of the license fee and the meeting of one of the following conditions: (a) Vaccination by a licensed veterinarian with anti-rabies vaccine, or (b) Presentation of a metal vaccination tag issued by a licensed veterinarian showing that such vaccination was given less than three (3) months prior to date of application for such license.

Sec. 6.49 Fees.

The fees and charges for services furnished by the city shall be determined from time to time and placed on file in the office of the city secretary.

Sec. 6.50 Issuance.

Dog and cat license tags shall be issued by the animal control department.

Sec. 6.51 Collar, Tag To Be Worn

Every person who owns, keeps or is in charge of or in control of a dog or cat within the city limits shall provide and place on such dog or cat a collar or harness which shall be worn by said dog or cat at all times when off the premises of said person and shall attach to the collar or harness the metal license tag obtained pursuant to this division.

Sec. 6.52 Transfer.

Each dog or cat license issued under this division shall be restricted to the animal for which the same was issued and shall not be transferred.

Sec. 6.53 Duration.

Every license issued under the provisions of this division shall be valid for one (1) year from the date of issuance thereof.

Sec. 6.54 - 6.68 Reserved.

ARTICLE III. IMPOUNDMENT*

Division 1 Generally

Sec. 6.69 Authorized.

Any peace officer or any agent of the animal control department shall take up and impound any animal found in violation of this ordinance unless otherwise exempted by other provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 6.70 Pets.

The impoundment of dogs, cats or any other domestic pet shall be as provided in sections 6.89 through 6.99.

Sec. 6.71 Confinement By Private Citizen

If any animal is found upon the premises of any person, the owner or occupant of the premises shall have the right to confine such animal temporarily until he/she can notify the animal control department. When

notified, it shall be the duty of the department to impound such animal as provided in this ordinance.

Sec. 6.72 Pound Fees

The fees and charges for services furnished by the city shall be determined from time to time and placed on file in the office of the city secretary.

Sec. 6.73 Disposition At Department's Discretion.

If any animal impounded is found to be affected with rabies or if the animal is seriously injured or if the animal control officer has determined the condition of the animal is questionable, it shall forthwith be destroyed or otherwise disposed of. All decisions as to the condition of the animals shall be made by the animal control department.

Secs. 6.74 - 6.76 Reserved.

Sec. 6.77 Records of Impoundment.

The animal control department shall keep a record for at least one (1) year giving the description of all animals impounded, the date of impoundment and the final disposition of the animals.

Secs. 6.78 - 6.88 Reserved.

*State Law Reference - Authority to establish pounds, impound animals, Vernon's Civ. Sts., art. 1015(16).

Division 2. Pets

Sec. 6.89 Authorized.

The agents of the animal control department are authorized to take up:

- all dogs found not restrained by owners, or;
- all cats which do not have a vaccination tag as provided by sections 6.31 and 6.51 and found not restrained by their owners.

Sec. 6.90 Vaccinated Dogs.

(a) **Period of confinement.** A vaccinated dog impounded as authorized in section 6.89 shall be confined in a humane manner for a period not less than three (3) working days. (b) **Notice.** Upon impounding a dog found with current vaccination tags, the agents of the animal control department shall make a reasonable effort to notify the owner his/her animal has been impounded and the conditions whereby he/she may regain custody of such animal.

Sec. 6.91 Unvaccinated Dogs And Cats

Dogs and cats impounded under this division without a vaccination tag shall become the property of the animal control department after the expiration of two (2) working days.

Sec. 6.92 Fees.

The fees and charges for services furnished by the city shall be determined from time to time and placed on file in the office of the city secretary.

Sec. 6.93 Redemption Generally.

The owner shall be entitled to resume the possession of any impounded dog or cat except as herein-after provided in case of certain dog or cat, upon compliance with the provisions of sections 6.31 and 6.51 and the payment of the impoundment fees of section 6.92.

Sec. 6.94 Redemption Of Unvaccinated Animals.

The owner of any animal over the age of four (4) months which has not been vaccinated as required by this ordinance, upon satisfactory proof of ownership shall pay to the animal control department the sum of twenty-five dollar (\$25.00) deposit and shall be required to purchase a city tag in addition to any fines levied by this ordinance. Upon payment of the fee a receipt shall be given to the owner. The owner will have seventy-two (72) hours in which to have the animal vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian. After the expiration of the seventy-two (72) hours from the date of issuance of the receipt if the animal has not been vaccinated the deposit will be forfeited to the city and the owner will be notified by the animal control department to surrender custody of the animal as provided in section 6.121. The city shall reimburse the owner the aforementioned deposit upon satisfactory proof of vaccination within the seventy-two (72) hour period.

Secs. 6.95 - 6.97 Reserved.

Sec. 6.98 Destruction Of Unreclaimed Animals.

The animal control department may humanely destroy any animal, which has not been reclaimed as provided in this ordinance.

Sec. 6.99 Destruction Of Donated, Sick, Injured Animals.

The animal control department may destroy any animal by a humane method if it has been donated to the department with the request that it be destroyed or if the animal is so sick or injured that it's cure is considered by the animal control department to be impractical or if death is imminent. In either of such events, such destruction may be done immediately without notice or any waiting period.

Secs. 6.100 - 6.115 Reserved.

ARTICLE IV. RABIES CONTROL*

Division 1. Generally

Sec. 6.116 Report of Rabies Suspect By Veterinarians.

It shall be the duty of every licensed veterinarian to report to the animal control department his/her diagnosis of any animal observed by

him/her as a rabies suspect.

Sec. 6.117 Report of Bites or Scratches by Physicians.

It shall be the duty of every physician or other practitioner to report to the animal control department the names and addresses of persons treated for bites and scratches inflicted by animals, together with such other information as will be helpful in rabies control.

Sec. 6.118 Killing or Removing Rabid Animals from the City.

No person shall kill or cause to be killed any rabid animal, any animal suspected of having been exposed to rabies or any animal which has bitten a human or suspected of having bitten a human, except as herein provided, not remove same from the city limits without the written permission of the animal control department.

Sec. 6.119 Surrender of Carcass.

The carcass of any dead animal suspected of having been exposed to rabies shall upon demand be surrendered to the animal control department.

Sec. 6.120 Disposition of Rabid Animals

The animal control department shall direct the disposition of any animal found to be infected with rabies.

Sec. 6.121 Duty to Surrender Animal.

No person shall fail to refuse to surrender any animal for quarantine, destruction or disposal as required herein when demand is made therefore by the animal control department.

Sec. 6.122 - 6.132 Reserved.

*State Law Reference - Regulation of rabies, Vernon's Civ. Sts., art. 2372m

Division 2. Quarantine of Specific Animal

Sec. 6.133 Authorized; Minimum Time.

Upon being presented a sworn affidavit that an animal has bitten or scratched a person, the animal control department shall quarantine the animal so identified for a period of ten (10) days.

Sec. 6.134 Places of Quarantine

Quarantine of an animal which has bitten or scratched a person shall be at the following: (a) animal shelter, (b) a licensed veterinarian hospital at the expense of the owner.

Sec. 6.135 Surrender by Owner.

Upon the demand made by the ani-

mal control department, it shall be unlawful for the owner to fail or refuse to surrender any animal which has bitten or scratched a human being or which is suspected of having been exposed to rabies, for quarantine, which expenses shall be borne by the owner.

Sec. 6.136 Released to Owner.

The quarantined animal may be reclaimed by the owner if adjudged free of rabies, upon payment of the fees set forth in section 6.92, upon compliance with the vaccination provisions set forth in section 6.31.

FINES, SERVICE CHARGES AND FEES SCHEDULE ANIMAL AND FOWL ORDINANCE

Article I. In General

Sec. 6.15 - The fine for violating any of the provisions of Article I of this Ordinance shall be one-hundred dollars (\$100.00) per day with the exception of Sec. 6.2 which will be addressed as a separate violation in Municipal Court. Each day constitutes a separate offense.

The fee for removal and disposal of dead animals by the City shall be one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

Article II. Pets.

Sec. 6.49 - Dog and cat license tags will be provided by the animal control department at a cost of two dollars (\$2.00) each.

The fine for violating any of the provisions of Article II, Division 1 of this Ordinance shall be fifty dollars (\$50.00) per day with the exception of Sec. 6.33. Each day constitutes a separate offense. The fine for Sec. 6.33 shall be two-hundred dollars (\$200.00) and forfeiture of the offending animal to the animal control department for destruction as defined in Article III, Division 2, Sec. 6.73 of this Ordinance.

Article III. Impoundment

Division 1. Generally.

Sec. 6.72 - The fee for impoundment shall be one-hundred dollars (\$100.00) plus all applicable costs.

Division 2. Pets.

Sec. 6.92 - The fine for violating any of the provisions of Article III, Division 2 of this Ordinance shall be one-hundred dollars (\$100.00) per day. Each day constitutes a separate offense.

Passed and approved this 12th day of May, 1992 AD.

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

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

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Hospice Program Now Available In Munday

Hospice, a special way of caring for a patient whose disease cannot be cured, is now available in Munday through the local branch of Mediplex Home Health Services, 221 East Main Street.

The Hospice Program, operated under Medicare, is primarily a comprehensive home care program that provides all the medi-

cal and support services necessary for the management of a terminal illness. This includes physician services, nursing care, medical appliances and supplies, short-term respite care in an inpatient setting, outpatient drugs for symptom management and pain relief, physical therapy, occupational therapy and speech/language pathology services, home

health aide and homemaker services, medical social services and nutrition and dietary counseling. When a patient receives these services from a Medicare-certified hospice, such as Mediplex, Medicare hospital insurance pays almost the entire cost. Limited cost-sharing for outpatient drugs and inpatient respite care are the only expense to the beneficiary.

Q: Why do churches host Vacation Bible Schools?

A: The wise prophet of the psalms once asked: "How can a youth keep his life-path pure?" He then answered his own question: "By guarding that path with God's word" (Psalms 119:9).

Young people spend about seven hours each day going to secular school during the 9-10 months they are required by the state. When we add in homework, they spend at least 45 hours a week learning about history, science, etc. If they regularly attend a Sunday Bible School and Church services, they are only receiving three to four hours of Bible study per week.

Learning about God's world and literature is important, but the most important thing our children can learn about is God's nature and Christ's love. "What will it profit someone to gain everything in the world and lose his soul?" Jesus asks us (Matthew 16:26). Since this is true, it seems strange that we send our children to 45 hours per week of secular school-

ing and only to three hours of Bible study.

Vacation Bible School allows us about a week of daily Bible study during the summer when the children's attention is not drawn away by school activities.


